Commodore's Comments #21 Weekend of Aug 1, 2020

his week I did something I had never done before, I attended the Smallbore Rifle National Championships at the Chief WA-KE'-DE Gun Range in Bristol. IN.



It was a huge event with the best sharpshooters and coaches from all around the USA from Washington to Florida and Arizona to Maine. There

were over 100 marksmen and women from the US Army Marksmen Unit, Colleges including: University of Michigan, Purdue University, Michigan State, Murray State and several members of the USA Olympic Shooting Team. Many colleges give full or part scholarships to their riflery teams, which is a great opportunity for young people with this interest.

My contact for this event was a woman Jamie Shipley, originally from South Bend, now from Florida, who is the assistant coach of the US Olympic Team and former two time Olympic Team member in the 1996 Atlanta and 2000 Sydney games. Jamie developed her interest in the shooting sports at YMCA Camp Eberhart on Corey Lake. When she came home from camp as a kid she told her mom she wanted to trade her "ballet and tap shoes for a gun." Dan Durban the Head Coach of the Olympic Team was also there with about 11 members they brought to the events of this past week. The Championships were held over four days

from 100 yards.

They were amazingly accurate with their 22-Calaber long shells with rifles costing between \$5-10,000.

These were highly specialized rifles, no hunting with these guns. They wore specialized outfits as well. Safety was of primary concern for everyone. Officials would give verbal orders over a PA system announcing when the participants could take their spot on the range, when

they could load their guns and when they could begin firing. Two safety inspectors were continually walking the range to assure they were following all the orders

The USA Army Sharpshooters took the top four places in the first day competitions, Mary was fifth. Good to know we are protected by some qualified people.

It was not an event I would travel very far to watch again but it was interesting one time, I stayed from about 8am until about noon last Monday.

— Water Quality Report — Water clarity - the backstory

think it has been obvious to our year to year lake residents that the clarity of our wonderful lake is not consistent throughout the year. There are a variety of reasons for this and hopefully we can provide a little info on this seasonal process.

Normally in the early spring the lake is modestly clear with the ability to see the bottom at close to drop off depths. It could be clearer at this time, but with the ice melt and all the detritus collected, spring storms with extensive runoff, and spring storms and wind creating more turbulence raising sediment, the lake is a little unsettled and slightly turbid. As spring ensues, and prior to higher temperatures and lots of boat traffic, sediment etc. settles and we get the best clarity starting usually mid May until sometime in mid June.

For some reason this year was a bit unusual, and we had our peak clarity around the 4th of July time. Hopefully, you were able to cruise the lake and enjoy seeing drop-offs with the fish handing about these areas at this time. However, as usual with the onset of summer we lose a lot of that pristine clarity. There are a variety of reasons why. the raising of lots of sediment which takes awhile to settle. The increase in sediment means that the phosphorous in the sediment is now raised in the water column which enhances the next issue. Just a note here, when pulling tubes or skiers, idle your way to the dropoff before accelerating and thus creating lots of turbulence that further disturbs the bottom.

2. With sun, warming water, and available nutrients, algae then increase in numbers and the more algae the less clear the water. We annually do monthly chlorophyll levels in the water column to determine if we are having real increases in algae and thus an issue with nutrient levels. Chlorophyll is an index for the amount of algae. Although algae thrives in our lake it is at what might be said is a healthy level. The algae feeds the small zooplankton (microscopic animals), which feed small fish, which feed larger fish etc. etc. Chain of life. What we do not want is excess nutrient influx and thus overdevelopment of algae.

3. However, the loss of clarity is not explained by the level of algal growth. If you notice the lake is not a deep green but a bluish green mid summer. This is due to the presence



of precipitated calcium carbonates. Calcium carbonates get into the water from all the springs which feed our lake. The spring water percolates through limestone below, slowly dissolving the calcium carbonate within and bringing it into the lake. As the water warms, it can result in precipitation of the calcium carbonates. These precipitates slowly settle on the bottom of the lake creating marl, and adding to the marl already there.[Birch is a marl lake.] But in the meantime, while in the water column, the suspended calcium carbonates reduce the water clarity.

So there you have it, and then the process starts again the next year.

Slow cooker pulled pork

At the beginning of the summer, we held our first camp fire of the year down at the waterfront on a Sunday evening. The tradition is that the spirit of Tannadoonah comes to light our first fire of the year, and we read the Legend of Tannadoonah. So I wanted to share that legend with you all.

The Legend of Tannadoonah
