I would like to take this first run at the Commodore's Comments to talk about Past Commodore, Pat McGann. I met Pat at Camp Eberhart in 1967 when he was in Morris Lodge with my older brother Michael, and the next year, they were CITs together and then went on to become counselors. I followed them along the way and got to know Pat at camp but then also visiting him in South Bend

Pat lived above the McGann Funeral home on Notre Dame Ave. that also housed their ambulance service. He was raised by his mother Ollie and his paternal grandfather Lewis who lived across the street. At the time I stayed at Pat's house, I thought it was very cool to have a 24 hour ambulance team onsite ready for calls and then the funeral home on the lower level.

Coming from a medical family with both of my parents physicians, I was used to the phone ringing at all hours, but at Pat's the sound of the radio calls coming in and the team rolling was quite exciting. Pat became an EMT and then a Paramedic so he was on the ambulance team since his early teens. Pat was quite an athlete, and at age 14 was Junior Olympian in Track and Field. In one meet he overjumped the landing pit in the long jump hitting a board that marked the end of the pit. That ended his track and field career and started is diving one. Pat was on the Varsity swim team at Adams along with Bob King whose event was backstroke and they racked up a number of victories together.

Pat liked to dive off of Coop's Tower at Eberhart, which is about 30 ft high. His best dive was a reverse one and a half (he would add a twist when he dove

— Water Quality Report -End of summer 2020

You might have noticed over the summer the listing and presenting of what we call the 6 commandments. These are issues and concerns and activities that we as lake dwellers should keep in mind as we further develop our properties and use the lake. We want to maintain this lake in as pristine and safe condition as we can, and believe that attention to these commandments will help permit this. Articles, explaining one each of the 6 commandments, can be found in six of this summer's previous Barkers. Further questions or comments can be directed to Paul Fallon.

We have talked about the shoreline extensively as it is both a buffer to what happens on the land as well as the ecological contact between water and earth. The buffer part is to keep things we do not want to get into the lake out of the lake and the ecological contact part is that a lot of the animals both large and small rely on a shoreline habitat for reproduction, early development, food sources, and shelter. Please look at the two web sites listed below as you think about what you might do to enhance your shoreline next year etc . (www.mishorelandstewards.org and www. mishorelinepartnership.org).

As we tidy up this fall, some may want to do a little burning by the side of the road or (horrors) close to the lake. Should you feel absolutely compelled to do this, and we would encourage you to not do it, please after the fire goes out sweep up the ashes and bag them for the trash. The alternative is after the next rain you will see the effect of those ashes heading to the lake as ready to use fertilizer and minerals that will enhance extra plant growth.

Our role on the Water Quality Committee is somewhat simple in premise. (A) Survey the lake for invasive species and if something can be done about them to advertise this to the lake and set the proper procedures in motion. This is most evident for the Eurasian milfoil that would be clogging many acres of the lake in the absence of this. Sorry there is nothing we can do about zebra mussels, but they have declined on their own the past few years. They can just as well rebound. We are closely monitoring both starry stonewort and hydrilla, two truly nasty invasives should they get into the lake. Tell friends you know that bring their boats from other lakes to make sure they properly clean them before launching them here. Also, should you take a boat or kayak to another lake, please properly clean it before placing in back in Birch. (B) Monitor the lake for evidence of increasing levels of nutrients that will age the lake prematurely and report on this to the lake community. (C) Ascertain the safety of the lake waters for the recreational activities we all enjoy and wish to have our children and grandchildren enjoy now and in the future.

In the future, just take some time to truly try and be aware of the lake. Especially in the spring when the water is clear. cruise around the shallows and drop offs and look at the diversity of plant life that exists in different parts of the lake. Keep pathways for the turtles to come ashore and lay their eggs. Provide cover at the shoreline for small fish to hide in, insects to come to, and frogs to lurk when the insects are around. Grab some decaying material from the bottom and put in a white pan and watch the life that springs from this. Have your kids try to learn the names of some of the aquatic plants. Hopefully, you can think of even more ways to become better aware of. and learn more about, our lake.

Commandment #6, explained in a very recent Barker, referred to the need for adequate donations to fund our Water Quality [WQ] program. As stated, should we ever run meaningfully short, likely our only option would be to request the township establish a Special Assessment District [SAD], which, once in place, the TOWNSHIP would run with OUR TAX dollars. Virtually all other Michigan lakes that are treated for invasive species [like



Birch Lake is] are financed by SADs, so we are truly unique. It is a huge blessing indeed that we have, ever since we started incurring substantial expense fighting invasives in 2007, survived on donations alone. Due to the past and current generosity [thank you very much] of the minority, we have paid our bills and have some reserves. Unfortunately, we don't and can't know if we have enough. We do know that more, and tougher invasives are coming our way, that much of our Eurasian milfoil is hybridizing, and that a particularly challenging invasive, Starry Stonewart, is now only a few hundred feet away, in the millpond into which our lake drains. This year 93 families contributed an average of \$70 for water quality efforts. The amount per family is certainly generous and commendable. Those giving are to be congratulated. What is disappointing, however, is that over 130 families [almost 60%] did not contribute at all!. [You don't have to be a member of the Yacht Club or the Homeowners' Association to donate to the one cause that ALL of us, undisputedly, have in common and benefit from.] Come on, would you that aren't doing so, please write a meaningful check, every year, for water quality? It's in everybody's best interests. Let's all pull together on this one. Thank you and best wishes to all for a safe and happy fall, winter and spring!



