

of a shade variety of grass seed. All of this work is in the north, east and south perimeter of the existing parking area. Prime Properties is doing the work.

The grass seed will be covered with straw to retain moisture for good germination and minimize erosion. We need 400 ft of garden hose and 3 additional volunteers to do the watering of the grass seed to help insure getting a good stand of grass in the reclaimed areas. New grass seed needs to be kept moist and this will require watering twice a day for at least 3 weeks.

If you have been looking for a sucker to take that old garden hose off your hands because you did not have the courage to put a non-biodegradable item in landfill, this is your opportunity. I'll do everything I can to recycle them when we are done. Or, if you have hose you want back after the work is done, I'll commit to getting the hose back to you.

Now, let me be very clear. I don't want junk. I need hoses with good couplers including good rubber washers in the coupling (female) end. The male end should not be bent or damaged either so that it does not seat completely and correctly when connected to another hose. I don't want leaky hoses, either. Candidates should be a hose in good working order that you have been wanting to replace for various reasons. I bet garages around here are full of them.

I thought we would work in two teams of two people. We can work out a schedule when we get closer to the seeding time expected to be the week of August 17 or 24.

Volunteers to water and donate or lend us hoses should contact Fred Freihofer on our house phone 269-476-9823 or email me at cdfreihofer@aol.com as soon as possible. Volunteers will be put through a rigorous physical test and background check (JK). Leave a message if we don't answer with a good time to reach you, and I'll get back to you.


As summer comes into full ripeness an odd requirement for the Commodore is showering thanks on the many who help keep the good ship BLYC going.


The task is too large for any one person but ... many hands make light(er) work and all that. Clearly many helped plan, plant, water and pull a few weeds. Birch is bountiful!





<u> Water Quality Report — </u>

Phosphorus and lawn fertilizer

Por many years, to her credit and our benefit, Gert Temple found and maintained a supply of phosphorus-free fertilizer in the hope that lake residents who chose to fertilize would only do so without adding phosphorus to our lake's ecosystem. Phosphorus is already, in almost all cases, in an excessively abundant supply.

While most growing plants don't need more phosphorus than what is already available to them in their habitat, submerged plant systems require some 1,000 times less phosphorus than those above ground to stimulate a comparable amount of growth. There is already phosphorus present in many forms of the submerged vegetation itself as well as in the sediment at the lake bottom. Too much phosphorus will cause algae and weeds to grow wildly, choke up the waterway and use up large amounts of precious oxygen. The result may be death of many fish and aquatic organisms. This unnatural accelerating process, "cultural eutrophication", is due to, among other things, man's addition of phosphorus to, and stirring up of phosphorous-laden sediments at the bottom of, the water.

Phosphorus was a key ingredient of widespread algae blooms in western Lake Erie last August that disrupted water supplies to 400,000 people.

Now the Good News! As the dangers and risks associated with phosphorus became better known, earlier in this decade a number of Great Lakes States, including Wisconsin and Michigan, outlawed the use of phosphorus in lawn fertilizers. (There are two specific exceptions: for fertilizing a new lawn and/or to treat lawn areas whose soil has been tested and found to be phosphorus deficient.) As a result, all the national fertilizer manufacturers eliminated phosphates from their typical fertilizers.

I looked up a dozen or so common lawn fertilizers on the internet and found only one that contained any phosphorus.

Indiana did not pass such a law. Whenever the state chemist is asked by a legislator for assistance in writing such a ban, the chemist does some research and reports that lawn fertilizers containing phosphorus are virtually non-existent throughout the State of Indiana. So while it would be extra insurance to check the fertilizer you buy and make sure its middle number, the one representing the phosphorus content, is zero, be assured that probably it will be, and that your lawn fertilizer probably won't by itself bring any more phosphorus into our Birch Lake.



It is still preferred that all fertilizers, even those without phosphorus, be kept out of and away from the lake. If you must use it, please respect a 10', 20' or more buffer from the water's edge. If you utilize a landscaper or other fertilizer applicator, please make sure they avoid phosphorus fertilizer and keep all fertilizers from one day washing into our lake.

Thanks again to Gert for her pioneering wisdom and efforts on our Lake's behalf for all those years. In this regard the world has caught up to her and made largely unnecessary the stocking and sale of special phosphorus-free fertilizers for lake residents.





STU'S STAR STUFF



Slob spawns Perseid meteors to shower ...

ike all comets, Swift-Tuttle is a bit of a slob. As it loops around the Sun, some of its icy surface vaporizes, releasing bits of rock and dust into space. The comet dust spreads out along Swift-Tuttle's orbit, forming clumps of debris.

That's a good thing for those of us here at the lake who like to watch the night sky, because those clumps turn into the Perseid meteor shower, which is underway for the next few nights.

Every year at this time, Earth crosses the comet's orbit. Grains of dust streak into the atmosphere at tens of thousands of miles an hour. They vaporize, forming the streaks of light known as meteors or shooting stars.

Just how many meteors will streak across the sky in a given year depends in large part on where Swift-Tuttle is. More material congregates near the comet, so the Perseids are better when Swift-Tuttle is close by.

