Birch Lake Notes –

Remove all drain plugs from bilges, ballast tanks, and live wells. Drain all water from any live wells and bilges. Ensure that the watercraft, trailer, and any conveyance used to transport the watercraft or trailer are free of aquatic organisms, including plants. This means that after trailering boats, and before getting on the road, boaters must pull plugs, drain water and remove plants and debris.

Violation of the law is a state civil infraction and violators may be subject to fines up to \$100.

Please enjoy the lake and have a great summer! Be safe, kind and sprinkle in some fun!"

The 'sweet' and the 'sting' of beekeeping

Southwestern Michigan in general, and Lazy Lodge on Birch Lake in particular, are ideal locations for gardening. Our front yard is loaded with flowers, so why not try for something edible?

With unlimited enthusiasm, Vanessa and I were certain we could grow all the fruits and vegetables we needed, in addition we were going to grow enough squash and pumpkins to decorate all fall. Some years we would have miles of pumpkin vines and hundreds of squash blossoms with nothing tangible to show for all our efforts. Our thirty blueberry bushes produced enough fruit for ONE pancake. We are not the types to give up. So, one fall I visited a few pumpkin and blueberry farmers and asked them for advice. The common answer was that they rented bees during pollination season.

Rent bees I asked? Yes, there is an entire industry around bee rental they explained. My thought was why rent when I can own? With help from a local beekeeper, YouTube, a gag gift of "Beekeeping for Dummies". I was going to save the planet, or at least our small part of it.

I had been reading how extremely important bees and other beneficial insects were to our food supply, and being 250 pounds, food supply is more important to me than most. I read how the honey bee was endangered, and back yard beekeepers were making a difference in saving the species. Turns out that many of our local crops are almost entirely dependent upon the honey bee. Michigan State University estimates that 15 crops in Michigan alone would go extinct without the honey bee. Many are my favorite: apples, blueberries, cherries, pumpkins and even onions to name a few, even the summer sensation WATERMEL-ON! Who doesn't love cold watermelon on a hot summer day, or an apple crisp with brown sugar crumble? Makes me hungry just typing. Washington State estimates the value of crops pollinated by bees in the U.S. alone to be in excess of \$14,000,000,000. I wasn't really trying to save the entire world. I just wanted a few pumpkins and blueberries. Simple I thought, I will become a beekeeper.



My first purchase was a custom made extra-large tall beekeeping suit! Then on to the hardware. Wooden

boxes, frames, stands, covers and honey extraction tools. Oh, and three packages of bees. Yes, bees are sold in packages of 10,000. Complete with one queen per package. Install the bees from the package to the boxes with frames, and you have a hive. Multiple hives constitute an



apiary or bee yard. It's that easy, or so I thought.

My first year, I got stung at least 30 times. Vanessa, our neighbors, and friends have yet to be stung to my knowledge. In fact, honey bees do not like to sting, they do it as a last resort because they die after stinging, unlike hornets and wasps, that can sting endlessly just for fun. I even cleared a half acre of our field where the old Lazy Lodge baseball field was located to recreate a native Michigan wildflower habitat.

I have come to recognize

that the honey bee is an AMAZING creature. Take a few minutes this summer and if you are lucky enough to see one working, just watch and discover how beautiful their efforts are. All the honey bees you see out working are female. In fact, 95% of the hive are unfertile females and only the queen is fertile. All have what looks like a mink stole. It's like they dress up for work, but the hairs hold and spread pollen. This past summer just one squash vine produced over 30 squash thanks to our bees.

A bee hive is a social community of workers. By mid-summer one hive alone can grow to 20,000/30,000 or more. Only about half of the bees are out gathering pollen, nectar and water on sunny days. They stay home on cloudy or rainy days because they navigate by using the sun. Speaking of home in the hive, there is an entire support staff of bees inside the hive doing many chores.



Can you locate the queen?

One entire group just looks after the queen. They feed her, bathe her, and take care of her every need so she can do

her sole job of laying eggs, which is typically 1,000 or more per day. Others in the work force guard



the hive, while some clean up debris and remove any waste. In fact, the hive is sterile clean, and smells amazingly sweet. Nurse bees feed and tend to the newly emerging brood. Guard bees wait at the entrance to the hive and check every incoming bee for any intruders that may steal their honey. Still others regulate the temperature inside the hive to keep it a balmy 90 degrees both summer and winter. That's right, when it gets above 90 in the summer, bees will position themselves at the hive entrance and fan their wings to cool the hive. In the winter they cluster together around the queen to keep her warm even during a polar vortex.

