<u>— Water Quality Report —</u> So, what other (non-koi) fish species are stocked in Birch Lake?

ecent conversations with the fisheries biologist from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' Plainwell office who covers all the lakes in Cass County, including Birch, have provided insight into the DNR's program for stocking our lake.

Birch is stocked annually in the Spring, but only with rainbow trout yearlings (the prior year's spawn). They average 6.5" in length, but the average varies year to year, and there can also be a large variation of size within any individual year. The minimum legal length for fisherpersons to keep trout is 12". Some of the very fast growers that are bigger at stocking could be legal by fall, but most of those stocked in any given year will not reach the required 12" in length until the following year.

It is unlikely there is any natural reproduction of the trout at Birch Lake. Past surveys performed by the DNR at Birch Lake only found stocked trout. Some lakes can support reproduction of trout if they are connected to a free-flowing trout stream. The tributary flowing out of Birch Lake is warm transitional and generally impounded and unlikely supports a spawning run. Besides, rainbow trout usually go upstream.

The DNR stocks rainbow trout in Birch because they are a popular sport fish. They are not native, but are naturalized. They stock trout in lakes with good water quality because they are the few (especially few in Southern Michigan) systems that can support the trout.

The DNR's target is 2950 fish for Birch, per year, but the actual number

varies depending on productivity. It has been closer to 3200 in the past few years, but only 2800 in 2020.

The DNR stopped stocking species like bluegill, bass, perch and other panfish because these species are not limited by the inability to reproduce. In fact, they tend to overpopulate and stunt their own growth. Stocking of these fish is counterproductive.

Before closing, our fisheries biologist reminded us of the importance of establishing and maintaining natural shorelines for fish habitat and also treating for only invasive vegetation. Native vegetation provides nursery habitat for small fish and promotes strong invertebrate communities that result in fish food, which means bigger fish.

THE "SIX COMMANDMENTS OF BIRCH LAKE WATER QUALITY"

- I. Thou shalt prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS).
- II. Thou shalt minimize surface runoff.
- III. Thou shalt minimize the effects of waves.
- IV. Thou shalt protect and expand Natural Shorelines.
- V. Thou shalt not allow phosphorus, nutrients, and other undesirable chemical elements to enter our lake.
- VI. Thou shalt remain informed and active about other Water Quality issues

Barker readers write —

Let's Not be Koi ...

There have been several recent sightings of Koi fish around the lake and while some people are on the fence of what to do with these pretty fish. I thought it would be helpful to share some research on Koi fish and the Common Carp as well as the dangers they present. I understand Michigan DNR did not believe they posed a threat, but you can Google countless articles where Koi fish have become a nuisance from Colorado, Washington, Vermont, Canada's Lacombe Lake and Edgewater Pond to the Midwest including rivers.

In the article, *Holy carp: 11-yearold nets giant koi in St. Albert lake*, a young boy caught a 16 lb Koi Fish in Lacombe Lake, the lake is going to have to use two treatments to kill off the gold fish in their lake.

Some people suggested there are only a few Koi fish. The Koi fish is a bottom dweller, so sightings are rare. I think it would be nice if we could monitor these fish as well as the common carp. Maybe if we could use divers to navigate the depths of our lake where they are more commonly found.

According to sciencing.com, "While it's true that bottom feeders like carp (Cyprinus carpio), koi and goldfish feed on algae and insects in a pond, their constant rooting around at the bottom of the pond can create water clarity issues, particularly if the pond has a clay or silt bottom."

I am also surprised that the Koi nor the common carp has not been on the radar of Michigan DNR since they both can carry a virus.

In article published in 2012 titled the Koi Herpes Virus: A Review and Risk Assessment of Indian Aquaculture written by Gaurav Rathore stated, "Since 1998, both common carp and koi carp are severely affected by a viral disease called as Koi herpes virus disease (KHVD)."

You can also read about the Koi Herpes Virus on the Minnesota Aquatic Invasive Species Research Center (MAISRC) web site.



We must acknowledge; they are an invasive species to the lake.

