

A Fort Wayne woman was released from jail Sunday after a Steuben County boating incident that threw nearly a dozen people into a lake and left a runaway motorboat circling the lake at about 30 mph, causing more damage and injury, officials said.

The woman, 20, was charged with boating while intoxicated causing injury and being a minor in possession of alcohol, conservation officers said in a news release.

Multiple agencies — including Indiana conservation officers, the Steuben County Sheriff's Department and Parkview Samaritan helicopter — responded to Lake Gage about 7:15 p.m. Saturday on reports that several people were in the water with serious injuries, the news release said.

Ten people were thrown from a 21-foot Correct Craft Ski Nautique when it "cut into a violent turn" while traveling at a "high rate of speed," the release said, including the driver who was operating the boat.

Several seriously injured people were immediately taken to shore by people on other boats so emergency responders could tend to the injuries, the release said.

Two people reportedly were flown to a hospital with injuries, including a

skull fracture and a partial lower-arm amputation. Others less seriously hurt were taken to Cameron Memorial Community Hospital in Angola.

Unmanned, the motorboat circled the lake and came closer to boats and docks with each circle, the release said.

Conservation Officer Jake Carlile launched a Department of Natural Resources patrol boat as sheriff's deputies urged residents to move their boats and clear the area, the release said.

Carlile threw a rope from the patrol boat to entangle the motorboat's propeller, the release said, and the boat struck a dock and changed direction, striking the back of the patrol boat and disabling the patrol boat's motor.

The rope slowed the motorboat, the release said, and Carlile used a nearby personal watercraft to jump onto the runaway boat while both were in motion. He then brought the motorboat to a stop.

Tick-borne Lyme disease exploding in Michigan

All it took was an unusual February warm spell this past week for the tiny insects causing an increasingly big problem in Michigan to become active once again, beginning their hunt for blood

"A student in the medical entomology lab just brought in six adult blacklegged ticks — three male and three female — that were collected by his dog (Tuesday) in Lansing," said Jean Tsao, an associate professor in Michigan State University's departments of fisheries and wildlife and large animal clinical sciences. The ticks are of interest because of what they often carry with them: the bacterium Borrelia burgdorferi. When the ticks bite an animal, seeking a blood meal, that bacteria can transfer. And that bacteria, in dogs, horses and humans, can cause Lyme disease, a serious affliction that can be permanently debilitating for people when it's not treated early and well.

There were fewer than 30 human cases of Lyme disease reported in Michigan in any year between 2000 and 2004. By 2009, the number had jumped to 90 reported cases. By 2013, it was 166 cases. That number could be very low. The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates the number of Lyme disease cases nationwide could be 10 times higher than what's actually reported. Because of Lyme disease's relative newness in Michigan, and because its early symptoms often mimic what

feels like the flu,infected people — and even their doctors — often don't test for it. Doctors also don't always report finding Lyme disease to their local public health department.

The Lyme disease spike in Michigan correlates with the spread of black-legged ticks here. In 1998, the ticks were established in only five counties — Berrien County in the southwestern-most Lower Peninsula, and four counties in the Upper Peninsula — and reported in 22 other counties. By 2016, however, the ticks were established in almost five times as many counties — established in 24 Michigan counties. Now ticks have overtaken the entirety of the Lake Michigan shoreline and becoming established to in the southern part of the state.

Why the increase is happening now, scientists can't say for sure. Lyme disease and the ticks that carry it have long been established on the East Coast, and Wisconsin and Minnesota have more than 10 times as many human cases of Lyme disease as Michigan.

Do a tick check

As the ticks that spread Lyme disease make their way across the state, Michigan residents need to adopt the precautions long in place in Lyme-ridden areas such as New England, Foster said. Avoid areas where ticks are likely present. Use repellents on clothing.

"The key is to make sure when you come back from being in these areas, do a tick check," he said. "Remove the ticks as quickly as you can. Even if bitten, if you can get it off before 24 hours, your chances of getting Lyme disease are almost none."

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services offers these tick tips:

On outdoor excursions where black-legged ticks could be present, use insect repellent that contains 20%-30% DEET.

Wear clothing that has been treated with permethrin.

