Safety notice

Felony assault, Georges Café, Zimmyville, Porter Twp. — Cass County

Sheriff Joseph Underwood recently reported that on July 20 his deputies responded to an assault at George's Cafe. Witnesses at the bar told deputies that a 53-year-old Union man, whose name withheld pending arraignment, walked into the bar with a rifle and threatened them. Some of the patron were able to disarm the suspect and detain him until deputies arrived and placed him under arrest. Deputies recovered the weapon, described as a .22 caliber semi-auto rifle, and seized it for evidence. The weapon was not loaded and none of the patrons present reported any injuries. This incident remains under investigation.

— Water Quality Report — The threat on your hook

TISHERPERSONS: A threat to our lake may be on your hook A recent press release issued by Michigan's Department of Natural Resources tells a story about the red swamp crayfish, which is an invasive and prohibited species desirable to some for use as bait. Evidence of its existence in an Ottawa County lake was recently discovered.

This species of crayfish is highly invasive, eats a range of food items, and

burrows into shorelines causing significant structural damage. They can survive drought and migrate up to two miles. Females lay up to 600 eggs at a time and reproduce up to two times per year.

Since this species is outlawed for use as bait, we presume it wasn't, or isn't, available at (law-abiding) bait shops. The DNR has determined that anglers have been purchasing them (live) from food markets.



Moral of the story? While fishing in our State, especially Birch Lake, please use only approved bait. If you buy it from an established bait shop, your odds that it's legal and non-invasive, are pretty good. If unsure,




inquire at the bait store as to whether or not their bait is approved. If still unsure, consider visiting Michigan.gov/fishing and click on the "Aquatic Invasive Species" button.



The Mythology of the Constellations

We talked about many of the prominent constellations we are so lucky to be able to see here at the lake, so far away from city light pollution. The Big and Little Dipper, Leo, Taurus and The Pink Flamingo to name only a few. There are many more. What kind of history do they have?

Most ancient cultures saw pictures in the stars of the night sky. The earliest known efforts to catalogue the stars date to cuneiform texts and artifacts dating back roughly 6000 years. These remnants, found in the valley of the Euphrates River, suggest that the ancients observing the heavens saw the lion, the bull, and the scorpion in the stars. The constellations as we know them today are undoubtedly very different from those first few--our night sky is a compendium of images from a number of different societies, both ancient and modern. By far, though, we owe the greatest debt to the mythology of the ancient Greeks and Romans.

The earliest references to the mythological significance of the Greek constellations may be found in the works of Homer, which probably date to the 7th century B.C. In the Iliad, for instance, Homer describes the creation of Achilleus's shield by the craftsman god Hephaistos:

"On it he made the earth, and sky, and sea, the weariless sun and the moon waxing full, and all the constellations that crown the heavens, Pleiades and Hyades, the mighty Orion and the Bear, which men also call by the name of Wain: she wheels round in the same place and watches for Orion, and is the only one not to bathe in Ocean".

At the time of Homer, however, most of the constellations were not associated with any particular myth, hero, or god. They were instead known simply as the objects or animals which they represented--the Lyre, for instance, or the Ram. By the 5th century B.C., most of the constellations had come to be associated with myths, and the Catasterismi of Eratosthenes completed the mythologization of the stars. "At this stage, the fusion between astronomy and mythology is so complete that no further distinction is made between them"--the stars were no longer merely identified with certain gods or heroes, but actually were perceived as divine.

Despite the many mentions of the stars in Greek and early Roman texts, by far the most thorough star catalogue from ancient times belongs to the Roman Ptolemy of Alexandria, who grouped 1022 stars into 48 constellations during the 2nd century A.D. Although Ptolemy's Almagest does not include the constellations which may only be seen from the southern hemisphere, it forms the basis for the modern list of 88 constellations officially designated by the International Astronomical Union. The influence of both the Greek and Roman cultures may be plainly seen; the myths behind the constellations date back to ancient Greece, but we use their Latin names.

Mythology, of course, influenced the naming of many objects in the night sky, not just the constellations. The planets all bear names from Roman mythology which reflect their characteristics: Mercury, named for the speedy messenger god, revolves fastest around the sun; Venus, named for the goddess of love and beauty, shines most brightly; Mars, named for the god of war, appears blood-red; Jupiter, named

for the single most important god, is the largest planet in our solar system. Even the names of the Galilean moons of Jupiter (the four largest, which may be seen with even a small telescope) are drawn from mythology. Io, Europa, Ganymede, and Callisto were all desired--and taken by force--by Jupiter. It is ironic that the mythological characters mythological women the king of the gods so ardently pursued now revolve around him.

We'll pick a few constellations in the coming weeks and learn their stories. If there are any in particular that you wonder about, please let me know.

— Dana on Drugs –

Don't skip the directions on Osteoporosis meds!

steoporosis consists of a structural breakdown of the bone tissue and resulting loss of bone strength. Our bodies are constantly breaking down old bone and replacing it with new bone.

Osteoporosis, then, occurs when the breakdown of old bone occurs more quickly than the creation of new bone.

Generally, the first three decades of life are characterized by bone building. After age 30 and prior to menopause, bone breakdown and bone replenishment are equal. After menopause, bone breakdown becomes predominant.