According to IUCN Freshwater Fish Specialist Group, "After habitat destruction, the introduction of exotic or "alien" invasive species is believed to be one of the greatest global threats to native fish communities and their freshwater ecosystems. Many introductions are intentional ,to provide new fisheries (Nile perch in Lake Victoria), for commercial or cultural purpose (tilapia), as ornamental species (koi carp) or to control mosquito larvae as a biomedical measure against malaria (mosquito fish)."

I know many have you asked this question, What's so dangerous about a goldfish?

In the article, *If you dump your pet goldfish into a lake, it will grow into an enormous pest* printed in the Washington Post answered the question by writing, "What's so dangerous about a goldfish? As we mentioned before, they can reach monstrous sizes in the wild. Like all species of carp, the domestic goldfish, Carassius auratus, grows to be as large as its resources will allow (within reason, anyway). And they don't just eat fish flakes, either. In the wild, goldfish are carnivorous. At best, their feeding habits — trawling along the bottom of the body of water — disrupt sediment and make it harder for other fish to eat. At worst, goldfish will fatten up on the eggs of native species. Goldfish may also be bringing new diseases to the wild fish population."

In Australia they recognize Koi as environmentally damaging.

Another article titled, *Koi dumped in lake become problem in WA*, warned their readers, "ENVIRON-MENTALLY damaging koi carp fish have been spotted in Lake Gwelup and the City of Stirling is on a mission to eradicate the pests. The ornamental fish native to Asia and Europe are popular in aquariums but can become feral when dumped in waterways, harming ecosystems and out-competing native fish."

In Chicago, they recognize Koi can exist in a lake even in cold temperatures.

The Chicago Tribune has an article titled, *Where not to put your unwanted fish*. The article foretasted the potential danger of Koi fish, "Koi are cold-water fish that can survive Midwest winters. Koi root up native plants while feeding and cause the water to become muddy, potentially disrupting feeding and spawning for native fish. "We haven't seen evidence of koi establishing and having a population explosion, like the bighead [in the Mississippi]," he says, though the potential is there for koi in the wild to become a problem."

I only ask we educate ourselves of the danger of these fish in our lakes and take into consideration the many stories of other freshwater lakes. I have previously thought we should eradicate the lake of these fish. I am not sure it that is the answer considering the Michigan DNR's current stance. Maybe we should consider monitoring the number of Koi and common carp in our lake. We should make sure no new Koi fish or gold fish are introduced into the lake.

— Barker readers write — Our resident Koi

Given my love of nature and biodiversity, I was asked by several concerned friends to write something about our resident koi. For years, many residents and their friends and family have been amazed and excited to catch a glimpse of the large orange jumbo koi and his companion, a yellow butterfly koi, swimming together. Numerous sightings and photos have made these two fish quite the celebrities around the lake. Because of that, many people here were disappointed to see a comment in the Barker 2 weeks ago suggesting they be killed.

Just to correct some misleading information inadvertently published in that comment:

1) According to the DNR's own website, common carp are not considered invasive in the State of Michigan nor are they on the State's invasive species list. Koi are a domesticated version of common carp.

2) Koi are not one of the four invasive species of carp in the news as of late that are deeply concerning to the health of the Great Lakes.

3) The paragraph in the Barker mentioned a concern that the koi are eating the eggs of game fish. While this is correct, it must be pointed out in fairness that game fish eggs and fry (baby fish) are also eaten by trout, sunfish, bass, perch, crappie, etc. Several online articles state that all fish are opportunistic predators. Eliminating all the fish that are preying on eggs and fry would leave fishermen with no fish to catch. In fact, some male fish are known to eat the eggs in the nest they are guarding because



they're hungry and will not leave the nest.