Take a shower as soon as you can after coming indoors.

Look for ticks on your body. If a tick is attached to you, use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick at the surface of your skin. Pull the tick straight up and out. Don't twist or jerk the tick — this can cause the mouth parts to break off and stay in the skin.

Put your clothes in the dryer on high heat for 60 minutes to kill any remaining ticks

Hunters and anglers cannot get Lyme disease from dressing carcasses, or eating game meat, but are more likely to be in tick habitats.

Pets can become hosts for ticks and also become infected with Lyme disease and other tick-borne diseases. Topical flea and tick treatments are recommended, and a Lyme disease vaccination is available. Consult your veterinarian for more information.

STU'S STAR STUFF



Satellites and Other Flying Stuff

he International Space Station (ISS) is the most complex international scientific and engineering project in history and the largest structure humans have ever put into space. This high-flying satellite is a laboratory for new technologies and an observation platform for astronomical, environmental and geological research. As a permanently occupied outpost in outer space, it serves as a stepping-stone for further space exploration. This includes Mars, which NASA is now stating is its goal for human space exploration.

The space station flies at an average altitude of 248 miles above Earth. It circles the globe every 90 minutes at a speed of about 17,500 mph, or nearly 5 miles per second. In one day, the station travels about the distance it would take to go from Earth to the moon and back. The space station can rival the brilliant planet Venus in brightness and appears as a bright moving light across the night sky. It can be seen from Earth without the use of a telescope by night sky observers who know when and where to look.

Five different space agencies representing 15 countries built the \$100-billion International Space Station and continue to operate it today. NASA, Russia's Roscosmos State Corporation for Space Activities (Roscosmos), the European Space Agency, the Canadian Space Agency and the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency are the primary space agency partners on the project.

At about 356 feet across and 290 feet long, the space station, including its large solar arrays, spans the area of a football field, including the end zones, and weighs 861,804 lbs. not including visiting vehicles. The complex

now has more livable room than a conventional five-bedroom house, and has two bathrooms, gym facilities and a 360-degree bay window. Astronauts have also compared the space station's living space to the cabin of a Boeing 747 jumbo jet. There are nearly an acre of solar panels to provide electrical power to six state-of-the-art laboratories.

Along with the ISS, you can also look for China's Tiangong-1 space laboratory, which has hosted visiting crews on Shenzhou spacecraft in recent years. Also visible to the naked eye is the Hubble Space Telescope.


During summer here at the lake, the time that a satellite in a low-Earth-orbit (like the ISS) can remain illuminated by the sun can extend throughout the night - a situation that can never be attained during other times of the year. Because the ISS circles the Earth about every 90 minutes on average, this means that it's possible to see it not just on one singular pass, but for several consecutive passes.

Moreover, because the ISS revolves around the Earth in an orbit that is inclined 51.6-degrees to the equator, there are two types of passes that are visible.

In the first case (we'll call it a "Type I" pass), the ISS initially appears over toward the southwestern part of the sky and then sweeps over toward the northeast.

About seven or eight hours later, it becomes possible to see a second type of pass (we'll call it "Type II"), but this time with the ISS initially appearing over toward the northwestern part of the sky and sweeping over toward the southeast.

Type I passes will initially be visible in the morning hours, prior to



sunrise. By early July, Type I passes will be visible during the evening hours, just after sunset, while Type II passes will be occurring in the early morning. By late July, visibility of the Type II passes will have shifted into the evening hours.

More on the ISS and other manmade space stuff next week. Thanks to Dennis Tudor for the interesting question. Enjoy the show everyone. It's on me.
















Pasta and Popsicles off the Pier!

