Remember to be safe in all your lake activities by always having enough life jackets, stay at least 100ft. away from other boats, skiers, piers, rafts, etc. When you are going at a speed that makes a wake you have to stay outside rafts and buoys. So, please pay attention to this very important set of rules to keep our lake as safe as possible for our residents and their guests.

It has been brought to my attention again this year there are some residents experiencing a real problem with the geese even after taking measures to

keep the messy critters off their piers and property. According to the BLHOA they have been investigating and doing some legwork on the situation for a while now. Paul Fallon and Rick Russwurm reported that we have applied for and have received the proper Resolution from Porter Township however, we have not yet applied for the Permit from the State of Michigan, which would be required for treatment. In as much as, we "The Board" may deem it important enough to begin Live Capture and Transfer of these pesky animals to another more fitting area to live and raise their young. It is only done in the month of June, which makes the earliest any treatment could begin is June 2021. If the board approved the expenditure this year we could get on Goose Buster's schedule for June 2021. It is not inexpensive however, to hire the company Goose Busters to do this and to be honest we have not received all your 2020 dues payments that we normally get so please send in your dues with the form in this Barker or go online to pay at: birchlaketyachtclub.com. CORRECTION #1: A draft copy of Note #2 in my column last week was still a little rough around the edges, and it was inadvertently printed instead of my final version in last week's Barker due to a computer hacking issue I had. Here is the final version that should have been printed last week:

"When pulling water skiers, tubers, wake boarders or wake surfing the Michigan Laws requires a separate spotter, so a minimum of two people must be in the boat every time. There are other helpful water safety/boating rules and laws from the state of Michigan in all the Barkers and the new directory.

CORRECTION #2 Koi/Goldfish It was INCORRECTLY reported by me last week that the Water Quality Committee had made certain statements regarding the Koi/Goldfish in our lake. That is not true. That information came from another board member not the Water Quality folks. Our Water Quality Committee is making an inquiry with the State Fish and Wildlife people, as well as others on the lake reading up on the fish and studying this situation on their own to determine if any action is needed in the future. Their full written reports are forth coming. Sit tight and watch for their reports. Many residence like and enjoy seeing the Koi. It is undetermined at this point if those two Koi that have been spotted in Birch Lake over the years may be the same two that were released hear about 20-30 years ago in THE COVE and we have no evidence at this point that they are doing any harm to the lake or to the lake's other fish populations. Moreover, we have no evidence that they are reproducing. So, please let's keep an open mind and don't kill or remove them for now!

Waste Management is introducing a weekly electronics recycling program at its Three Rivers-area location.



Accepted electronic items include computers and laptops, LCD monitors, CRT monitors, keyboards, mice and speakers, printers, wires and cords, audio/visual equipment, and LCD, plasma and tube televisions. In addition, the collection will accept stereo equipment, game consoles, wires and cords, car batteries, kitchen appliances and electronics, lamps and Christmas lights. It will not accept Freon units, light bulbs and PCB lighting, smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, alkaline batteries, household hazardous waste and electronics that have been exposed to radiation

A great day for sailing

e had a great day for sailing Sunday. Lots of wind, although it didn't always come from the direction we were expecting. Nine MCs and six Sunfish came out for the races. This is a great turnout, but we always want to see more sailors. Can you think of a better way to compete in a sporting event while maintaining social distancing?

We had a short sailor's meeting at the flamingo deck after the races Sunday. The main topic was the rules that we use when racing at Birch Lake. The Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS) governs the sport of sailboat and sailboard racing worldwide. It is revised and published every four years by World Sailing. The current edition is The RRS 2017-2020.

A PDF of the RRS, along with some additional rules for the US can be downloaded at https://www.ussailing.org/competition/rules-officiating/racing-rules/racing-rules-sailing-2017-2020. (This is good reading for sleepless nights.) We follow the latest version of the Racing Rules of Sailing, with some modifications for sailing on a small lake. The particular modifications that we will use this year include:

- Penalty for fouling another boat one 360° turn in the same leg of the course as the foul
- Penalty for touching a mark one 360° turn as soon as possible without endangering other boats
- · Penalty for early crossing of starting line boat must make a 360° turn around one end of the line (either committee boat or orange marker ball) and re-cross the starting line (this was suggested by

Tom Cassady to be more consistent with other racing clubs, and agreed on by the group).

— Water Quality Report -

√urasian Milfoil: We began monitoring aquatic vegetation ▲in Birch Lake in 2001. We were part of a Michigan Lake & Stream program that mapped the aquatic plants in Birch Lake. Howard Wandell provided professional assistance to the Birch Lake Water Quality Committee. The mapping project revealed that Birch Lake had a moderate plant population consisting of a good variety of species none of which dominated. At that time, the survey determined that we did not have Eurasian Milfoil. In 2007 Eurasian Milfoil was discovered at three sites. Progressive AE provided professional assistance and is still under contract. Professional Lake Management treats the Milfoil and was scheduled to treat a 1/4- acre site this year on June 6th but due to unfavorable weather conditions it was rescheduled for June 16th. Last year we treated 1 acre at the same east side site. Last year we treated with ProcellaCor a new treatment which may have attributed to the reduced area that we needed to treat this year.