It was closest to the Sun in the early 1990s, so the Perseids put on some great displays back then. But today, the comet is far away from the Sun, and the stream of comet dust is thinning out, so the Perseids aren't quite as busy.

Even in down years, though, the Perseids put on a pretty good show. This year, for example, you might see a couple of dozen meteors per hour. The view is enhanced because the Moon is a thin crescent, and it doesn't rise until a couple of hours before dawn. With no moonlight to overpower the faint meteors, the Perseids are well worth a try this weekend.

What else?

The stars that aren't shooting all look like they're fixed on the dome of the night sky; they don't change position from night to night, or even century to century. But that's only because they're so far away. In reality, the stars all streak around the galaxy like race cars on a dry track. (We've talked about our motion through the universe before, right?)

Consider Betelgeuse, a bright orange star that stands to the lower right of the Moon at dawn tomorrow.

The star marks the shoulder

of Orion, the hunter. It's held that spot since long before people began drawing the constellations. And it will stay there for tens of thousands of years longer.

Yet Betelgeuse is moving in a hurry. Just how big of a hurry depends on how far away from us it is. A space telescope designed to measure stellar distances found that Betelgeuse is about 640 lightyears away. But other measurements say there's a lot of uncertainty in that number.

If the distance is 640 lightyears, then Betelgeuse is moving away from us at more than 50,000 miles per hour, or nearly 14 miles per second.

Despite that quick pace, Betelgeuse won't disappear from view anytime soon. It's one of the biggest, brightest stars in our region of the galaxy. Sometime in the next million years or so, it will explode as a supernova. It'll still be so close to Earth that it will shine

as brightly as the full Moon for several weeks. (Like Mars does every summer when the internet gets a fancy to have it do so). After that, it'll spend many months fading away and eventually disappear in the depths of the Milky Way.

I'd recommend not staying up waiting for that part of the show. Take a peek at the rest of the show during the pleasant summer evenings we've been enjoying here at the lake and I'll pick up the tab. Buy me a beer next time we cross paths.

How to treat low blood sugar

nybody who is diabetic, or cares for someone who is diabetic, should know how to treat low blood sugar. Causes of low blood sugar include too much insulin, skipping a meal, eating less than usual, excessive alcohol consumption, or increased physical activity. A person is considered to have "low blood sugar" if they give a blood sugar reading that is less than 70 mg/dl.

Recognizing the symptoms of low blood sugar can allow for early treatment. Symptoms of low blood sugar include dizziness, tremor, heart palpitations, sweating, tingling of lips/tongue, headache, mood changes, irritability, blurry vision, fatigue, and difficulty concentrating. If symptoms are not recognized in time, blood sugar could drop dangerously low resulting in loss of consciousness, seizures, or death.

The Rule of 15

To treat low blood sugar, simply follow the "rule of 15."

First, the person being treated should ingest 15 grams of quickly dissolving carbohydrates.

Examples include regular soda (die

Examples include regular soda (diet soda will not work), orange juice, 1 tablespoon of table sugar or honey, 4-5 glucose tablets, etc.

After eating 15 grams of carbohydrate, wait 15 minutes, and recheck blood sugar. If blood sugar is still less than 70, repeat the procedure. Continue this technique of eating 15 fifteen grams of carbohydrates and waiting 15 minutes until blood sugar is above 70 and symp-

toms resolve.

Extra caution should be taken for diabetics who are on a "beta blocker," as these can mask the symptoms of low blood sugar, making it more difficult to recognize.

Beta blockers are medications that work to lower your blood pressure and heart rate. Beta blockers end in "-lol," and include metoprolol, bisoprolol, timolol, carvedilol, atenolol, propranolol, nebivolol, nadolol, and acebutolol.

Luckily, there is one symptom of low blood sugar that is not masked by beta blockers: sweating/clammy hands. Diabetics on beta blockers should check their blood sugar as a precaution if sweating, or clammy hands are noticed — it could be a sign of more than just nervousness!

In conclusion, if you are a diabetic experiencing symptoms associated with low blood sugar, follow the rule of 15, and your blood sugar will shortly return to normal.

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



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
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








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Grilled Parmesan Zucchini

This is a summer favorite at my house. So easy and tasty, and complements steak, ribs, chicken or fish. By the way, these can be done in the oven under the broiler as well.

Original recipe makes 4 servings

Ingredients:

3 zucchini

3 tablespoons butter, softened

2 cloves garlic, minced

1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley

1/2 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese

Directions:

Preheat an outdoor grill for medium-high heat, and lightly oil the grate.

Cut the zucchini in half crosswise, then slice each half into 3 slices lengthwise, making 6 slices per

zucchini

Mix the butter, garlic, and parsley in a bowl, and spread the mixture on both sides of each zucchini slice. Sprinkle one side of each slice with Parmesan cheese, and place the slices, cheese sides up, crosswise on the preheated grill to keep them from falling through.

Grill the zucchini until the cheese has melted and the slices are cooked through and show grill marks, about 8 minutes.


