





— Water Quality Report —

he amount of phosphorus in the water column is one of, if not, the most important criteria in assessing our lake's water quality. More than any other element, phosphorus limits (or allows) the growth of plants, chlorophyll and ultimately algae in the water.

The presence of any undesirable element in Birch Lake is particularly acute since our large volume and virtual lack of inlets leaves the lake to flush itself only once every 15 years.

Two weeks ago, in light of our declining TSI ratings, this column discussed at length the need to keep phosphorus out of the lake to the greatest extent possible. To that end, we plan to share with you ways to create and protect natural shorelines. We have been told this is our best bet at limiting phosphorus.

Some members of your Water Quality Committee do have a few additional theories as to why the effective amount of phosphorus (and chlorophyll and algae) within the lake have increased:

1) There seems to be a reduction, if not absence, of zebra mussels in the lake right now. (A couple of years ago the bottom was covered in zebra mussels, something not seen previously.) A recent survey of Dugan's shoreline showed no zebra mussels at any usual spot, rocks, seawall, pier posts, nothing, nada, zilch.

Additionally, a real lack of snails was noted. Some were available, but only the small, real conical ones and these were in real short and random supply. No snail tracks on the sandy bottom and none of the larger variety. If the zebra mussels are temporarily gone and with the absence of the fresh water mussels, a

massive amount of what would normally be filtered by these creatures would stay in the water column. Maybe that is a reason for our diminished clarity. We will contact some folks who study zebra mussels at MSU to see if any light can be shed on this.

Also, if Dugan's is only a random site for lack of mussels and diminished snail population, please let Terry know.

2) Somewhat fortunately excess amounts of phosphorus eventually settle to the bottom, attaches itself to the sediment there, and usually remains relatively dormant.

Perhaps equally as important as keeping phosphorus out of the lake, is to prevent the re-suspension of existing phosphorus currently at the bottom of the lake into the water column. Whenever we stir up the bottom, we free up and raise into the water column one of its most undesirable possessions, phosphorus

While the normal boat traffic we have had on the lake can cause some re-suspension of this sedimentary phosphorus, possibly nothing stirs up the bottom and releases more phosphorus than the recently arrived/developed bladder boats whose goal is to create a 4' wave, and utilizes massive amounts of weight (up to 8200#) and horsepower (up to 550) in order to do so.

Is it only coincidental that our worst combined TSI water quality rating occurred last year, the first year Birch incurred much use by bladder boats?

In addition to enhancing turbidity and potential further phosphorous loading, waves generated on a continuous ba-



sis from these boats can lead to further shoreline erosion, and potential damage to smaller boats and docks. It sometimes seems to be lost that this is just a small lake, and the front yard for the entire lake community.

Additionally, all boat owners should refrain from acceleration where prop wash will result in bottom disturbance, i.e. outside of the raft line at the least.

Last August a column was printed in the Barker in the hope that no additional bladder boats would be introduced to Birch Lake and that those on the lake would be used only under limited circumstances.

If you or anyone you know are thinking of buying one of these wave- and wake-makers and using it on our lake, please share this information with them, and urge them to reconsider! Let's protect our lake to the best of our abilities.





STU'S STAR STUFF



oon after the sun sets and the sky becomes sufficiently dark to see the brighter stars, our attention is drawn to not one. but three bright planets. I know we talked about this last week but they aren't going away anytime soon. High in the southern part of the sky we can see silvery-white Jupiter, while low in the south-southeast glows amber colored Mars, while cream-colored Saturn is coming up over the southeast horizon.

If you're up at dawn and in a sporting mood you might try to glimpse speedy Mercury, though its viewing circumstances do not particularly favor lake skywatchers just now. As for the most brilliant planet of all, Venus is out of the loop all month long as it transitions from a morning to evening object; it's simply too near the sun to see.

Mars was in opposition to the Sun on May 22, and closest to Earth on May 30, so continues to dominate the evening sky in Libra. Saturn is nearby in Ophiuchus.

Mars, having made its closest approach to Earth on May 30, now begins to recede and consequently will appear from here on to gradually fade and shrink in apparent size. On June 1, this fiery colored object shined at magnitude -2.0, only a trifle fainter than Jupiter.

At the start of June, Mars was about 47.3 million miles from Earth. By month's end its distance from Earth will have increased to 53 million miles and it will have faded to magnitude -1.4; still dazzling, but only about one-half as bright as it was at the beginning of the month.

Mars remains within the boundaries of the zodiacal constellation of Libra (the Scales) all of this month. It appears as a bright and imposing yellow-orange light low in the east-southeast sky at dusk and remains in the sky for much of the night. Even by June 30, it does not set until around 2:30 a.m.

Saturn is in opposition tomorrow in Ophiuchus. Being directly opposite the Sun, it is visible all night. The rings are spread wide, making it a beautiful sight in any telescope.

Throughout the month Saturn ascends the southeastern sky during early evening and moves westward through the night as the Earth turns. This month Saturn becomes the third planet of the year to reach opposition, that is, to be opposite the sun in our sky. For the rest of the summer Saturn will remain in the evening sky, fading slightly as Earth pulls ahead of it in its orbit. Saturn is shining at magnitude 0.0, unusually bright for this faintest of the five classical naked-eye planets. The reason is that its rings are tilted toward Earth by 26 degrees, presenting a larger-than-normal profile. The rings will be tilted to their maximum extent, 27 degrees, in October 2017.

Jupiter is prominent in the west-southwest during June's long evening twilights. It is well to the upper left of Regulus, the heart of Leo, the lion, and draws noticeably away from the star this month. Jupiter is high enough for sharp telescopic viewing as soon as the sky darkens. The planet doesn't set until the middle of the night. This evening, Jupiter will be positioned about 4 degrees to the right and slightly above the moon.

