In Memory

A good life, well lived, with many long and deep friendships

Janet (Shulmier) Troeger (85) was born in South Bend on December 19, 1931, to Clyde and Nina Shulmier. Janet graduated from John Adams High School, attended DePauw University, was a member of the Pi Beta Phi sorority, and graduated from Indiana University with a Bachelor of Arts degree. While at Indiana University she began dating Jack Troeger, and they married the summer following her graduation in 1954. Janet taught school in Needmore, Indiana while Jack finished his senior year and Air Force ROTC.

The early years of her marriage involved Air Force postings in Texas; in Florida for Jack's pilot training; and in San Bernardino, California. After the Air Force experience, Janet returned to South Bend with Jack and raised a family of three boys. Moving to Swanson Highlands when that development was new, Janet and Jack developed deep friendships with other young couples there; friendships that have endured for decades. Janet was involved with volunteer organizations including the Junior League of South Bend, and was a lifelong learner and explorer. She would master a skill and then move on to conquer the next challenge, whether painting and photography, music, gardening, antiquing, skiing, tennis, golf, or real

estate. When the children were older, Janet obtained a paralegal degree from IUSB, and Janet attended Notre Dame law school just from a desire to learn; she later attended a real estate course out of curiosity and ended up having a successful career as a real estate agent. Janet and Jack were always active together: in the 1960's and 1970's they were avid snow skiers; in the 1970's and early 1980's they were keen tennis players, and in the 1990's their interests turned to golf. In addition to outdoor and sporting activities, Janet loved music, literature and art.

Birch Lake, Michigan, was long a center of summer activities for Janet. Her first connection with the lake was as a camper at Camp Tannadoonah. Janet and Jack rented Haines' (now DeCockers) on the east side in 1964 when the boys were quite young. Two years later they bought a lot on the south side (where the Williams' now live) and summered there for many years with their children. In 1988, with their children married and grandchildren arriving, Janet and Jack then built a place on the former Camp Kiloqua/ Birch Lake Basketball Camp property on the north shore (where the Seyfarths now live).

Janet and Jack took their first trip out of the United States when they were in their 50's, and enjoyed many more international travels and cruises after that, especially with their good friends Dick and Barb Green (Birch Lake south side). Following retirement, Janet and Jack wintered in Bonita Springs, Florida. They were inseparable until Jack's death late last summer.

Janet is survived by her three children Scott (Holly), Tim (Susan), and Steve (Jacque), nine grandchildren Stephanie, Tara, James, Amy, Ross, Sam, Victoria (Tory), Neil and Daniel, five great-grandchildren, Madelyn, Brady, Chase, Weston and Cole, and by her sisters Mary Ellen Shulmier and Marianne Hopkins. Janet was preceded in death by her parents Clyde and Nina Shulmier and by her brother Tom Shulmier (Pat). The family wishes to express our gratitude for the devoted care which Pam Shankle provided both to Janet and to Jack during the past several years.

In the 1940s Alex Byran and Cortland Heyniger used the start of their two names to come up with the Alcort company moniker. Their first boat was the Sailfish which was essentially a large surfboard with daggerboard, rudder and a lateen sail. The Sailfish could be bought finished or in kit form.

By 1951 Alcort was building the Sunfish which was wider and incorporated a cockpit. Like the Sailfish, the Sunfish was originally made out of wood and available as a kit. In 1959 the company began production of modern molded fiberglass hulls which are identical to the One Design (OD) Sunfish of today.

Birch Lake has sported a Sunfish fleet since the 1960s. In the hey day over twenty boats raced on weekends filling the lake with colorful sails.

Initial reflections on 'Score the Shore'

few weeks ago members of your Water Quality Committee, led by a senior aquatic biologist from Michigan's DEQ, utilizing the Cooperative Lakes Management Program's (CLMP) format, performed a "Score the Shore" procedure at Birch Lake.

In 1000-foot sections we assessed the shoreline using a number of criteria: Presence, location, predominance and types of plant life and erosion control systems.

In preparation for and as part of this process we learned (or were reminded of) a number of interesting, and hopefully worthwhile, facts. In no particular order we'll now share a number of them with you:

- 1. Birch Lake has approximately 15,500 feet (slightly less than 3 miles) of shore-line and/or property line(s) along the shore.
- 2. (Native) Plants in a lake, whether below, floating upon, or emerging from the water's surface, are good.
- 3. (Native) Plants at the shoreline, both in and out of the water, are good.
- 4. Permanent, fixed impervious (typically concrete or steel) sea walls are not desirable.
- 5. Better are rock or riprap retaining walls particularly if they are sloped (so a turtle could climb them) and plants grow between the rocks.
- 6. Best are shorelines with no retaining walls but very gradual slopes protected and held in place by native plants in the water, on the slope and above the sloped area
- 7. Downed trees and branches, when left in the shallows, like emergent plants,

protect against erosion and provide habitat for breeding and development of small fish and turtles, frogs, etc.

