afternoon very enjoyable for all!!





n October 11, 2013, Nasacort Allergy 24 HR (triamcinolone acetonide) was reclassified from "prescription only" to "over the counter." For the very first time, the best way to treat allergic rhinitis became available for over the counter purchase for anyone suffering from allergies.

Not long afterwards, on July 23, 2014, a similar medication, Flonase Allergy Relief (fluticasone propionate), received its FDA approval from "prescription only" to "over the counter." This means there are now two steroid nasal sprays that people may choose from when trying to counter seasonal allergies.

Which one is best for you? Nasacort works to provide 24-hour relief from four symptoms commonly associated with allergies: nasal congestion, sneezing, runny nose, and itchy nose. It is nondrowsy, non-addictive, and contains no scent or alcohol.

Flonase works to provide 24-hour relief of six symptoms associated with allergies: itchy eyes, watery eyes, nasal congestion, sneezing, runny nose, and itchy nose. It is non-drowsy and non-addictive, but unfortunately contains alcohol (I don't use those three words in that combination very

often), which gives it a strange scent.

The take-home point is that both Nasacort and Flonase work on multiple symptoms associated with allergies. Both of these medications are terrific. And while Nasacort has no scent or alcohol. Flonase has the ability to control itchy and watery eyes.

To sum it up, Nasacort and

Flonase are so similar that I simply recommend whichever one is on sale that week! If cost is not a factor, and you are concerned only with the comfort and ease of use, I would recommend Nasacort, due to the fact that it has no strange scent.

Pluto ... so much more than just a Disney dog!

lan Stern heads the first mission to Pluto, known as New Horizons. It passed less than 8,000 miles from Pluto on Tuesday, the 50th anniversary of the first encounter with Mars. As the satellite makes its passes near the icy world its cameras may be able to see features just a few hundred feet across.

Until now, Pluto has been seen as little more than a pinpoint of light in even the biggest telescopes. Even so, scientists have managed to piece together a basic outline about the little world.

For one thing, they've found that it's only about two-thirds the diameter of the Moon. It has at least five moons, including one that's half as big as Pluto itself. And its surface is coated with frozen nitrogen mixed with a smattering of methane and carbon monoxide.

Computer-processed images from Hubble Space Telescope, along with long-range pictures from New Horizons, have shown a wide variation in the brightness of Pluto's surface. Some regions are almost black, while others are slightly orange and others are almost white.

When Pluto is closest to the Sun, some of the ice at its surface vaporizes and forms a thin atmosphere. Right now, Pluto is moving away from the Sun, so scientists expect the atmosphere to eventually freeze out and coat the surface with a fresh layer of frost, a major change for this little world.

In 1978, astronomer James Christy was looking at some photographs of Pluto when he noticed something odd: The little world seemed to have a bump on its side. That bump turned out to be a moon. Christy named it Charon, for the character who ferried souls to Hades, the dominion of the god Pluto.

It turns out that Charon is about half again as wide as Pluto itself. In fact, many scientists consider Pluto and Charon to be a double planet.

Charon has several things in common with our own moon. Most important, it probably formed in much the same way as our Moon did, from a big whack.

A large body probably slammed into Pluto billions of years ago, blasting debris into orbit around it. Much of this material then coalesced to form Charon. In Pluto's case, that process apparently left some small chips that are still around today as several tiny moons beyond Charon.

Also like Earth's moon, Charon is "locked" so that the same side always faces its parent world. But Pluto is locked as well. So the length of a day

on Pluto is exactly the same as the time it takes for Charon to make one turn around it, about six-and-a-half Earth days.

And there's one more similarity between the Earth-Moon and Pluto-Charon systems. The larger bodies are colorful; Earth is blue, and Pluto is fairly red, but the moons are both gray. So like our moon, the surface of Charon could be quite different from that of its parent world.

Operating a spacecraft on the edge of the solar system is a tricky business.

Consider New Horizons, a small craft that's taking aim at Pluto. It's three billion miles away right now. At that range, it takes radio signals from the craft about four-and-a-half hours to reach Earth. So if anything goes wrong at the last minute, no one on Earth can help.

To minimize the chances of a last-minute hiccup, flight controllers worked out the sequence of events for the Pluto encounter two years ago. They transmitted the instructions, then ran through a full rehearsal

while the craft was still months away.

Another problem is that the craft's radio signal is so weak by the time it reaches Earth that it'll take 16 months for New Horizons to transmit all of its observations. So if there are any problems over that time, much of the probe's work would be lost.

And yet another problem with the distance is that sunlight is only about a thousandth as intense at Pluto as it is here on Earth. So it'll take a long time for New Horizons to snap each picture.

Still, mission scientists expect a bounty from New Horizons, some of it predictable, but some of it not.







Safaris and Storms and CITs and CSI

T's Safari Week at Camp Tannadoonah this week, and the stormy weather early in the week has made it quite the adventure!

All the stormy weather has led to a lot of questions about how we handle weather emergencies here at camp. During staff training, we spend time discussing procedures and what to do in different situations. Miss Kayla (my assistant director) and I each carry walkie talkies with built-in weather radios. Whenever there is a storm watch, we alert all of the counselors in camp, just to make sure they stay aware of what's going on.

We have several different signals for severe weather, so if a counselor doesn't hear the message over the radio, we also blow the air horn or ring the big bell outside Main Lodge to signal an emergency.

If a tornado warning is issued, or if the storm gets bad, we immediately bring all of the campers to two central locations: The Dining Hall and Morris Lodge. Both of these buildings have basements, so they are the safest places in camp to bring the kids. During the time we're waiting out the storm,

we sing camp songs and play games to keep the kids calm. We monitor the weather radar and radios, and if it gets bad, we move the campers to the basements.

We do periodic drills with the counselors to make sure they stay sharp and remember all of the proper procedures for various emergency situations.

This week is also one of the weeks that we have Counselors in Training (CITs) here at camp. The CITs are 15 and 16 year olds who are interested in learning about what it's like to be a counselor at Camp T. They get to spend two weeks at camp, observing the counselors, helping lead activities, and taking on a little bit of responsibility. It is a two-year program — so they come as CIT 1s the first year, and CIT 2s the second year.

This year we have a new CIT director, Miss Julie Herwick, who is a former Tannadoonah camper and counselor, and now a high school English teacher at Cassopolis High School. She has brought a lot of fun new ideas to the program, and we're already talking about how we might

re-vamp it for next year. We have 15 CITs here this week -10 girls and 5 boys. Next week another round of CITs arrive to stay for the next two weeks.


This week has also been exciting because we have a group of parent volunteers here leading some specialty programs. Miss Jennifer and Miss Sara are running a CSI week. They've created a camp mystery (who took the bag of fairy dust that we need for council fire on Friday?!?) and the campers are learning about investigation techniques. They've interviewed "witnesses," done police sketches of their suspect, taken crime scene photos, and tried their hand at lifting fingerprints! It's been lots of fun to see them get into the story! We also have a flag football program and an art camp going on this session.

It's been a great summer so far, and it's hard to believe that after this week there are just three weeks left! We're all hoping for some warmer weather soon!