As a result of osteoporosis, our bones become more brittle and more susceptible to breakage.

In order to counter the effects of osteoporosis, increasing weight-bearing exercise, calcium, and vitamin D may be useful. Also, limiting caffeine, alcohol, and tobacco can help to naturally strengthen your bones.

However, these adjustments alone are typically insufficient for reliably strengthening the bone. Almost all people with osteoporosis will need to utilize prescription medication in order to fully strengthen their bones.

The drugs of choice for strengthening the bones are called "bisphosphonates."

Drugs in this class of medication include alendronate (Fosamax), ibandronate (Boniva), and risendronate (Actonel, Atelvia). These medications work to inhibit bone breakdown, which allows your body to rebuild its bone mass. By blocking bone breakdown and allowing for new bone to build, bisphosphonates reduce the risk of fractures by 45-55 percent!

While these medications work wonders on the bone, they don't come without some side effects. The most common side effects of bisphosphonates are nausea/upset stomach, and inflammation of the esophagus.

While typically well tolerated, in rare instances very troublesome side effects have occurred (and they are seriously nasty!). When bisphosphonates are taken incorrectly, you put yourself at increased risk of esophageal ulcers, jaw necrosis, and abnormal bone fractures! To prevent these serious side effects from occurring, it is important to follow the administration instructions! To protect your esophagus, take these medications with a full glass of water (ONLY WATER, NOT COFFEE OR MILK), on an empty stomach at least 30-60 minutes before food or medications (including calcium), and remain upright (sitting or standing) for 30 minutes after taking.

While this procedure sounds bothersome, bisphosphonates are only taken once weekly, and some are even designed for once monthly use. Plus, these medications are not life-time medications. They are typically used for 5-10 years, and then discontinued.

Further, bisphosphonates have a "half-life" of 10 years, which means that it takes 10 years for half of the drug to be eliminated from your body. The long half-life of bisphosphonates is what allows you to take them for a short period of time, and have lasting effects.

Thus, the annoyance of taking the medication will be short-lived and worth the extra effort.







RECIPES

- 2 cups boiling water
- 2 cups cold water
- 1 (8 ounce) container whipped topping
- 2 cups graham cracker crumbs
- 1/4 cup teddy bear-shaped graham snacks, or as needed
- cocktail umbrellas

Directions:

 Stir berry-flavored gelatin and boiling water together in a bowl until gelatin is dissolved, about 2 minutes. Stir in cold water until evenly mixed. Pour gelatin mixture into small cups about 3/4-full. Refrigerate until set, 2 to 3 hours.
 Fill a plastic bag with whipped topping and cut 1 bottom corner of the bag; pipe whipped topping onto each gelatin cup. Sprinkle graham cracker crumbs onto the whipped topping until fully covered, creating 'sand'. Arrange bear-shaped graham snacks on the 'sand'. Place an umbrella in the sand.

Nearing the end of the season

e're nearing the end of the 2015 camp season! It's hard to believe that we're in our 6th session, and have just one more week of camp to go.

Make sure you mark your calendars for next Friday, August 7, for the end of the summer candlelight ceremony! Our campers will be coming down the waterfront stairs between 9 and 9:30 pm carrying their candles. We'll gather on the pier and serenade all those who come out in their boats.

Also on August 7, we have our end of the year Order of the Birch ceremony. The Order of the Birch is the highest honor that a camper can earn in their time at Camp T. They have to be going into at least the 7th grade, have attended camp for at least 5 summers, and complete a list of requirements throughout the week they come to camp. Those requirements include being a model camper, keeping their bunk neat and clean, doing a service project for camp, trying each activity at least once, going to an early morning activity every day (such as polar bear or morning running), leading sing one evening, and writing a poem or song about what camp means to them. On the last Friday of the summer, we have a special torch ceremony where they receive their award. If you've never been to a Council Fire or seen the torch ceremony, please feel free to come up to camp on Friday night around 7:15 to see it! We sing songs, hand out awards for activities, show a photo slideshow of the week, and honor the Order of the Birch campers at the very end. Then we all line up to get candles and proceed to the waterfront for the candlelight serenade. It's a pretty special night!

On Tuesday night next week (August 4) we will be walking around the lake and singing. If you're home, please come out in the back yard to hear our campers! They love to sing camp songs for everyone. We usually make it as far as Niezgodski's on the west side and as far as Garceau's on the east side before turning back to camp.

It looks like we're going to wrap up the season with a grant total of 848 campers, which is 30 more than we had last year. Compared to my first summer, when we finished the summer with 351 campers, that's 142 percent growth over 10 years! We've been completely full, or very close to full, for the final four weeks of the summer.


This week at camp is our sportsthemed week. We divided all the campers into red and blue teams on Sunday when they arrived, and each night's evening activity has matched up the red and blue teams in some form of athletic competition.

On Sunday night we played "Big Base," which is a version of kickball. On Tuesday night we played a series of sports stations, including "Go for the Gold" (similar to ultimate Frisbee), soccer, basketball, archery, and volleyball. Wednesday night we played a new game called Circle Rules Football, and Thursday night was Camper's Choice. We also set it up so that the blue team sat on one side of the dining hall, and the red team on the other during dinner, to get them excited for the evening's games! It made for an exciting, competitive week!
