to get enough possible private investors to cover the cost without any BLYC or BLHOA general funds being used.

Another issue that was brought to the board's attention by retiring, long-time, valued board member Bob Waddle was a concern that several rafts and buoys, particularly on the east side, were out in the lake further than may be necessary to keep swimmers safe. The consensus of the board members was that the BLYC is not the proper policing power for this type of situation. Two of the board members who spoke up on the issue with apparent knowledge of the State of Michigan laws noted a couple things: 1) There seems to be no specified maximum distance requirement for rafts and buoys from shore or from the end of your pier, and 2) motorboats and jet skis may not travel between the piers and said buoys and rafts at a speed that creates a wake, however they are allowed with caution may do so at a slower no wake speed for fishing or cruising

Speaking of the BLYC board agenda, I would like to thank our esteemed Secretary Mike Sheffieck publicly for his long-time uncelebrated service to the BLYC board and all fellow members. He takes and prepares the minutes of the last meeting and the agenda for the next board meeting every month then distributes them to all the members of the board. Water Quality Report

Commandment # 4: "Thou Shalt Protect and Expand Natural Shorelines"

he 2007 National Lakeshore Assessment indicated that far more Michigan inland lakes are stressed by poor shoreline conditions than by excesses of nutrients or turbidity. Shorelines:

Dictate what gets into the lake; Provide key animal habitat and breeding areas;

Serve as important fish nursery areas;

Prevent (or hasten) soil erosion.

(The) "lawns and seawalls (that most of us have) change the lake ecosystem in ways that are hard to reverse." Hard shorelines have physical, biological and chemical impacts.

In terms of our environment and protecting our lake, natural shorelines are best. They are even our best bet at limiting phosphorus.

An optimum natural shorelines includes many components:

• Submerged vegetation (in the water)

• Emergent or floating vegetation (in the water)

• Woody debris (beached logs or sticks) (in the water)

• A secured, gradual (climbable by turtles) slope up from the water's edge

• And, at the top of the slope, before the lawn, a barrier strip (the wider the better) of at least 12" - 24" tall native, deep-rooted-plants. In a perfect world the gradual slope would be made of and secured by native plants, perhaps initially held in place by natural fabrics or logs. Seyfarths (northeast corner) comes to mind as meeting many of these criteria.

The barrier strip helps to prevent erosion but also captures many chemicals on their way to the lake. It also makes your lawn area less desirable to geese. Please pick up whatever deposits geese (or other living beings) might leave on your property and throw them, not into the lake, but into the trash.

Although not 100 percent natural, a gradual slope of riprap (cobbles and boulders) is more desirable than a solid concrete wall. A gradual slope of riprap could be installed in place or in front (on the lake side) of a poured concrete seawall, thus mitigating some of its negative effects. Kudos to the Woznys (south) and Troegers (east side).

Even those with riprap and/or a poured concrete wall could install and maintain any of the other features of a natural shoreline described above.

A hardened shoreline, absent any of these natural characteristics, used to be considered by many of us lake folks to be highly desirable. Instead, water quality experts have referred



them to as "aquatic deserts".

In 2017, using methods and standards provided as part of the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program, we subjected our lake to a "Score the Shore" evaluation. Due to our performance (or lack of) on the factors listed above, and the amount of development around the lake, we received a Below-Average score. Our score today might be a little higher, but not too much different, still likely below average.

THE "SIX COMMANDMENTS OF BIRCH LAKE WATER QUALITY"

- I. Thou shalt prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS).
- II. Thou shalt minimize surface runoff.
- III. Thou shalt minimize the effects of waves.
- IV. Thou shalt protect and expand Natural Shorelines.
- V. Thou shalt not allow phosphorus, nutrients, and other undesirable chemical elements to enter our lake.
- VI. Thou shalt remain informed and active about other Water Quality issues

- ³/₄ cup Peppers, sweet, green, raw; green bell pepper
- 1 clove Garlic, raw
- 6 Egg, whole, raw, fresh
- ¹/₄ cup Cream, fluid, half and half
- 2 (8 ounce) packages Cheese, cream
- 2 cups Cheese, cheddar
- 4 slices Bread, whole-wheat, commercially prepared (includes soft bread crumbs)
- 1 teaspoon Salt, table
- 1/4 teaspoon Spices, pepper, black

Directions

Step 1 Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Lightly grease a 9x13 inch baking dish.

Step 2 In a large skillet or frying pan, heat oil over medium high heat. Add zucchini, mushrooms, onion, green pepper and garlic; saute until tender. Remove from heat and let cool slightly.

Step 3 In a large bowl, beat together the eggs and cream. Stir in cream cheese, cheddar cheese, bread cubes and sautéed vegetables. Season with salt and pepper. Mix well and pour into prepared baking dish.

Step 4 Bake in preheated oven for one hour, or until center is set. Serve hot or cold.

An automated voice will guide you through the setup and use of the defibrillator. Follow the instructions as they are given.

4. Continue to follow the instructions as given, and stay with the patient until help arrives.