- 8. As you can see, in terms of protecting the shoreline, and the body of water it surrounds, the more natural the better.
 9. It makes some sense then that on Birch Lake the highest score was achieved by the section which included the camp's waterfront property.
- 10. This could lead to the conclusion that the overall best score might be awarded to a body of water untouched by humans. That status is not reasonably possible to attain here at Birch Lake. For this reason:
- a) Total scores are often considered relative to the amount of development (buildings and docks) along the shoreline.
- b) Any goals for maintaining and possibly improving our shoreline's status have to be tempered.
- c) Our present goal is only to educate.
 11. Virtually all shoreline either has some sort of protection against erosion or eventually will erode. (We noticed very little, if any, easily visible evidence of recent erosion along our shorelines.)
- 12. Mowed lawns growing to the edge of the water (or sea wall) are not optimum as they erode easily due to their shallow roots and do little to catch and block any contaminants washing in from further upland.
- 13. Native plantings 2' or so in height at or near a shoreline have the added advantage of decreasing the odds that geese will travel to the lawn on the other side of those plants.
- 14. If a property owner were ever motivated to permanently remove their



concrete or rock/riprap wall, there are natural products available to protect the newly exposed shoreline while natural plants take root and prosper on a more gradual slope.

So what was our score? 50, on a scale of 0-100.

What does that mean? How does that score stack up? We'll know best when we receive the formal CLMP report next winter, which will analyze our score relative to our amount of development, other lakes, etc. We are looking forward to sharing that information with you.


In the interim, the senior aquatic biologist with whom we worked has provided us with some general insights, which we hope to publish in another Barker issue in the near future.





STU'S STAR STUFF



Night to day, day to night

n spite of what you may have read on the internet, the 2017 Persied meteor shower is likely to be a bust. The current meme (a trending, yet stupid word) spouts such stuff as, "Brightest shower in human history" and "It will light up the whole sky," and "Night will appear as day."

Don't believe everything you read. Light from the waning gibbous moon will overpower all but the biggest meteorites entering our atmosphere. But it still might be worth a look anyway. Check it out tonight and the next night between 1 am and dawn for the best chances.

While meteors will never turn night into day, there is an event that can and will indeed turn day into night.

For about two minutes on the afternoon of August 21, the sky over Nashville will turn almost as dark as night. Ditto Casper, Wyoming; Columbia, South Carolina, and the southern suburbs of St. Louis. They will be darkened by one of nature's most spectacular events: a total solar eclipse. It may be the most-watched eclipse in history.

The eclipse takes place as the new Moon passes directly between Earth and the Sun. By an astronomical coincidence, the Moon and Sun appear almost exactly the same size in Earth's sky, allowing the Moon to completely cover the Sun. The sky will turn dark, the Sun's hot but faint outer atmosphere, the corona, will shine like silver tendrils around the intervening lunar disk and stars may be visible.

This eclipse is the first to cross the United States since 1979. It will begin over the Pacific Ocean, when the Moon's dark shadow first touches Earth. The shadow will reach the Oregon coastline at 10:16 am PDT, and

race southeastward before exiting over South Carolina at 2:49 pm EDT. The shadow will cross 11 states.

Totality will reach its maximum length of about 2 minutes, 40 seconds, over southern Missouri. The path of the eclipse will reach a maximum width of about 70 miles, with the eclipse lasting longest along the centerline of that path. Nashville is the largest city within the eclipse path, although parts of Kansas City and St. Louis will lie inside the shadow as well.

While the rest of the United States will miss out on the total phase of the eclipse, the entire country will experience a partial eclipse, where the Moon covers a part of the solar disk. From cities close to the eclipse path (such as Portland, Oregon, where the Moon will cover 99 percent of the Sun, or Atlanta, with 97 percent coverage), the sky will turn noticeably darker and the temperature will drop a bit.

Here at the lake the effect won't be as dramatic, but we should experience

75 - 85 percent coverage, enough to be noticeable. Keep in mind though, that just because we are not along the path of totality, sky watchers will still need eye protection to look at the eclipse.



WHITE PEACH SANGRIA

A refreshing white wine sangria that is always a hit at parties.

Ingredients:

Original recipe yields 6 servings

- 1 (750 milliliter) bottle dry white wine
- 3/4 cup peach flavored vodka
- 6 tablespoons frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed
- 1/4 cup white sugar
- · 1 pound white peaches, pitted and sliced
- 3/4 cup seedless red grapes, halved
- 3/4 cup seedless green grapes, halved
- Add all ingredients to list

Directions:

- 1. In a large pitcher, combine dry white wine, peach vodka, lemonade concentrate and sugar. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Add sliced peaches, red and green grapes.
- 2. Refrigerate sangria until well chilled, at least 2 hours, or overnight to blend flavors. Serve over ice, and use a slotted spoon to include sliced peaches and grapes with each serving.

EASY PEACH CRISP

Ingredients:

- 4 cups sliced fresh peaches
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup cold butter
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- · 1 cup rolled oats

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- 2. Arrange peaches evenly in an 8 x 8-inch baking dish.
- 3. Mix flour, brown sugar, butter, cinnamon, and salt in a bowl using a pastry cutter until evenly crumbled. Fold oats into flour mixture; sprinkle and press topping into peaches.
- 4. Bake in the preheated oven until topping is lightly browned, about 30 minutes.