Growth characteristics:

Eurasian Milfoil is an aggressive, tall-growing exotic aquatic plant from Europe and Asia. It is capable of growing to the surface in 12 to 15 feet of water. At the surface, it forms a dense canopy of vegetation over other plants. Many native plants may be reduced in abundance by Eurasian Milfoil canopy. Consequently, this plant can form dense colonies covering much of a lakes littoral zone. Being an exotic, it has few natural biological control agents so it can dominate a lake for many years. A few biological control agents have been found. Some lakes have seen significant declines in Eurasian Milfoil after 10 to 20 years. Control of other aquatic plants reduces competition and appears to allow Eurasian Milfoil to maintain a greater coverage for a long period.

Habitat: Eurasian Milfoil may be found throughout the literal zone out to depth of 20 feet.

Nuisance traits: Its tall growth pattern conflicts with many recreational activities. In dense conditions, it is a serious localized and lake wide problem. It is not a significant food crop for waterfowl, other birds or aquatic mammals. It readily regenerates from detached fragments and spreads rapidly.

Curlyleaf Pondweed: When we began monitoring aquatic vegetation in 2001 a small amount of Curlyleaf Pondweed was discovered and removed. In 2006 we revisited known sites established from the previous plant survey. No Curlyleaf was found. Currently it has been present in the spring when Progressive AE performs the survey. The Curlyleaf is not a concern because when the water tempera-

tures rise it dies out and the areas are small. However, one site that we are keeping an eye on is the east side Eurasian Milfoil trouble spot. It appears that the Curlyleaf is filling in where the Milfoil is dying off.

Growth characteristic: Curlyleaf Pondweed is an aggressively growing exotic aquatic plant from Europe and Asia. It is capable of growing to the surface in 8 to 10 feet of water. At the surface, it forms a canopy of vegetation. It is one of the first plants to begin growing in the spring, reaching the surface before many native plants germinate from the sediments. Consequently, it can form dense colonies covering much of a lakes littoral zone by early summer. It usually dies back dramatically to minimal levels by mid-July. Curlyleaf Pondweed can produce special reproductive pinecone like structures called "turions", which are highly resistant to herbicidal damage and help spread the plant.

Habitat: It may be found throughout the littoral zone out to a depth of about 12 feet.

Beneficial traits: It is a fair fish food provider and is used by waterfowl for food.

Nuisance traits: It conflicts with many recreational uses and can be a

serious localized and lake wide problem.

Purple **Loosestrife:** The Birch Lade Water Quality Committee started the Purple Loosestrife Management Program in 2000. The program has been a great success. In 2000 we had 10 sites on all shores of Birch Lake. Some of which were very dense. We continue to monitor for Purple Loosestrife each year and remove the plant that we find. Typically, we find two or three sites per year. This occurs in July and August when the plant blooms. If you see the plant or suspect a plant might be Purple Loosestrife, please call a Water Quality member to check it out.

What is it?


Purple Loosestrife is a plant that was accidentally introduced into the United States and then distributed as an ornamental. It is most easily identified during its flowering period from July to September. The spike shaped "purple" flower can be seen in ditches, streams, rivers, lakes, wetlands and other moist, shallow water sites. This plant is an upright, hardy perennial, four to eight feet tall and most often found in a group.

Effects: Purple Loosestrife invades marshes, ditches and lakeshores quickly replacing cattails and other native wetland plants. These plants form dense stands that ducks, geese, muskrats and frogs can not use for food or cover.

Spread: Purple Loosestrife will grow from the roots of an established plant, however, the plants spread mainly by seed. Having up to 300,000 per stalk these tiny seeds can live in the soil and water for many years and can be transported great distances by humans, animals and water. The seeds can be transported to other wetland areas via the mud on birds and ducks' feet, in the fur of muskrat, mink and beaver, or on the shells of turtles. Humans can also unknowingly transport the seeds via the mud on their shoes, boots, waders and clothing.

THE "SIX COMMANDMENTS OF BIRCH LAKE WATER QUALITY"

- I. Thou shalt prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS).
- II. Thou shalt minimize surface runoff.
- III. Thou shalt minimize the effects of waves.
- IV. Thou shalt protect and expand Natural Shorelines.
- V. Thou shalt not allow phosphorus, nutrients, and other undesirable chemical elements to enter our lake.
- VI. Thou shalt remain informed and active about other Water Quality issues

Slow Cooker Carnitas

ake 10 minutes to throw this in the crock pot and go boating.

