BLYC parking area

The BLYC board of directors approved a quote to do the work to reclaim parking spaces at BLYC.

The work is to commence the week of August 10 and will include removing overgrown brush, small and large trees, dead trees, stump removal and planting of a shade variety of grass seed. All of this work is in the north, east and south perimeter of the existing parking area. Prime Properties is doing the work.

The grass seed will be covered with straw to retain moisture for good germination and minimize erosion. We need 400 ft of garden hose and 3 additional volunteers to do the watering of the grass seed to help insure getting a good stand of grass in the reclaimed areas. New grass seed needs to be kept moist and this will require watering twice a day for at least 3 weeks.







The Dog Days of Winter?

The "dog days." I always thought, were those summer days so devastatingly hot that even dogs would lie around on the grass, panting.

Many people today use the phrase to mean something like that, but originally, the phrase actually had nothing to do with dogs, or even with the lazy days of summer. Instead, it turns out, the dog days refer to the dog star, Sirius, and its position in the heavens.

To the Greeks and Romans, the dog days occurred around the day when Sirius appeared to rise just before the sun, in late July. They referred to these days as the hottest time of the year, a period that could bring fever, or even catastrophe.

If you go back even as far as Homer, The Iliad is referring to Sirius as Orion's dog rising, and it describes the star as being associated with war and disaster. All throughout Greek and Roman literature, you find such references.

The phrase "dog days" was translated from Latin to English about 500 years ago. Since then, it has taken on new meanings.

Now people come up with other explanations for why they're called the 'dog days' of summer, such as, "this is when dogs can go crazy."

This is a very human tendency. When we don't know the origin of a phrase, we come up with a plausible explanation. Or sometimes a ridiculous one. Remember "Indiana Standard Time?" Perfect example.

The meaning has been lost, but the phrase has lived on.

So, did the Greeks get it right? Are the dog days, around when Sirius rises, really the hottest days of the year?

Well, no.

Although July and August are generally known as the hottest months of the year in the Northern Hemisphere, the hottest period can vary from year to year. And depending on your latitude, the astronomical dog days can come at different times.

In Athens, for instance, Sirius will rise around the middle of August this year. But farther south, it'll happen earlier in the year; farther north, it'll happen later. There's another reason that the dog days don't correspond neatly with the heat: the stars in Earth's night sky shift independently of our calendar seasons.

As we've learned before, our Earth is like a spinning top. If you toss it onto a table, (the top, not the Earth), after it slows down the pointing direction of the top will slowly go around in circles. Similarly to a top, the Earth's rotation is kind of wobbling around, an effect we know as precession.

The calendar is fixed according to certain events, such as Arbor Day and Deb's birthday, but the stars have shifted according to the way that the Earth wobbles. So in about 50-some years, the sky shifts about one degree.

This means that the dog days of ancient Greece aren't the dog days of today. What it also means is that several millennia from now, this astrological event won't even

occur during the summer.

In 26,000 years, the dog days would completely move all around the sky. Roughly 13,000 years from now, Sirius will be rising with the sun in mid-winter.

Ah yes, the dog days of winter. When it's so cold that even the dogs lie around the fire, trying to stay warm.

Look for Sirius, the brightest star in the night sky, in the east during predawn hours this week. It should be easy to spot among the other participants in the show.

— Water Quality Report — Bladder boats making waves

The following is a reprint of the lead article in Michigan Lake and Stream Associations, Inc.'s June Newsletter:

Popularity of Wake Enhancing Boats Causing Increased Damage to Waterfront Property and Natural Areas on Michigan Waters by <u>SCOTT BROWN</u> ML&SA Executive Director

Michigan Lake and Stream Associations has received an increasing number of phone calls and e-mails in the past two summers from lakefront property owners expressing concern about the collateral damage rendered to docks, boats and natural shorelines by wake enhancing boats operating on Michigan's inland lakes. Wake boarding and surfing has increased in popularity in recent years and with it has come a boom in sales of wake enhancing boats designed to create large, high energy waves. Nationwide, sales of boats used for wake surfing and similar watersports increased by 14.6% last year. Increased sales of wake enhancing boats in the past couple of years has helped revive the ski-boat industry following the Great Recession, according to Jay Povlin, Vice- President of Sales and Marketing for Vonore, Tennessee-based MasterCraft.

Modern wake enhancing boats are designed with variable ballast systems which allows users to pump water into and out of ballast tanks from the surrounding water. Increasing the volume of ballast water drastically increases the boat's displacement which consequently enlarges the wake produced. The potential for damage to docks and moored boats as well as the probability of shoreline erosion increases with the wake boat displacement, hull size, overall weight, and speed. In addition, the operation of wake enhancing boats may also create



choppy and/or unpredictable conditions that are hazardous to small water craft such a kayaks and lightweight fishing boats.

