reclaim parking spaces at BLYC.

The work is to commence the week of August 10 and will include removing overgrown brush, small and large trees, dead trees, stump removal and planting of a shade variety of grass seed. All of this work is in the north, east and south perimeter of the existing parking area. Prime Properties is doing the work.

The grass seed will be covered with straw to retain moisture for good germination and minimize erosion. We need 400 ft of garden hose and 3 additional volunteers to do the watering of the grass seed to help insure getting a good stand of grass in the reclaimed areas. New grass seed needs to be kept moist and this will require watering twice a day for at least 3 weeks.

If you have been looking for a sucker to take that old garden hose off your hands because you did not have the courage to put a non-biodegradable item in landfill, this is your opportunity. I'll do everything I can to recycle them when we are done. Or, if you have hose





Water Quality Report

Purple Loosestrife Management Program

The Birch Lake Water Quality Committee started the Purple Loosestrife Management Program in 2000. The program has been very effective. In 2000 we had 10 sites located on all shores of the lake, some of which were very dense. We continue to monitor for Purple Loosestrife each year and remove the plants that we find. The Plants bloom toward the end of July and into September. If you see, or suspect you see, the plant, please call a Water Quality Committee member to have it checked out. So far this year Bruce Wagner has removed small amounts at a couple of the usual sites and also at a couple of new sites.

Purple Loosestrife is a plant that was accidentally introduced to the United States and distributed as an ornamental. It is most easily identified during the flowering season. This spiked-shaped purple pinkish flower can be seen above the water level in ditches, streams, rivers, lakes, and other moist shallow water

sites. This plant is an upright hardy perennial four to eight feet tall and most often found in arouns

Effects:

Purple Loosestrife invades marshes, ditches and lakeshores quickly replacing native wetland plants. These plants form dense stands that wildlife can not

Spread:

Purple Loosestrife will grow from the roots of an established plant, however the plants spread mainly by seed. Having up to 300,000 per stalk, these tiny seeds can live in the soil and water for many years and can be transported great distances by humans, animals and water.





STU'S STAR STUFF



Popular misconceptions in astronomy

he night sky tonight and on any clear night offers an ever-changing display of fascinating objects you can see, from stars and constellations to bright planets, often the moon, and sometimes special events like meteor showers. Observing the night sky can be done with no special equipment, although a sky map can be very useful, and a good beginner telescope or binoculars will enhance some experiences and bring some otherwise invisible objects into view.

Which reminds me of a story...

One night, during a public viewing night at the Brooklyn College Observatory in New York, the telescope was pointed right at Venus, which was displaying a delicate crescent shape at the time. Yet, one student gazing through the telescope eyepiece stubbornly insisted that he was really looking at the moon. When it was pointed out that the moon wasn't even in the sky, the student replied, "So what? Doesn't a telescope show you things you can't see without it?"

That makes me think about a number of popular misconceptions in astronomy. Here's a couple of my own personal favorites:

IST. I'm not going to say any more on that. Can artificial satellites really be seen with the unaided eye?

Most definitely! In fact, many people are surprised that an object orbiting hundreds of miles above our heads can be readily seen without the use of binoculars or a telescope. From the launch of the first satellite, Sputnik, in 1957 to the present, the number of satellites in space has grown at a spectacular rate. There are now over 10,000 satellites orbiting the Earth.

British astronomer Desmond King-Hele once noted that a satellite, "looks like a star that has taken leave of its senses and decided to move off to another part of the sky."

If you go out and carefully study the sky near dusk or dawn, the odds are that you should not have to wait more than 15 minutes before you see a satellite now in orbit. Most are too faint to be seen with the unaided eye, but a few hundred are large enough and low enough (100 to 400 miles above Earth) to be seen.

Satellites are seen at night because they are illuminated by the sun. A satellite entering the Earth's shadow immediately vanishes from view and pursues an unseen path until it again emerges into full sunlight.

The International Space Station is by far the brightest man-made object traveling around the planet. Orbiting the Earth at an average altitude of 220 miles, it can appear to move as fast as a high-flying airliner, taking about two to five minutes to cross the sky. It can easily be confused with aircraft lights, though at its brightest the space station can sometimes appear to rival even Venus in brilliance.

Why isn't the North Star the brightest star? When I was a young, I remember an uncle who took me out on a balmy summer evening, pointed to a brilliant blue-white star directly overhead and said: "See that? That's the North Star" (I later would learn that it was actually Vega, the fifth brightest star in the entire sky).

Polaris, the North Star is probably the most important star visible in the northern sky, but many people are under the mistaken impression that it's also the brightest. It actually ranks only 49th in brightness. But, Polaris just also happens to be the closest bright star relative to the north celestial

pole.

Only the apparent width of about 1.5 full moons separate Polaris from the pivot point directly in the north, around which the stars go daily. Interestingly, because of the wobbling motion of the Earth's axis (called "precession" as we all know) the celestial pole will draw even closer to Polaris (closest on Mar. 24, 2100 AD). Then, as time wears on, it will gradually draw away from it. In fact, in about 12,000 years, our descendants will have Vega as the North Star. My uncle would have been happy to hear that.