Carnitas means 'little meats' and is traditionally fried then braised. This recipe is made much easier using the slow cooker but the results are just as tasty. This makes a great filling for tamales, enchiladas, tacos and burritos. This filling is also great combined with your favorite barbe-

Yield: 10 servings

Ingredients

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder

cue sauce and served on buns.

- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- ½ teaspoon crumbled dried oregano
- ½ teaspoon ground coriander
- ¼ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 (4 lb boneless pork shoulder roast
- · 2 eaches bay leaves

Directions

Mix together salt, garlic powder, cumin, orega-



no, coriander, and cinnamon in a bowl. Coat pork with the spice mixture. Place the bay leaves in the bottom of a slow cooker and place the pork on top. Pour the chicken broth around the sides of the pork, being careful not to rinse off the spice mixture.

Cover and cook on Low until the pork shreds easily with a fork, about 10 hours. Turn the meat after it has cooked for 5 hours. When the pork is tender, remove from slow cooker, and shred with two forks. Use cooking liquid as needed to moisten the meat.





Camp Tannadoonah –

e're almost there! Staff will start arriving on Sunday afternoon, and staff training will be off and running. We are still short a few male counselors, so if you know any 18+ year old young men who need summer jobs, send them our way!

We will have two weeks with staff at camp before any campers arrive. During those two weeks we go over all sorts of information to prepare them for camp. This year there will certainly be more information during staff training on safety procedures, cleaning, small groups, and preventing illness.

We also practice leading activities, how to resolve conflicts with campers, how to work with their fellow counselors, how meals work, the daily schedule, and how to help campers with homesickness. Plus we talk about traditions, the history of camp, learn camp songs, and learn to start a fire using only sticks and matches (no paper, that's cheating!).

We spend a lot of time on teambuilding, developing a group of staff who work well together and can communicate with each other. Adam, our new camp director, previously worked as a ropes course coordinator (at his former camp), so he has lots of experience with teambuilding and communication strategies.

Camp Fire also provides us with a youth development framework call Thrive(ology) (or just Thrive). We develop many of our activities around this, and teach counselors how to implement it. There are four

> components to the Thrive framework: (1) helping kids find their Sparks, (2) developing a growth mindset, (3) teaching goal management skills, and (4) developing reflection strategies.

"Sparks" are your interests or passions - the things you get excited about. We provide kids with a variety of experiences at camp to help them identify new Sparks, and then help cultivate those passions. It's exciting to see kids' eyes light up when

they discover something new that they enjoy.


Mindset is something that has been a "hot topic" in developmental research over the past decade. Based on research by Dr. Carol Dweck, a growth mindset means that kids recognize that they can improve their skills through hard work and effort, as opposed to having a fixed mindset where they believe that they only have the skills and talents they were born with. You can recognize a fixed mindset if you hear someone say "I'm not good at math," or "I'll never be able to waterski." We teach counselors to say things like, "you're not good at it yet, but you can keep practicing and get better."

For goal management skills, counselors learn to help kids set goals, identify the steps they need to take to get to that goal, and then evaluate their progress. If they've gotten off track, they help them figure out how to revise the steps to get to the goal. And finally, we use reflection at the end of each activity, to talk about how things went, and what they would do differently. We reflect at the end of each day, too, about the positives and negatives of the day, and how to make the next day even better!

One last note - I've had a few people reach out about the Pancake Breakfast. Unfortunately, we are not going to be able to host the Pancake Breakfast at camp this year. There just doesn't seem to be a way to safely bring 400+ people through the dining room for an event like that, and we've received guidelines from the State that we need to restrict visitors / outside people at camp to decrease the risks of bringing in communicable illnesses. We are working on an option to purchase camp t-shirts and other apparel on our website, and will have that information available



EMERGENCY HEART DEFIBRILLATOR

(AED) locations on Birch Lake



CALL 9-1-1



FOR EMERGENCY USE ONLY ALARM WILL SOUND



There are six (6) automated external defibrillator units on Birch Lake. The boxes that contain these devices are located at the following locations (see map):

- 1. West Shore, Sheffieck home, 62875 Birch Lakeview Dr.
- 2. North Shore, Smitley home, 14859 Birch Northshore Dr.15046
- East Shore, Vitale home, 63174 Birch Rd.
- **4. South Shore**, Eberhart home, 15046 Birch Lakeshore Dr.
- South/East Shore, Troeger home, 63696 Birch Rd.
- Southwest Shore, DeYoung home, 63255 Storey Hill St.

All units are on the ROAD SIDE of the property and accessible by vehicle or on foot.

IN AN EMERGENCY:

- 1. CALL 911 and report the emergency and the patient's location immediately.
- 2. Pull the box open, remove the orange-colored unit, TAKE IT TO THE PATIENT and open the device by pressing the white lever at the bottom.
- 3. An automated voice will guide you through the setup and use of the defibrillator. Follow the instructions as they are given.
- 4. Continue to follow the instructions as given, and stay with the patient until help arrives.