Ballast laden wake enhancing boats are capable of producing wave heights, frequencies and durations that dramatically exceed those produced on inland lakes during even the most intense



summer thunderstorms and/or high winds.

The increasing negative impact resulting from the operation of wake enhancing boats on inland lake fish and wildlife habitat, water quality and on personal shoreline property strongly suggests that the operation of these boats on Michigan inland waters may require increased state regulation in the near future.

In the interim, Michigan Lake and Stream Associations recommends the following operating guidelines which are intended to help minimize lakefront property damage and the ecological impact of wake boats. Wake enhancing boat operators should be advised to:

- Reduce their operating speed within 300 feet of shore;
- Not add ballast water or other extra weight to their boats;Not operate their boats near sandy areas, wetlands or lake-
- front residences;

• Avoid turning their boats in tight circles (tight circles increase wave height and frequency);

- Avoid operating their wake boats in shallow water and/or near natural shorelines $% \left({{{\mathbf{x}}_{i}}} \right)$

Inclusion of the above article in today's Barker is not meant to imply any criticism of either of the two Birch Lake families we know of that presently have, and occasionally use, such boats. In fact, from our perspective, both families deserve our thanks and congratulations for their efforts to be mindful of our lake and its inhabitants. Our goal in broaching this subject (other than being a reminder to those who are already familiar with the effects of bladder boats) is to educate in advance any and all who otherwise may one day consider buying or using a bladder boat on our relatively small and peaceful lake.

There are other, larger, more suitable bodies of water upon which one can exercise their right to own and operate such a potentially disruptive mechanism. If that's not a viable option for you, and your need to make waves must be abated, please be thoughtful of your neighbors and our shared environment. At a minimum, please follow the five guidelines listed within the article.

We have been told the frequent use of bladder boats on a nearby lake has increased frustration and anger, and reduced civility, to a point that those on shore have literally thrown stones at some wave-making machines as they go by. Certainly increased damages to docks, boats, shorelines, fish and wildlife habitats and water quality would all be sad and lamentable possible results of improper and/or excessive use of bladder boats, and contrary to the very altruistic reasons we come to our lake. Should any of us ever regress to the stone-throwing behavior we have heard of, most tragic would be the fact that this great gift from God (Birch Lake) might have indirectly become a factor in the loss of our humanity towards each other while here.





— Camp Tannadoonah — Thanks everyone!

Thank you to everyone who joined us at the Hog Roast last Saturday! We are very grateful to the band, Strawberry Fields, who donated their time to perform at this event. What an awesome job they did! They also brought some friends to perform, and they did a great job as well.

We had approximately 225 people who attended the Hog Roast this year, and there was an amazing array of food. I wanted to try a little bit of everything!

Thank you to everyone who contributed a dish, and spent time at camp with us.

After the Hog Roast we were talking about how many meals we served at camp this summer, and it got us all thinking about the vast amount of food we go through each summer. We calculated that Miss Peggy and her kitchen staff prepared food for over 20,000 servings over the course of the summer.

We had an average of 106 campers per week for 8 weeks, plus 35 staff each week, and we serve 18 meals per week (Sunday dinner through Saturday breakfast). So 106+35=141 people per meal, multiplied by 18 meals per week, multiplied by 8 weeks = 20,304, plus a week of staff training (35 people x 18 meals = 630) = a grand total of 20,934 servings for the summer! WOW!

Even more amazing is how good the food is! We get so many compliments from campers and parents about the food at Camp, especially compared to other camps they have attended. We always have plenty of food, and there are fresh fruits and vegetables on the table every day, and a salad bar with dinner every night. Of course, it's "kid food" – meaning meals that appeal to kids – but it's still quite tasty!

The past couple years we have also had a camp garden to supplement the fresh food options. We have tomatoes, peppers, beans, cucumbers, zucchini, celery, lettuce, beets, rhubarb, cantaloupe, garlic, onions, snap peas, edamame... and more that I can't remember!


My mom, Sherry, does a fantastic job taking care of the garden at camp all summer. I plant most everything in the spring before she arrives from Arizona, and then she takes over the weeding, watering, and tending. We don't use any chemicals or fertilizers, other than neem oil to keep the beetles out. That way we don't have to worry if a camper or staff member eats something straight out of the garden without washing it!

Unfortunately this year with the cool rainy weather at the start of the summer, most of the garden didn't ripen until the very end of the camp season. We did enjoy plenty of beans and cucumbers and zucchini, but the tomatoes and peppers came on very late this year. I'll be harvesting and canning for quite a while this fall! I'm looking forward to lots of salsas, pickles, tomato sauce, pickled beets, pepper jellies, etc.

Don't forget that next weekend is the BLYC Fall Dinner at camp! Look forward to seeing everyone there.
