Invaders threaten butterflies

Swallow-wort has been reported in small populations in Southwest Michigan since 2012, and is still being found in new areas. This invasive creeping vine grows very quickly and very densely, meaning that it can swamp and smother other vegetation and trees. It also is poisonous to monarch butterflies, which are attracted to the vine because of its distinctive seed pods. The butterflies will lay eggs on the vine, but the larvae will be poisoned when they hatch, killing entire generations of the butterflies. Because of this, it is highly encouraged to manage populations as soon as they are found.

The SWxSW Corner Collaborative Invasive Species Management Area (CISMA) is a grant-funded program to manage invasive species in Berrien, Cass, and Van Buren Counties. With funding from the Michigan Invasive Species Grant Program, the CISMA aims to help landowners and stakeholders in Southwest Michigan manage invasive species. If you believe you've seen swallow-worts, report to the Midwest Invasive Species Information Network (MISIN) at misin. msu.edu. Water Quality Report

The Water Quality Committee (WQC) operates under the auspices of the Birch Lake Yacht Club. The members of the committee are appointed by the Yacht Club board, and all activities are funded by the Yacht Club through funds donated by the lake community. Current members are Rick Russwurm, Gordon Seyfarth, Terry Dugan, Bruce Wagner, Peter Saldato and Paul Fallon. If you are interested in participating, please let one of us know. Hopefully, the more the merrier.

The committee meets collectively at least twice a year to evaluate data gathered through monitoring activity and actions we have taken (especially regarding invasive species). We discuss additional strategies for evaluation of the lake, training we might need, contractor activities, and funding that may be required. All requests for funding are made at open Yacht Club Board meetings. Reports on lake status and activities are made at open Yacht Club Board meetings. Additionally information is also reported to the lake community through the Birch Barker.

Two primary activities of the WQC have been: 1) the monitoring of a variety of chemical, physical, and biological features of the lake both during the season and from year to year, and 2) the surveying, mapping, determining and executing of treatment strategies for invasive species. The latter is done in concert with outside specialist firms skilled in this work.

The monitoring of the different chemical, physical, and biological features of the lake is really a study in the developing productivity or aging of the lake. These monitoring activities are conducted through the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program (CLMP) which is a subdivision of the Michigan Clean Water Corps (MiCorps). MiCorps is a State authorized volunteer monitoring agency funded by the DEQ. The CLMP is the second oldest volunteer monitoring program in the US. We participate through the Michigan Lakes and Streams organization of which we are a member. The volunteer program permits the continued evaluation of hundreds of inland lakes to provide information to the individual lakes as well as to have a State global basis of information, all on a yearly basis. All volunteers who do the monitoring are trained and effectively certified so that the data obtained is considered reliable. For years this monitoring was conducted by Gert and Bob Temple, and their family. Most of the sampling now is done by Terry Dugan. He has also worked twice with DEQ staff on side by sides to ensure quality of the sampling. A good way to look at the data for 2016 and to see it in perspective with some prior years is to go to https://micorps.net/lake-monitoring/ individual-lake-reports/. On this site you can look up Birch Lake and there will be some descriptive information as well as graphs putting 2016 in context with prior years. Additionally, if curious you

can also look at other lakes. We will be further reporting on this data and what it might mean as the season proceeds.

Currently we know of at least 3 invasive species that visit Birch Lake each year. Bruce Wagner surveys the lake each year for purple loosetrife, a nasty shoreline invasive species. If you have not seen purple loosestrife on the lake, that is because of Bruce. He sees it and it is gone. Rick Russwurm works with our outside contractors in surveying, mapping, and treatment of the lake for Eurasian milfoil, the primary plant invasive species. A report on the status of this yearly project will be in a future Barker. Unfortunately, this is not a species we can eradicate.

Through the actions we have taken and through the funding provided by the lake community it has been truly managed to a relatively insignificant pest. However, should we cease this management, it would spread widely and quickly around the lake. We are also monitoring a third invasive species that sprouts at Birch Lake each year, curly leaf pondweed, that fortunately to date has not required any treatment. Also, we are under constant threat from other invasive species. Eagle Lake has a significant issue with Starry stonewort and with boats going from lake to lake we would not be surprised to see other species on the lake that may have to be dealt with. There are many reasons why funding and diligence are necessary.

More on all of this later.

STU'S STAR STUFF

DANGER WILL ROBINSON!!!!

ans of the mid 1960's show, Lost in Space,will recall that the cast was marooned on a

planet circling the star Alpha Centauri. Not a made up name at all, Alpha Centauri is our nearest solar neighbor. At a simple hop-skip-jump distance of only 4.25 light years from Earth, popping over to Alpha Centauri or CVS for a Viagra refill might seem like no problem at all. Or would it be?

Alpha Centauri is part of a double, or triple, star system. The two main components are Alpha Centauri A and Alpha Centauri B. The third star, a red dwarf called Proxima Centauri, is thought to be about 4.22 light-years distant and is actually our sun's closest neighbor among the stars.

If you looked through a small telescope at the Alpha Centauri system, you'd see the two main stars, but you wouldn't likely see Proxima Centauri. It's too faint and appears too far away to be easily recognized as part of the system.