Next week, as darkness falls, look to the south-southeast for the moon, less than 36 hours from full phase and 98-percent illuminated, sitting about 2.5 degrees to the upper left of a very bright star shining sedately with a yellowish-white hue. That "star" is, in reality, the planet Saturn. If you extend an imaginary line from the moon through Saturn and continue on at roughly twice the distance between the two. you'll come to the 1st-magnitude red star Antares in the constellation of Scorpius, the Scorpion.



It's loosestrife season — be on the lookout!

Purple loosestrife is an erect perennial herb in the loosestrife family, with a square, woody stem and opposite or whorled leaves. Leaves are lance-shaped, stalkless, and heart-shaped or rounded at the base. Loosestrife plants grow from four to ten feet high, depending upon conditions, and produce a showy display of magenta-colored flower spikes throughout much of the summer. Flowers have five to seven petals. Mature plants can have from 30 to 50 stems arising from a single rootstock.

Purple loosestrife adapts readily to natural and disturbed wetlands. As it establishes and expands, it outcompetes and replaces native grasses, sedges, and other flowering plants that provide a higher quality source of nutrition for wildlife. The highly invasive nature of purple loosestrife allows it to form dense, homogeneous stands that restrict native wetland plant species, including some federally endangered orchids, and reduce habitat for waterfowl.

Purple loosestrife is capable of invading lakes, rivers and many wetland types, like freshwater wet meadows, tidal and non-tidal marshes, pond edges, reservoirs, and ditches.

Purple loosestrife was introduced to the northeastern U.S. and Canada in the 1800s, for ornamental and medicinal uses. It is still widely sold as an ornamental, except in states where regulations now prohibit its sale, purchase and distribution.

Purple loosestrife enjoys an extended flowering season, generally from June to September, which allows it to produce vast quantities of seed. A mature plant may have as many as thirty flowering stems capable of producing an estimated two to three million, minute seeds per year.

Purple loosestrife also readily reproduces through underground stems at a rate of about one foot per year. Many new stems may





emerge vegetatively from a single rootstock of the previous year.

Small infestations of young purple loosestrife plants may be pulled by hand, preferably before seed set. For older plants, spot treating with a glyphosate

type herbicide (e.g., Rodeo® for wetlands, Roundup® for uplands) is recommended. These herbicides may be most effective when applied late in the season when plant are preparing for dormancy.

While herbicides and hand removal may be useful for controlling individual plants or small populations, biological control is seen as the most likely candidate for effective long term control of large infestations of purple loosestrife. As of 1997, three insect species from Europe have been approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for use as biological control agents. These plant-eating insects include a root-mining weevil, and two leaf-feeding beetles. Two flower-feeding beetles that feed on various parts of purple loosestrife plants are still under investigation. Galerucella and Hylobius have been released experimentally in natural areas in 16 northern states, from Oregon to New York. Although these beetles have been observed occasionally feeding on native plant species, their potential impact to non-target species is considered to be low.





— Camp Tannadoonah —

ere we go! Staff training is underway as I write this, and we're preparing for the first group of campers Sunday afternoon. Just moments ago we received a couple registrations, which resulted in us surpassing our total number of campers from last summer!

We're currently at 849 campers, and our goal for the year is still to get to 900. But on this date (June 7) in 2015, we had just 775 campers registered. We didn't reach our final total of 847 until the 2nd of August! So we're really confident about being able to get to 900 by the end of the summer!

We have done some really interesting new staff training activities this year. We felt that last year's staff didn't really work well together as a team, and we really wanted to change that this year, so we brought in two camp facilitators to help with staff training. Travis and Beth Allison, from Ontario, Canada came to camp Sunday, Monday and Tuesday of staff training week to guide us through a series of sessions on community building.

One of the most impressive activities they did with the staff was to talk to them about the legacy they wanted to leave at camp after this summer. We had displays of historical information and memorabilia from camp, a photo

slideshow, and recordings of camp songs, all arranged in Morris Lodge.

The staff members were instructed to enter the cabin, and spent about an hour silently (completely silently!) walking around the building looking at the displays. At each display there was a sheet of newsprint for them to write down the answers to various questions. They were asked to tell about their favorite memories of camp, what they were most looking forward to, what things they could do to make this the best experience for campers, what things they could do that would be harmful to camp, what they hoped their impact on the campers would be, etc.

We were so impressed by how seriously they all took this exercise. There wasn't a sound in the room except the wound of camp songs playing on the speaker. It was very emotional and touching to see what people wrote, and afterwards to hear how much of an impact it had on everyone.

We also did an activity to impress upon the staff how big a responsibility their job is at camp. We asked them to come to the camp fire on the first evening and bring their most treasured, personally meaningful item that they had brought with them to camp. Many of them brought blankets, stuffed animals, photos of family and friends, and

other special items.

We then asked them to hand their item to someone else in the circle whom they had never met prior to that day. And then we went around the circle and everyone shared the story of why this object or item was so special to them. Once they had all told their stories, we discussed how they felt handing over this treasured item to a near stranger who they had only met a few hours earlier

We talked to them about how it feels for a parent to hand over their child to our after having met our staff just 20 or 30 minutes ago. At this point, they assumed the activity was over and several people handed their items back to their owners. But.... Then we told them that the person who was holding their most precious item was going to hold on to it for the rest of the week! We think this activity will really help them understand how big a deal it is for parents to trust us to protect their children for a whole week.

We're excited for the first group of kids to arrive on Sunday! Hope to see you all at the lake.