Barbecued Pineapple

erve in a bowl or a banana boat with pineapple on either side and a scoop of ice cream or two on top and drizzled with juice glaze. You may substitute juice (1/2 cup) for the sugar and rum part of the marinade."

4 servings

Ingredients

- 1 fresh pineapple
- 1/4 cup rum
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
 1/2 teaspoon ground alarge
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves Add all ingredients to list

Directions

1. Peel the pineapple and, leaving it whole, cut out the center core. Slice into 8 rings, and place them in a shallow glass dish or resealable plastic bag. In a small bowl, mix together the rum, brown sugar, cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, and cloves. Pour marinade over the pineapple, cover, and refrigerate for 1 hour, or overnight.

2. Preheat grill for high heat. Lightly oil grate.

3. Grill pineapple rings 15 minutes, turning once, or until outside is dry and char marked. Serve with remaining marinade.

t's the end of summer and the last Barker of the year. What a strange year it has been. Like everyone, we're all hoping that 2021 will be a somewhat more normal year for all of us.

It's a special year at camp next summer. We are celebrating our 100th anniversary of Camp Tannadoonah in 2021. We are planning an alumni reunion weekend in September 2021! The Camp Fire Girls of South Bend held their first summer camp in 1921 on Pleasant Lake in Edwardsburg, MI. The first 2 summers they called it "Wohelo Camp", and adopted the name Camp Tannadoonah in 1923. The first few years, the camp was led by Col. And Mrs. C. Seymour Bullock. Col. Bullock was the director of recreation for the City of South Bend, and his wife led the Camp Fire Girls.

The name Tannadoonah was chosen from the Camp Fire Name Book (published in 1915) which detailed lists of Native American words and their English meanings. According to the Name Book, "Ta na doo nah" means "lives out of doors." Over the years, camp legend has evolved and we say that Tannadoonah means "a gathering of friends, on a hill, above a lake, among the trees."!



In 1930, Camp Fire purchased a piece of property on Birch Lake, previously owned by Dr. Ersom Cunningham and his family. The family had a farmhouse at the top of the hill overlooking Birch Lake, and a guest cottage. They called the house "KathMarDo Lodge," named for their 3 oldest daughters, Katherine, Margaret, and Dorothy. The original farmhouse is still in use today, as Main Lodge, and the guest cottage is now our craft building and camp store!

Camp Fire moved an old schoolhouse from Edwardsburg to Birch Lake, and attached it to the back of the lodge to serve as the dining hall in those early years. Between 1930 and 1938, they built six small cabins along the edge of the hill overlooking the lake. Four of those six original cabins still are in use – Rotary, Exchange, Exchangettes, and Luta Koda. The other two, Demolay and Wallace, have been replaced over the years.


In 1938, Mr. and Mrs. E.M. Morris

donated the funds to build a new lodge. This cabin had sleeping space for up to 24 girls upstairs in two bunk rooms, a kitchen and dining room downstairs, a large gathering space with a huge stone fireplace, a library, and a room for the counselors to live. Morris Lodge is still used today, though due to fire code changes, the campers now sleep downstairs, and the staff sleep in the rooms upstairs. We are in the midst of a major restoration of this building.

In 1954, Laura B. DeRhodes left ¹/₄ of her estate to the Camp Fire Girls of South Bend. The council used those funds to construct our Dining Hall building, which seats up to 200 people and has two beautiful fireplaces. The original mid-century modern tables and benches are the same ones we still use today! The kitchen was state of the art in 1954, with a cast iron South Bend Range, a Hobart mixer, and Hobart Potato Peeler – all of which we still have! A complete kitchen renovation is the next goal in our facilities plan, after Morris.

Over the next 65 years, we have added additional sleeping cabins, a shower house, and a year-round office building. But much of the original camp from the 1930s-1950s remains! We are excited to celebrate our 100th anniversary next summer, and bring back many campers, staff, and Camp Fire kids to see camp again.

Pull the box open, remove the orange-colored unit, TAKE IT TO THE **PATIENT** and open the device by pressing the white lever at the bottom. 3. An automated voice will guide you through the setup and use of the defibrillator. Follow the instructions as they are given.

4. Continue to follow the instructions as given, and stay with the patient until help arrives.
