ed that we buoy off the area. This area is on the east side of the lake between Sailor Phil's house to well past the O'Brien's. 



we hope to enjoy it for many more summers. I often golf with the Birch Lake men. The people we have met here are terrific, and a number of them have become some of our closest friends.







— Water Quality Report —

The Second Commandment

t's time to review Commandment #2, "Thou Shalt Minimize Surface Runoff."

It has often been said that whatever is around a lake eventually gets into that lake. Unfortunately that is typically true

Whenever planning to develop, modify, improve or even landscape your property, please consider that:

- The fewer areas hard surfaced (by buildings, sidewalks, pavements, etc.) means less water is likely to runoff into the lake.
- The greater the distance between the hard surface areas and the lake means less water is likely to runoff into the lake
- This runoff often carries undesirable chemicals and objects into the lake.
- Before disturbing the earth you might be required to first obtain a "Soil and Sedimentation Control Permit."
- Installing a silt fence between the disturbed area and the shoreline to capture and contain runoff is typically

required.

- Capturing water and then piping it directly into the lake might only increase its velocity and minimize the chances that suspended solids will settle out before the runoff reaches the lake.
- Running the water into dry wells instead of directly to the lake allows the water to be filtered by the soil before it enters the aquifer (and eventually the lake).
- Although better than hard surfaced areas, lawns don't do much to slow down or filter the runoff.
- A barrier strip of thick, rooted native plants at and above the shoreline does help to both slow down and filter the runoff. While any width strip is better than none, a 6' wide minimum barrier strip has been suggested as desirable.
- A barrier strip of 2-3' (or more) in height will help keep geese off of your property. (They like to be able to see the lake.)

At all times, please remove or protect and carefully store any objects that are



likely to, whenever washed into our lake, damage our lake. Examples that come to mind are oils, fuels, fertilizers, ashes, leaves, trash, grass clippings, etc.



Campers are here!

ampers are here! In fact, by the time you're reading the Barker this weekend, our first group of campers will be ready to head home!

This first week, we ended up having a total of 114 kids for week 1, which is a really big first week! We got off to a hectic start on Monday with cookout night being especially difficult because of very wet wood. Some of the cabins had trouble starting their fires, and getting it hot enough to cook their meals. We had hobo dinners – foil packets with ground beef and a variety of vegetables that you put right in the coals to cook. And of course we end the evening with S'mores!

We do a cookout every Monday night during the summer, and each cabin gets a box of supplies and a cookout site to prepare their food. We have several different cookout meals, and each week is different. Sometimes it's hobo dinners, or walking tacos, or campfire stew, or hot dogs, or sloppy joes. The Super Week kids arrive Sunday, and stay all the way through to the following Wednesday – so they get 11 straight days of camp! We have a VERY full camp next week – with a total of 148 campers signed up! That's just two shy of our limit of 150! It will be a wild and crazy week of camp for sure.


Our total number of campers for the year is now 943, and we're still hoping to have a total of 1,000 for the summer. I think we will get there!

The theme next week is Wild West, and our staff committee has planned Square Dancing, a Wild West-themed Carnival, and a new game called "Cannon" suggested by one of our new staff members this year. Apparently it involves creating a sling-shot like device that will allow the kids to launch a Beach Ball across the sports field, to try to knock over targets on the other team's side of the field. Sounds like a "Blast!"

Our Board is looking forward to once again hosting the Pancake Breakfast at camp on the weekend of 4th of July. As in the past, we will serve pancakes from 8:30 -11 am on Sunday, July 7. The price is still \$5 for ages 11 and up, \$2 for ages 6-10, and free for children 5 and under. We will have regular pancakes, some gluten free pancakes, sausage, coffee, juice, and fruit cocktail.

Last year we served nearly 500 people at the pancake breakfast, and hope to have even more this year! All of the proceeds benefit camp projects, including facilities updates, camperships, and special programs. Please join us on July 7!





EMERGENCY HEART DEFIBRILLATOR

(AED) locations on Birch Lake



CALL 9-1-1



FOR EMERGENCY USE ONLY ALARM WILL SOUND



There are six (6) automated external defibrillator units on Birch Lake. The boxes that contain these devices are located at the following locations (see map):

- 1. West Shore, Sheffieck home, 62875 Birch Lakeview Dr.
- 2. North Shore, Smitley home, 14859 Birch Northshore Dr.15046
- East Shore, Vitale home, 63174 Birch Rd.
- **4. South Shore**, Eberhart home, 15046 Birch Lakeshore Dr.
- South/East Shore, Troeger home, 63696 Birch Rd.
- Southwest Shore, DeYoung home, 63255 Storey Hill St.

All units are on the ROAD SIDE of the property and accessible by vehicle or on foot.

IN AN EMERGENCY:

- 1. CALL 911 and report the emergency and the patient's location immediately.
- 2. Pull the box open, remove the orange-colored unit, TAKE IT TO THE PATIENT and open the device by pressing the white lever at the bottom.
- 3. An automated voice will guide you through the setup and use of the defibrillator. Follow the instructions as they are given.
- 4. Continue to follow the instructions as given, and stay with the patient until help arrives.