Still other bees are scouts that go out and look for specific flowers they like. When they find them, they fly back to the hive to perform an elaborate dance in total darkness that tells the pollen gathering bees how far and in what direction to fly to find the whereabouts of the good stuff. The bees all work as one organism, all controlled by the pheromones sent out by the one queen. It's good to be the queen. There are entire groups that build the wax, store the pollen, save the nectar, and produce the honey. In the entire life span of a worker bee, it may take $12 \mbox{ to } 16 \mbox{ bees just to produce } 1 \mbox{ teaspoon}$ of honey. It takes an estimated 50,000 flight miles to produce just one pound of honey. Every location where honey is produced has a distinct flavor from the flowers, water, and nectar found. That is why Lazy Lodge Honey tastes so good. It tastes like summer at Birch Lake!

Since the bees are doing all the work, one might ask, what does the beekeeper do? The beekeeper's main function is to assist and protect the bees. Feeding them when they need some help in early spring after all the honey stores have been eaten. Extracting honey in summer so the hive is not congested. Dividing a large colony, so they do not fly away. Maybe you have seen on the news when a bee colony swarms away? Beekeepers also treat bees for pests that might endanger the colonies.

Imagine my shock and HORROR when last fall while cutting the grass, my tongue started to tingle and I felt dizzy. When I stopped the mower, I saw my neighbor had contracted a pesticide spray company to fog his property. They were power spraying a blue fog up into the trees and bushes on his entire prop-

erty! In a panic, Vanessa called him to find out what was going on. He and his wife were safely cocooned in their home. They told her the spray was "natural" but they were told to stay in the house and keep all their windows and doors closed. No one told us in advance and I can't prove that the fogging that day definitely caused it, but within days, six of my eight hives were completely dead. That's about 150,000 dead bees. You see, bees gather pollen and nectar and bring it back to the hive. If the pollen and nectar are covered in poison, they unknowingly bring it back to the entire colony to be poisoned. Years of effort and struggle gone. All of those wooden boxes, all the wax frames, the stores of honey no longer usable or fit for human consumption, all the worker bees and queen destroyed. I estimate my monetary loss to be around \$4,000, but the eco loss is immeasurable.

Fogging indiscriminately kills all bugs. Mosquitoes, yes, butterflies certainly, dragonflies, lightning bugs, crickets, caterpillars, all bugs, even the bees sadly.

I love the sound of singing crickets on a hot summer evening. I love the flashing of fireflies in a field at dusk. I love the flutter of the Monarch, Swallowtail, and other butterflies in the breeze. I love the taste of a warm apple crisp and cool watermelon and blueberry pancakes, and I loved Birch Lake Honey!

One last thought, if you must spray, be a kind neighbor and warn others so



poison.

It's duck itch season

wimmer's itch, also known as lake itch, duck itch, cercarial dermatitis, and Schistosome cercarial dermatitis, is a short-term, immune reaction occurring in the skin of humans that have been infected by water-borne schistosomatidae. Symptoms, which include itchy, raised papules, commonly occur within hours of infection and do not generally last more than a week.

A number of different flatworm parasites in the family Schistosomatidae are what cause swimmer's itch. These parasites use both freshwater snails and vertebrates as hosts in their parasitic life cycles. Mostly waterfowl are used as the vertebrate host. During one of their life stages, the larvae of the parasite, cercaria, leave the water snails and swim freely in the freshwater, attempting to encounter water birds. These larvae can accidentally come into contact with the skin of a swimmer. The cercaria penetrates the skin and dies in the skin immediately. The cercaria larvae cannot infect humans, but they cause an inflammatory immune reaction. This reaction causes initially mildly itchy spots on the skin. Within hours, these spots become raised papules which are intensely itchy. Each papule corresponds to the penetration site of a single para-

site.