One Pot Creamy Chicken Bacon Veggie Pasta

Servings: 4-6

INGREDIENTS:

5 strips thick cut bacon, sliced 1 pound chicken breast, cubed

1 teaspoon seasoned salt

Pepper, to taste

1 small onion, sliced

 $\frac{1}{2}$ pound as paragus, cut into 1-inch long pieces

3 cloves garlic, minced

2 cups fresh spinach

1 cup sun-dried tomatoes, roughly chopped

6 cups milk

1 pound rotini pasta

1¼ cups shredded Parmesan cheese

PREPARATION:

1. In a large pot, crisp the bacon on medium heat. Drain excess grease so there's about 3 tablespoons left in the pot. Add in the chicken, season with half of the seasoned salt and pepper, and cook

2. Once the chicken is nicely browned, remove it from the pan but leave the bacon.

3. Add in the onion and asparagus. Stir until the onions begin to become translucent, then add the garlic and spinach. Stir until spinach is wilted, then add sun-dried tomatoes and season with remaining salt and pepper.

4. Pour milk over veggie and bacon mixture, and bring to a boil. Stir periodically so the bottom does not burn.

5. Once milk is bubbling, add pasta and stir frequently until pasta reaches your desired doneness (approximately 10 minutes at medium heat).

6. Stir in Parmesan cheese and mix until cheese is melted

Easy Breakfast Yogurt Popsicles

PREP TIME: 5 MINUTES
TOTAL TIME: 4 HOURS 5 MINUTES

INGREDIENTS:

• 1 Cup Greek Yogurt

- 1/2 Cup Milk
- 2 tsp Honey
- 1/2 Cup Granola
- 1 Cup Berries/chopped Fruits

PREPARATION:

- 1. Mix together the milk, yogurt and 1 tsp of the honey.
- 2. Divide the mixture between your popsicle molds.
- 3. Place a few berries into each mold.
- 4. Mix the last teaspoon of honey with the granola (you can place the honey in the microwave for 10sec if you are struggling to mix it) and top the yogurt with a little granola mixture.
- 5. Place a wooden ice cream stick into each mold and place the popsicles into the freezer for at least 4 hours before consuming.
- 6. To remove the popsicles, run the mold under a little hot water until they come loose.

his week at camp has been Around the World Week. We have so many different countries represented at camp this year, and it's been fun having our international staff share about their backgrounds. We have staff from Mexico, Peru, Brazil, England, Scotland, Ireland, France, Kenya, China, Cyprus, the Netherlands, Armenia, Egypt, and of course the United States. Plus this week we have two campers here from Myanmar (also known as Burma)! Next week we have a group of 5 campers coming from France for two weeks, and last week we had a camper from Singapore. So it's truly been an international summer at camp!

Next week is Christmas in July at camp, and to celebrate, we will be bringing the campers around Caroling on Thursday night! If you're home, please come out and listen to our kids serenade you. We will leave camp around 7:30pm, and one group will go around the cove and along the northwest side of the lake, and another group will go across the north shore,

and along the northeast side of the lake. We have a completely full camp, so there will be about 70 kids and 15-20 staff in each group!

We're nearly to our goal of 950 campers for the summer, with a total count so far of 943 campers registered. There are 3 sessions left of camp, but we only have spaces still available for the very last one, August 6-12. So if you're still thinking of sending a camper to camp, we have about 15 spots left for girls, and 3 spots left for boys for that last week. It's hard to believe that we're already down to our last three weeks! This summer has really been flying by.

At the pancake breakfast, we had several people ask about the teal and green long-sleeved Spirit shirts, and we were out of the adult sizes they were looking for. We just received another order of shirts, so if you'd like one, they're now in stock in the store. We also have green hoodies and crew neck sweatshirts, and teal camp t-shirts available in all sizes.

Next week on Tuesday evening, our Board of Directors is going to be joining our campers for dinner. We're excited for the board members to have a chance to see what mealtime is like at camp — especially with a completely full camp in the dining hall!

This week our facilities staff have been installing mailboxes at each cabin. Starting this week, we're going to deliver the campers' mail to their cabin doorsteps, and campers will have a chance to send intra-camp mail to one another using the mailboxes. In the past, we have sorted the mail in Main Lodge and the counselors picked it up here and then distributed to their cabins. We think it will be fun for the kids to receive mail right at the mailbox outside their cabin.

The next two weeks are going to be pretty wild and crazy at camp, with every single bed in camp filled! We have 138 campers next week (131 overnight + 7 day campers), and 142 the following week (131 overnight + 11 day campers). These are the two largest weeks of camp we've ever had, which means our staff is really on their toes!


