— In Memory — Doctor Richard Green

February 10, 1928 – August 9, 2017

George Richard Green, MD, age 89, died peacefully in Sheboygan, Wisconsin on August 9, 2017 from complications of heart disease. He was born on February 10, 1928 in Rochester, Minnesota, to his parents George Francis Green, MD and Geraldine McIntyre Green. He attended John Adams High School in South Bend and graduated from Hillsdale College in 1950.

After serving in the US Army for two years, he married his lifelong love, Barbara Claudon, at her home in Valparaiso, Indiana on September 6, 1952. He then attended Indiana University School of Medicine, graduating in 1956. He completed a general surgical residency at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota in 1961 and subsequently moved back to South Bend to join his father in his surgical practice. They worked together for 15 years after which he continued in solo practice.

Dr. Green is survived by his wife Barbara, four children, Sandra Green (Geoffrey Lamb), Kathryn Pawlak (James), Laura Green (John Hadley), and George David Green (Diana), eight grandchildren, Rick Lamb, Kelsey Lamb, Elizabeth Traudt (Ryan), Kristin Pawlak, George Kendall Green, Curtis Green, Kyle Hadley, and Chelsea Hadley, and two sisters, Joanne Knoop of South Bend, Indiana and Suzanne Parshall of Eugene, Oregon, as well as his nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents and one sister, Frances Martinov.

While practicing surgery for almost 40 years, Dr. Green served a term as president of the South Bend Medical Society. He also served as president of the South Bend Shrine Club, and was a member of the Junto Goose and Duck Club, the Rotary Club, and the Elks Club.

His hobbies included boating and sailing, ham radio operation, skeet shooting, and building and flying remote control airplanes with his son. He enjoyed traveling with family and friends, and especially enjoyed water sports and family time at their cottage at Birch Lake, Michigan. He was an avid Notre Dame football fan, and loved Indy car racing. H e and Barbara attended the Indianapolis 500 race for many years.

He was a loving, devoted husband, father, and grandfather, and had a quiet wit and fun-loving personality. He taught us all to dance and to enjoy life to the fullest. He had a total commitment to his beloved wife, and their marriage served to inspire not only their family but many people they encountered throughout their life together.

Dick and Barb started renting cottages at Birch Lake in 1966 and bought their cottage on the South Side in 1977. Over the



years they shared their home with their children and grandchildren and created many family traditions. Summers were not complete without gathering for the Birch Lake Bash over Labor Day weekend.



— Water Quality Report — More initial reflections on our 'Score the Shore'

... this time provided by the DEQ's senior aquatic biologist that led the members of the Birch Lake Water Quality Committee on our Score the Shore voyage.

he pros and cons of what we saw in Birch Lake.
Pros: Birch Lake has a high percentage of submerged vegetation and

the absence of erosion along the shoreline. Vegetation provides fish and animal habitat, while stable shorelines decrease water turbidity and lowers your chances of losing land to erosion.

■ **Cons:** Birch Lake would benefit from leaving branches/logs along the lake bottom and along the shorelines for fish habitat and to reduce wave action along the shoreline. In addition, vegetation buffers would improve water quality by reducing land runoff and chemicals from entering the water, decreasing wave action along the shoreline, and preventing Canada geese from accessing your property.

The general categories that we look at for Score the Shore are:

Good: 76-100 Fair: 51-75 Poor: 26-50 Highly Impacted: 0-25 Birch scored a 50, with an average density of 21.8 structures per 1,000 feet. While reviewing Score the Shore data from 2015 and 2016, it was noted that a correlation is present between the structure density and the score from the procedure. For example, Gull Lake in Kalamazoo County, received a scored a 46 with an average density of 23.7 structures per 1,000 feet. In essence, the more homes/development, the lower the scores.

There are ways to mediate a lake with higher development. When looking at the Score the Shore data sheet, it is best to look for ways you can achieve the highest scores. For example, if you have >75% emergent floating vegetation, >75% submergent vegetation, no plant management, >16 pieces of large woody debris, and no erosion along the shoreline, you could max out the Aquatic Zone Characteristics and Shoreline Erosion portion (of the score within a section). In addition, increased vegetation buffers and decreased seawalls would improve the Shoreline Erosion Control Practices portion (of the score within a section).

Birch Lake could look to improve these factors by planting emergent vegetation such as cattails along the shoreline on the lakeside of rock riprap or seawalls. Another positive factor would be to have unmowed vegetation belts along the shoreline instead of having a



mowed lawn to the water's edge.

These details from Score the Shore can help residents of Birch Lake protect high quality shoreline on your lake and learn ways to improve lower scoring shorelines around the lake as well. 



CLASS REUNION!



More on the solar eclipse

solar eclipse is the result of a combination of coincidence and clockwork.

The coincidence is that the Sun and Moon appear almost exactly the same size in Earth's sky. The Sun is about 400 times wider than the Moon, but it also is about 400 times farther away. So when the new Moon passes directly between Earth and the Sun, it can cover the Sun's disk, blocking it from view.

We don't see an eclipse at every new Moon, however, because the Moon's orbit around Earth is tilted a bit with respect to the Sun's path across the sky, known as the ecliptic. Because of that angle, the Moon passes north or south of the Sun most months, so there's no eclipse.

When the geometry is just right though, the Moon casts its shadow on Earth's surface, creating a solar eclipse, and that's where the clockwork comes in.

The Moon goes through several cycles. The best known is its 29.5-day cycle of phases, from new through full and back again. Other cycles include its distance from Earth (which varies by almost 30,000 miles over 27.5 days) and its relationship to the ecliptic (27.2 days), among others. These three cycles overlap every 6,538.3 days, which is a little more than 18 years. Eclipses occur at the point of overlap.

This 18-year cycle is known as a Saros. The circumstances for each succeeding eclipse (solar or lunar) in a Saros are similar. The Moon is about the same distance from Earth, for example, and the eclipses occur at the same time of year. (Because of the extra one-third day, however, each eclipse occurs one-third of the

way around Earth from the previous eclipse; the next eclipse in this Saros, in 2035, will be visible across portions of Asia and the Pacific Ocean.)

A cycle begins with a partial eclipse. A portion of the Moon just nips the northern edge of the Sun, for example, blocking only a fraction of the Sun's light. With each succeeding eclipse in the cycle, the Moon covers a larger fraction of the solar disk, peaking with a series of dozens of total eclipses. Then the Moon slides out of alignment again, this time in the opposite direction, creating more partial eclipses. The series ends with a grazing partial eclipse on the opposite edge of the solar disk.

The August 21 event is eclipse number 22 of Saros 145, which began on January 4, 1639, and will end on April 17, 3009. The cycle will produce 77 eclipses, including 41 total eclipses.

Several Saros cycles are taking place at any given time, however, so we don't have to wait 18 years between

eclipses. Solar eclipses occur at intervals of one, five, or six months, with no relationship between consecutive eclipses.

Yes, it's all quite confusing, but it's still a great show. And best of all... Ah well, I don't have to say it.