The schistosomatidae that give rise to swimmer's itch should not to be confused with those of the genus Schistosoma, which infect humans and cause the serious human disease schistosomiasis, or with larval stages of thimble jellyfish (Linuche unguiculata), which give rise to seabather's eruption. Seabather's eruption mostly occurs in salt water, on skin covered by clothing or hair, whereas swimmer's itch mostly occurs in freshwater, on uncovered skin.

Since it was first described in Michigan in 1928, swimmer's itch has been reported from around the world. Some suggest incidence may be on the rise, although this may also be attributed to better monitoring.

Children may become infected more frequently and more intensely than adults but this probably reflects their tendency to swim for longer periods inshore, where cercariae also concentrate.

To prevent it, don't stand around in shallow, warm lake water. Staying out in somewhat deeper water and/or keeping moving such as when swimming, will usually prevent the parasites from getting you. When you or the kids get out of the water, towel off immediately



they too can protect themselves, their

pets, and their garden. Warn a local bee-

keeper so hives can be protected. Think

before you use chemicals. Better yet, try

to do your little part to save our planet

and Birch Lake. You don't have to spray

with a strong rubbing motion and then shower with soap and hot water.

Swimmer's itch typically clears up on its own within a few days, though in some cases the rash can last up to a week. In the meantime, you can control itching with over-the-counter antihistamines or anti-itch creams, such as those that contain calamine lotion. If the itching is severe, your doctor may recommend a prescription medication.

Orally administered hydroxyzine, an antihistamine, is sometimes prescribed to treat swimmer's itch and similar dermal allergic reactions.

am lucky and grateful to the Sailors and Committee Boat Crew to have decided to tolerate me as their Fleet Captain for another year.

This Memorial Day Weekend is the first of the BIG THREE SAILING REGATTAS of the 2019 sailing season (the others being the holiday weekends of The Fourth of July and Labor Day), so sailors get your boats ready for this Saturday and Sunday.

The other and biggest competition is the SEASON CHAMPIONSHIP for which records are kept of each regular season Sunday race. Water Quality Report

e interrupt for this special message: Currently lake water levels are high. Please bear in mind the extra damages that can be done by wakes under these circumstances. Thank you. And now back to our regular programing.

As you are probably aware, Birch Lake is a member of the Michigan Lake Stewardship Associations [previously known as the Michigan Lakes and Streams Associations]. Through that organization we participate along with many other lakes in a testing program through the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program. This is a state-funded group and testing program using volunteers for each lake participating. The data collected provides a major statewide database on what is happening in Michigan's lakes as well as the yearly snapshot regarding our lake in particular.

Thus, we test for phosphorous in the spring and late summer (a primary nutrient in the lake), chlorophyll on a monthly basis (an indicator of algal growth), rate of loss of dissolved oxygen in the water column (also a measure of lake productivity and ability to sustain life), and water clarity on a weekly basis. The phosphorous, chlorophyll, and water clarity measurements make up what is called our trophic index (TSI), which is really a measure of the aging of the lake. Aging will occur, but we want it to occur as slowly as possible so as to maintain a body of water that is great for living on as well as playing in however we choose to do so (swim, boat, fish, kayak, etc.).

The monitoring program also has an exotic plant watch component and a shoreline development component. We participated in the exotic plant watch a couple of years ago, but also have the lake evaluated each year for invasive species as part of our Eurasian milfoil program by an outside company. Currently we only have Eurasian milfoil, curly leaf pondweed, and purple loosestrife. The milfoil is treated annually. The curly leaf pondweed has not been a problem needing to be dealt with. Late each summer, Bruce Wagner and crew locate, and then manually pull, all the purple loosestrife along our shoreline. We are however on the watch for especially starry stonewort, an invasive in nearby lakes and very difficult to deal with, in addition to other exotics which are making their way into Michigan's waters. We did receive a rather poor rating on our Score the Shore analysis performed in 2017, This

is somewhat understandable due to the development on our lake.