To the eye, Alpha Centauri A appears as the fourth-brightest star seen from Earth, just slightly outshone by Arcturus. (Remember, follow the arc of the handle of the Big Dipper to "Arc to Arcturus"?) However, the combined light of Alpha Centauri A and B is slightly greater than Arcturus, so in that sense it appears as the third-brightest star visible in Earth's sky. These stars are an average of 4.3 light-years away, and, as is so often the case, this author is telling you about stuff you can't see from here at the lake. The Centauri system is only visible from about Key West and places farther south.

Yellow Alpha Centauri A is the same stellar type as our sun, although a bit larger. It looks bright

because of its nearness to Earth. Just a few degrees away, the star Hadar (a separate star sometimes called Beta Centauri, not to be confused with Alpha Centauri B) appears dimmer in our sky than Alpha Centauri. But in fact, Hadar is much farther away at 525 light-years.

So you see that Alpha Centauri A isn't a fabulously brilliant star, as stars go.

Alpha Centauri A's surface temperature is a few degrees less than our sun, but its greater diameter (about 25% more than the sun) and the overall larger surface area gives it a luminosity nearly 1.6 times that of our star.

The smaller member of the system, orangish Alpha Centauri B, is slightly smaller than our sun. With lower temperature (about 5,300 K) and only half the luminosity of the sun, Alpha Centauri B would shine as the 21st brightest star in our sky.

These two brighter components of the system orbit a common center of gravity once every 80 years. The orbit is notably elliptical, with average distance between the two stars of about 11 Astronomical Units. (AU = 1 Earth-to-sun distance.)

Proxima is the closest of Alpha Centauri's three stars to Earth. Faint red Proxima Centauri is nearly a fifth of a light year from Alpha Centauri A and B. This great distance is what calls into question its status as part of a triple star system. In other words, there's some debate about whether Proxima is truly bound to the other two stars of the system. Is it? Its status is unclear. It might simply be passing nearby but not part of the system. Still, we say that Alpha Centauri is the closest star to our solar system, with the assumption that Proxima is a true part of the Alpha Centauri The Moon for this Saturday (At Midnight, US Central time, as viewed from the Northern Hemisphere) Illuminated Fraction: 0.167 3.5 days since new moon

Camp Tannadoonah -

appy Spring! What a winter it has been up here at Camp Tannadoonah! We've been working on quite a few exciting projects in preparation for the upcoming camp season.

For the first time in nearly 30 years, we have built a new building at Camp Tannadoonah! This new building is a new camper cabin, which will house 20 campers and 4 staff each week, increasing our weekly capacity from 110 to 130 overnight campers. It has been exciting to see the progress on the building each time we come over to camp! It will be completed in time for the first week of camp, which begins on June 18.

Mr. Bob, our Camp Ranger, has just finished a complete renovation of both of the "birds" cabins – Robins and Woodpeckers and Cardinals and Wrens. These buildings now have new roofs, new windows, new interior paneling, a fresh coat of paint inside and out, and completely re-done bathrooms. The coolest part of the renovations are the custom made sinks (by Mr. Bob), made out of a huge tree found here on the camp property (see photo!).

Also this winter, we started work on a renovation of Morris Lodge. Morris also got a new roof, new electrical panel, and Mr. Bob has started installing the new windows. Thank you to everyone who has contributed to this project and helped us get started with the first phase! We are still raising funds for this project on our GoFundMe page (gofundme.com/morrislodgeatcamptannadoonah). The next phase of the Morris project will be to repair and replace the exterior siding, and give the entire building a fresh coat of paint. After that we plan to re-do and expand the bathrooms, build an outside porch, refinish the hardwood floors, add interior pine paneling, fix the fireplace and chimney, and update all of the plumbing and electrical. It's a huge undertaking!

Other projects this winter included new roofs on the Dining Hall, Showerhouse, and Nurse's cabin, re-wiring the electrical in the dining hall, running water and electricity to the sports and games field, running water to the handcraft building, and burying most of our overhead electrical lines. Mr. Bob sure has been busy!

Our camper numbers for the summer are looking good. As of May 22, we have 811 campers registered for the summer. Last year on May 22 we had 742 campers registered, so we are 69 kids ahead of our pace from last year. In 2016 we finished the season with a total of 909 campers; this year we are hoping to get to 950. We have more beds with the new cabin, but we are running one less session this year because of the school calendars.

This past weekend we had a fun (but wet) spring camp weekend. We had a total of 40 people here for the weekend,



including staff and participants. We were very fortunate to dodge raindrops all day Saturday, and managed to

do all of the planned outdoor activities, except on Sunday morning.

Our first staff members arrive for Lifeguard training next Friday, June 2nd! It's coming up sooo fast! The rest of the staff will arrive for training on June 7th, and our first group of campers arrive on June 18th. We extended staff training this year by 3 days, which will give us extra time to plan for the summer, and establish a good team.

We wish to extend a huge thank you to everyone who contributed to Camp in the recent Give Local SJC event. We raised over \$35,000, and will receive matching funds from the Community Foundation, which will go into our

endowment at the Community Foundation to fund camperships in future years. This summer we hope to have 100 campers receive campership funding to attend camp.
