

Personal watercraft operators in the state of Michigan, along with anyone else riding on board, must wear a USCG approved Type I, II, or III life jacket; an inflatable personal floatation device is not allowed. Being aware of the boating safety requirements for your boat, extends to personal watercrafts as well. Children under the age of 7, shall not be towed or ride on a PWC without the parent, guardian, or designated adult being on board with the child. Children under the age of 14 may not operate a PWC legally alone. Those who are 14 and 15 may operate a PWC only if they have a Boating Safety Certificate and either have a parent, guardian, or designated adult over 21 years of age on board, or if operating a PWC on their own, must be within 100 feet of their parent, guardian, or designated adult. Persons 16 years of age can operate the PWC as long as they have received a Boating Safety Certificate and those over 16 can operate PWC with no limitations. While riding the PWC, all operators must have a lanyard attached to their life jacket, their person, clothes and attached to the vessels ignition switch. Riding a PWC is illegal during the hours from sunset and 8 a.m. with the determination of exactly what time "sunset" is by the National Weather Service. Personal watercrafts are to operated slow speed as to not make wakes, when crossing within 150 feet behind another vessel with the exception of another PWC.



FLEET CAPTAIN'S CORNER

Fleet Captain's Jibe #2

nd we are off ... the sailing season has begun. We had three races Saturday and it turned out to be a beautiful day. I was done in an hour and a half and back home drinking a beer. In the MC Fleet, Barb Cassady with her most excellent crew, one Vic Jones, came in first by a wide margin ... however they were the only MC out there.

Steve Frew had two firsts in the Sunfish Fleet, but the Regatta Victory went to Herb Cleveland with a first and two seconds. Steve's accomplishment was very impressive because he just joined the fleet last year.

I wanted to go over a few rules of racing. First, let me say that the sailboats always have the right of way over all other motorized watercraft. The triangular race course should be avoided by other boats during the races. These courses, which are kindly set up by Mr. trusty himself, Tom Cassidy, always leaves plenty of room for cursing and waterskiing around the parameter near the shore. We try and keep the course with the big yellow bouys to the middle of the lake.

Here are the most basic rules:

- 1) When racing the most basic rule is Starboard over Port. So, if your boom and sail are on the left side of your boat. the wind hits your starboard side first and you are said to be on a starboart tack. You have the right of way if you are approaching another sail boat in the race if that boat is on a port tack (boom and sail on the right side with the wind coming from the left),and they must yield to you to avoid a collision. If they do not and you collide or if you have to alter your course, that is a foul and they must do a 360-degree turn as soon as possible when they are in the clear of other boats. It is up to you to verbally tell them they have fouled you.
- 2) When you are overtaking a boat, it is overtaken over overtaking. So, if you are passing another sailboat you must yield to them.
- 3) As you are approaching a mark (one of the big yellow bouys) if you are

within three boat lengths and there is any overlap with the boat or boats front of you, they must give you "Bouy Room" enough to make the turn around the bouy, and if they do not, they have fouled you and must do a 360 degree

- 4) If you hit a bout or the Bad Patty Race Committee Boat then you have made a foul and you must do a 360 degree turn as soon as you safely can.
- 5) If you are called over the starting line too soon, you must go back and start over.
- 6) Lastly, this week I would like to clarify that if you are sailing next to another boat on the same tack, the downwind boat has the right of way and can turn you up into the wind as far as they want to if they wish. The upwind boat must yield to the downwind boat. If you touch each other or you don't yield, the upwind boat can be called for a foul and must do a 360-degree turn.

Our BLYC belongs to all Birch Lakers, not just sailors ... it should be named the Birch Lake Improvement Association with most of its functions going to improve the quality of life on the lake as well as the quality of the lake water itself. Your board of directors is primarily made up of non-sailors. Most of the dues money goes towards fireworks, water quality, weed and invasive species control, health and security



of our residents, sailboat races, the Birch Barker printed and online FREE Newspapers delivered to your doors and your inboxes ... this is what YOUR BLYC dues do!





few Birch Lake Yacht Club board meetings ago, a board member suggested (seconded by others) that the Water Quality Committee come up with a relatively simple list of the important do's and don'ts of protecting our lake's water quality, perhaps entitle them the "Ten Commandments," and publish them each week in every Barker.

What a great idea! Settle on the most important and worthwhile practices which we'd like all to follow. And make them simple, informative, direct (to the point), and repetitive. That way, hopefully, residents and readers would actually come to understand, learn, remember and put into use those practices. At least they'd be able to easily recall where to find a listing of those practices when needed.

Since then, we've spent a lot of time reviewing past comments made in this space (and elsewhere), trying to find the most pertinent and practical requests we have made of our residents. We have now summarized them into the "Six Commandments of Birch Lake Water Quality.

Like all things human, this list is

not perfect. We will always be open to reviewing, clarifying, modifying, deleting from, or adding to, this list, and the particulars within. But for now, to start out with, at least we have a list of some of the most important practices to help protect and preserve our lake. As per the original suggestion, our plan is to publish the list of the "Six Commandments" in each issue henceforth.

Each of the six commandments is by definition, in and of itself, short and simplistic. As such, they all require and deserve further explanation. So for each commandment we have prepared and will share with you on a rotating basis, that explanation. We will do so at the rate of one/week and only on weeks in which there isn't another more timely or pressing issue to discuss in its place.

Whenever appropriate, we will forego the next commandment explanation in favor of more pertinent news of recent activities, test results or developments on the lake. Again, feedback is welcome.

So, going forward, in each issue we hope you will find:

1) A listing of the Six Commandnents



AND

2) A report on the current Water Quality happenings

OR

An explanation of, expansion on, one of the Six Commandments.

THE "SIX COMMANDMENTS OF BIRCH LAKE WATER QUALITY"

- I. THOU SHALT PREVENT THE SPREAD
 OF AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES (AIS).
- II. THOU SHALT MINIMIZE SURFACE RUNOFF.
- III. THOU SHALT MINIMIZE THE EFFECTS OF WAVES.
- IV. THOU SHALT PROTECT AND EXPAND NATURAL SHORELINES.

Directions:


Poach chicken in 2" water for ½ hour in a large covered pot




We now have 881 campers regis-





EMERGENCY HEART DEFIBRILLATOR

(AED) locations on Birch Lake



CALL 9-1-1



FOR EMERGENCY USE ONLY ALARM WILL SOUND



There are six (6) automated external defibrillator units on Birch Lake. The boxes that contain these devices are located at the following locations (see map):

- 1. West Shore, Sheffieck home, 62875 Birch Lakeview Dr.
- 2. North Shore, Smitley home, 14859 Birch Northshore Dr.15046
- East Shore, Vitale home, 63174 Birch Rd.
- **4. South Shore**, Eberhart home, 15046 Birch Lakeshore Dr.
- South/East Shore, Troeger home, 63696 Birch Rd.
- Southwest Shore, DeYoung home, 63255 Storey Hill St.

All units are on the ROAD SIDE of the property and accessible by vehicle or on foot.

IN AN EMERGENCY:

- 1. CALL 911 and report the emergency and the patient's location immediately.
- 2. Pull the box open, remove the orange-colored unit, TAKE IT TO THE PATIENT and open the device by pressing the white lever at the bottom.
- 3. An automated voice will guide you through the setup and use of the defibrillator. Follow the instructions as they are given.
- 4. Continue to follow the instructions as given, and stay with the patient until help arrives.