If the koi actually posed a threat to the health of the lake, they should be trapped and removed. However, one of the arguments against not trapping them lies in the fact that carp were widely stocked across the United States around the 1880's but stocking was discontinued around 1900. If we have had carp in Birch Lake for over a 120 years, it is highly plausible that they have achieved a balance with our resident game fish during that time and this was suggested by the DNR as well. We had carp in the lake long before the koi were released. Over the years, many of us have seen brown carp in Birch Lake that are 3 feet in length and weigh close to 20 pounds. It should be noted that any koi offspring that are gold or yellow in color are more likely to be eaten than the regular brown carp offspring. It should also

be noted that a single carp can produce more that 1 million eggs in a year yet their population remains stable so eggs and young perish in similarly vast numbers and are an important food source for all types of predators including largemouth bass.

Cultivated in Asia for over 4,000 years and highly respected in Japanese culture, koi are thought to represent

luck, fortune, and prosperity - something we could all use a little more of in these difficult times. They are also known for their intelligence, great memory, loyalty to their owners, and their striking personalities. For the people that enjoy seeing the koi, the article in last week's Barker from the Water Quality Committee came as welcome news saying that it is the opinion of the Michigan DNR that a couple of non-native koi should not pose a threat to our lake came.

The comment in the Barker did raise an important point and that is that no pet should ever be released into the lake. Non-native species have done and are doing extensive damage to many ecosystems and have caused millions of dollars in damages. In an interesting side note, native wild populations of carp in Europe are listed as vulnerable to extinction by the IUCN according to Wikipedia.

RECIPES

- 12 eaches small paper cups
- 12 eaches ice pop sticks



• 4 eaches limes, each cut into 3 discs

• $\frac{1}{4}$ cup margarita salt, or as needed

Directions

• Step 1 -- Mix condensed milk, lime juice, water, and tequila to-

Our first group of overnight campers will be arriving on Sunday afternoon. We've reduced our capacity by about half, and will have approximately 65 kids checking in on Sunday for the first week of camp. This first week will surely be an adventure, as we adjust to all the new safety procedures and figure out how the schedule is really going to work. On paper, we think we have it all figured out... but once we actually get going we know that we'll be making changes as we figure out how it's all going to fit together.

We were sad to have to cancel the Pancake Breakfast this year, for the first time in many years. We always love seeing the lake community come out to camp! And our board has a great time flipping pancakes and meeting all our neighbors. Even though you can't be here on Sunday morning for the breakfast, we have created on online camp store so you can still buy your Camp Tannadoonah apparel and supplies! Check it out at tannadoonah.org/shop If you live on Birch Lake, we can deliver your order to your house, or you can pick up at the Welcome Center at camp. But if you're not nearby, we can ship your order to you.

We have a selection of in stock items, and some special pre-order items. We even have camp "buffs" that make great masks for when you have to go out in public.

We also have a section for donations. We are so grateful for all the support that our lake community shows for Camp Tannadoonah, and would appreciate any contributions people can make. This year is going to be tough for us, as it is for many, many businesses.

We've spent the past 15 years working hard

to make camp stable and secure financially. In 2006 when I became Camp Director, as many of you know, Camp was in a very difficult financial situation. Since then, we've paid off all debt, worked to repair and improve our facilities, expanded our capacity, created new programs, and built a substantial cash reserve to get

us through tough times. We built lots of contingency plans, and looked at what we would do if we lost revenue for a variety of reasons, but this pandemic is having a huge impact despite all our planning.

Our camp business model, like most camps, relies on the funds we bring in from summer programs to support us throughout the whole year. We have 4 full time, year-round staff now, 2 part-time year-round staff, 4 part-time after school program staff during the school year, and as many as 40 summer camp staff each summer.

Throughout the winter months, we invest a lot of time and funds into facilities improvements, run our after school programs, and prepare for camp. Even if we didn't have any camp revenue in the summer, we still have our year-round staff costs, insurance, marketing and advertising expenses, professional development, maintenance and utilities, and other expenses. We're doing our very best to minimize expenses this summer, but having lost all of our spring program revenue, shortening our summer, and cutting our capacity in half for the weeks we are able to run, means we will really cut into our cash reserve this year, and will not be able to complete many of the facilities improvements we planned on, including some major updates to Morris Lodge and the Dining Hall Kitchen.