Must I wait almost 400 years to see a total eclipse of the sun?

Not unless you don't mind doing some traveling. On average, a total solar eclipse is visible about every 18 months somewhere on the Earth's surface. That's an average of two total eclipses every three years.

Unfortunately, the tracks of total solar eclipses seem to have this perverse habit of occurring over sparsely populated regions of the Earth, or out over the open oceans. Furthermore, even though a typical eclipse track can run for several thousand miles or more, the width of that track is likely to be less than 100 miles.

So, the odds are that any one particular spot on the Earth will have to wait a very long time, nearly 400 years (or 375, to be precise) between total solar eclipses. But, that nearly four-century wait is merely a statistical average.

Indeed, the paths of different eclipses will sometimes crisscross over a specific place, so in some cases the wait isn't so long after all. For example: the totality paths of the eclipses of Aug. 21, 2017 and Apr. 8, 2024 will intersect in a zone that will encompass portions of southeast Missouri, southern Illinois and western Kentucky.

So, if you're lucky enough to be living within this region, you'll be able to see two total solar eclipses over a time span of just under seven years! Cities within this zone include Marion and Anna, Ill., Cape Girardeau, Mo., and Paducah, Ky.

On the opposite extreme, we can cite the case of the islands of Bermuda. Their last total eclipse was on August 30, 1532 with the next one scheduled for February 16, 2352!

More another time. Maybe.

Muscle pain with cholesterol drugs

holesterol is a waxy substance that is produced by the liver and consumed when we eat most of our food. Despite what you have heard, cholesterol is not all bad. In fact, our body relies on cholesterol — it is used to form the outside layer of every cell in our body. For this reason, cholesterol is a necessity. That said, when cholesterol levels in your blood are higher than necessary, the excess cholesterol sticks to the sides of your blood vessels, forming a "plaque." If this plaque breaks loose, it can block the blood flow in your heart or brain. So, while cholesterol is a vital substance for our survival, having too much cholesterol in your body can lead to heart disease, heart attack, or stroke.

Medications that considerably lower cholesterol levels in your blood are known as "statins." Statins work by blocking your body's production of cholesterol, which occurs in your liver. Examples of statins include lovastatin

(Mevacor), fluvastatin (Lescol), simvastatin (Zocor), pravastatin (Pravachol), atorvastatin (Lipitor), rosuvastatin (Crestor), and pitavastatin (Livalo).

One of the most common side effects of statin therapy is muscle pain. Not everyone who starts a statin experiences muscle pain, but those who do are quick to quit therapy. This is not muscle pain resulting from exercise, this is unusual pain felt in your muscles with no explained cause. Your legs are cramping, they're sore, they're uncomfortable — all for no apparent reason!

Before you quit taking your statin, consider a few things: What statin does the doctor have you on? What dosage are you taking? What other medications are you taking?

Not all statins are created equal. Muscle pain is more likely to occur with simvastatin and atorvastatin, and least likely to occur with pravastatin, Crestor, and Livalo. This is due to the solubility of these drugs. Crestor, Livalo, and pravastatin, for example, are water-soluble, while the other statins are fat-soluble. Fat-soluble statins can easily accumulate in the body, making them harder for your body to eliminate, and more likely to cause muscle pain.

Another factor to consider is the dose of your statin. Muscle pain is more likely to occur with higher doses.

Lastly, consider what other medications you are taking. Drug interactions that occur during metabolism can result in higher than anticipated levels of the drug in your blood stream. If you are taking amlodipine (Norvasc) for blood pressure, or gemfibrozil (Lopid) for cholesterol, this combination will put you at increased risk of muscle pain.

Statins can be extremely beneficial to those who truly need them. If your doctor has you on a statin and you experience muscle pain, do not quit taking the medication. Talk to your doctor to see if your therapy can be altered to reduce muscle pain.



Stuffed eggplant with shrimp and basil

Basil and shrimp stuffed eggplant is out of this world! Beautiful flavor. Serve as a filling main dish accompanied by orzo and a green salad.

Makes 3 servings

Ingredients:

1 eggplant, halved lengthwise 1/2 cup olive oil, divided salt and pepper to taste 8 medium shrimp - peeled, deveined and chopped 1/8 cup chopped fresh basil 2 cloves garlic, chopped 1/2 cup white wine 1 cup Italian seasoned bread crumbs 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese, divided

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Scoop out the flesh of the eggplant, chop, and reserve. Coat shells with olive oil, and season with salt and pepper; set aside.

Heat 1/4 cup olive oil in a large, deep skillet over

medium high heat. Saute shrimp, basil and garlic until shrimp turns pink, about 1 minute. Stir in the reserved chopped eggplant. Season with salt and pepper. Pour in wine, and cook 5 minutes.

Transfer to a large bowl, and mix in the bread crumbs and 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese. If mixture is dry, stir in more olive oil. Stuff mixture into eggplant shells, and sprinkle top with remaining Parmesan cheese.

Bake in preheated oven for 30 to 40 minutes, or until eggplant is tender.

Evening activity is where we can be super crazy But then it's cabin time where we are usually pretty lazy


And that's it, the end of our day But hey, we still have tomorrow