We would like for you to actually to look up and read the CLMP report. This is done in an educational format and provides not only the data for 2018 but a retrospective of the last number of years for comparison. A good way to find the report is to go *mymlsa.org* and click on the MiCorps Cooperative Lake Monitoring Program box. From here look at Featured Content and go to Individual Lake Reports where you can find the information for Birch Lake in the Cass County section. You can also look up any other lake that has participated in the State of Michigan. Instead of listing a lot of facts now, let us just say that the testing program for 2018 demonstrated a small backslide in the very positive results from 2017's testing. We are now back to levels of phosphorous and chlorophyll consistent with those recorded in 2016 and the few years immediately prior to 2016. As a result, our overall TSI score returns to the level where it had been previously, and that is on the borderline between the highest quality lake [oligotrophic] and the combination of the highest and second highest quality lake (mesotrophic). While less great than last year's results, we are still in a very good status. Let's hope the positive trend noted in the 2017 results reinstates itself and our status improves even more in the future. All of our actions. or lack thereof, contribute to our success.

We will further discuss all of these subjects in future issues.

The CLMP report seems to have

an error regarding the <u>dissolved</u> oxygen temperature profile. We are not sure what happened in the transposing of the data, but we generally had good oxygen levels, supportive of fish habitat to a depth of 50' in the spring and early summer and to a depth of 30-40' in late summer and early fall. The data as pr4esented is confused and should be disregarded. We will provide updates this summer as measurements are made. One note at this



time is that the reduction in clarity of the lake as the summer ensues, is not much of a function of algal growth. Algal growth does occur, but a good deal of clarity loss is probably due to the precipitation of calcium carbonates (marl) with the warming water. We get a grayish rather than really greenish water.

2017 (the year with the great results) was a relatively calm storm year so less runoff from the shoreline. Thus far this year with all the rain, if anything is around the lake it will get into the lake.

Please do not make runoff easier to get to the lake. Plant margins by the shoreline, pick up ashes from any burning you do on the road or near the lake.

— Camp Tannadoonah — Hard at work getting camp ready

elcome back to the lake! Despite the weather not feeling like it recently, summer is coming up fast, and we're all getting ready here at camp. As I write this on Tuesday, we have just 26 days until the first campers arrive, and our first staff members will be arriving in just seven days!

We have had so much going on up here at camp this winter. We're working on the second phase of the Morris Lodge restoration project, which involves replacing all of the windows and exterior siding. Our contract, John Richey from Cassopolis, has done a fantastic job maintaining the original look of this 1938 building. Once the exterior is done, our next project is to completely re-do the electrical and plumbing, and completely overhaul the bathrooms in Morris.

Ranger Bob has also been hard at work in Main Lodge, where we are continuing to upgrade the staff spaces. He's been installing new windows, hanging new pine carsiding on the walls, re-doing electrical and lighting, replacing screens and shutters, and assembling new furniture. Anyone who worked at camp in the past and knows what the staff lounge and bathrooms in Main looked like in the past will be astonished by how it looks now! We want to make Main an inviting and comfortable place for our staff to spend their time off.

We currently have 850 campers registered for the summer, which is nearly 70 kids ahead of where we were on this date last year! We're hoping to have 990 total campers for this summer, and I think we're well on our way to that goal. The past few months we've been focused on getting our staff hired for the summer, and as of right now we have just ONE counselor position left to fill!

We're excited to have a lot of fresh faces on this year's staff, and it's an amazingly diverse group. We have staff coming from 9 US States (Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Virginia, Kansas, California, Arizona, Iowa, and Pennsylvania) and 13 different countries (England, Scotland, South Africa, Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Mexico, South Korea, the Philippines, Tunisia, Brazil, Armenia, Azerbaijan, and Cambodia)!

Last year, we asked former campers, former staff, parents, and other friends of camp to "adopt" a staff member, and send them mail and care packages. This year we have a slightly different idea. Because so many of our staff are coming to camp from far away, very few of them will have means of transportation to get away from camp on their nights off.

We're hoping we can find some lake folks who would be willing to drive staff into Elkhart or Three Rivers or Mishawaka for their time off, or who might be willing to host a small group of staff for a dinner or cookout. Staff members have time off in the evenings on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, and in the afternoon and evening on Saturdays. On a typical week night, we have around 12 staff members who have the night off.

If you'd be willing to provide a ride into town so they could go to the store, or if you can pick up a group if someone else drops them off, or if you'd be interested in hosting a small group (you tell me how many you can handle!) for a barbecue during the summer, we'd love to be able to offer them opportunities to get out of camp for a bit every once in a while. An automated voice will guide you through the setup and use of the defibrillator. Follow the instructions as they are given.

4. Continue to follow the instructions as given, and stay with the patient until help arrives.
