






— Water Quality Report —

his week we'd like to discuss Commandment #1, "Thou Shalt Prevent the Spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS)."

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) refers to all non-native organisms living in or near our bodies of water. Examples include zebra mussels, aggressive weeds, and fish diseases. Because they typically have no natural predatory, competing, or limiting species, AIS can overwhelm a body of water very quickly. Once an AIS visits a body of water it may be controlled, but rarely eliminated. Currently there are at least hundreds of know forms of AIS.

AIS threaten the health of our lakes and rivers, decrease water quality and can limit recreational enjoyment. It has been estimated that the total economic impact of aquatic invasive species in the Great Lakes region is \$5.7 billion per year.

Within the last decade of so, rampant AIS at a few lakes within 60 miles of ours has actually caused their state DNR (Department of Natural Resources) to, on a temporary basis, "close" those lakes for use. At Birch, we already "enjoy" the presence of at least known types of AIS:

- 1) Eurasian Milfoil for which we survey and treat annually
- 2) Purple Loosestrife for which volunteers (Bruce Wagner) hunts and then oversees the pulling of, every late summer
- 3) Curly Leaf Pondweed for which we monitor but action has not yet been required.
- 4) Limited quantities of Hybrid Eurasian Milfoil were recently detected after a treatment and elimination of our normal Eurasian Milfoil. We will now more regularly monitor this species also and discuss it further in a future article. At this point we don't know what impact it may, or may not have, on the lake. We have learned that a product that does not work on this particular hybrid is not the product that we currently use on our lake.

A particularly problematic species, Starry Stonewort, has already been discovered in numerous nearby bodies of water (including our own mill pond.) Numerous other forms of AIS thrive in the area and threaten us regularly. For these reasons, each year we hire outside experts to survey our lake.

Movement of boats and trailers among water bodies is the most common way Aquatic Invasive Species spread in Michigan. Washing of those boats and trailers is an obvious and relatively easy way to stop them.

Michigan Law requires that we:

- Remove aquatic organisms, including plants from boats, boating equipment and boat trailers before launching or placing in the water or transporting any watercraft over land.
- Pull plugs and drain live wells, bilges, ballast tanks and all water from boats before leaving the access site.
- Dispose of unused bait in the trash. Do not release bait into the water.
- Don't transfer fish to water bodies other than where they were caught. Further, in Michigan it is recommended that we:
- Inspect and remove plants and mud from boats, trailers and gear and dry equipment before leaving the access area.
- Dispose of the material in a trash receptacle or otherwise away from water body.
- Power wash boats, trailers and gear before leaving the access area if possible, or at a nearby car wash or at home
- · Clean our boats and equipment before and after use in a new body of water
- Don't allow the cleaning residue from a previous body of water to runoff into a different body of water
- After cleaning, dry boats and equipment. (Most Invasives, and significant fish diseases, will die if left dry, out of the water, for 5 (five) days
- Disinfect live wells, bilges and gear with a mild bleach solution (1/2 cup bleach to 5 gallon of water.)
- Do not dump fish and plants from aquariums into a body of water unless you are absolutely certain that each variety of living matter therein is native to that body of water



In summary, please be careful not to place (or dump) anything that may be invasive (non-native) into our lake or into a place that may eventually wash into our lake. Included would be plants, fish, bait, aquarium remnants, and even crawfish left over from a "boil."

PLEASE PASS THE WORD

THE "SIX COMMANDMENTS OF BIRCH LAKE WATER QUALITY

- I. Thou shalt prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species AIS)
- II. Thou shalt minimize surface runoff
- III. Thou shalt minimize the effects of waves
- IV. Thou shalt protect and expand Natural Shorelines
- V. Thou shalt not allow phosphorus, nutrients, and other undesirable chemical elements to enter our lake
- VI. Thou shalt remain informed and active about other Water Quality issues







1/2 cup dry roasted chopped cicadas

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. In a small bowl, combine flour, baking



soda and salt, then set aside.

In a large bowl, combine butter, sugar, brown sugar and vanilla, then beat till creamy, incorporating eggs.

Gradually add flour mixture and insects, Stir in chocolate chips, mix well. scooping up the dough with a rounded teaspoon, drop spoonfuls onto an ungreased baking sheet.

Bake for 8 to 10 minutes. Makes approximately 3 dozen cookies.





— Camp Tannadoonah -

e are officially OVER 1000 camper registrations for this summer. We've only had 1000 campers once before – in 2019 – and we got our 1000th registration at the very end of the summer. Right now we are at 1006 and still taking registrations.

We added a week of camp this year, which is one of the reasons we are able to get to 1000 kids even with capacity limits due to COVID. We are still keeping our cabin groups smaller than normal, so our overnight sessions will actually have 35 fewer spots than our normal full capacity. But we have increased the day camp capacity by 15-20 per week, and nearly all of those day camp spots are filled for the summer.

Our first group of campers are set to check in on Sunday afternoon (the 13th). We currently have 82 kids registered for this first session, which makes it the smallest session of the summer. It should be a good test-run for our new check in process, which includes a COVID test for every camper.


We were able to obtain Abbott Labs Binax Now rapid tests, so that we can test each camper for COVID upon arrival at camp. We know it's not perfect – that someone could test negative on Sunday and then test positive on Tuesday – but it's one more screening tool we can use to try to keep our summer COVID-free. Nearly all of our staff were able to be fully vaccinated prior to arrival at camp,

as well, and many of our campers (those 12 and older) will be able to be vaccinated prior to camp.

We are continuing to follow many of the precautions we did last year, including keeping campers and staff in small groups or "cohorts". In a typical summer, campers each have an individual schedule, and campers from all cabins and groups are mixing together throughout the day. This year, and last year, the cabin groups or cohorts stay together all day – going to their activities together, eating their meals together, and sitting together during large group activities.


Following CDC guidelines for summer camps, when campers are with their own cohort or cabin, they do not need to wear masks. But when two or more cabins do an activity together, they have to have 2 of these three things: masks, distanced, and outdoors. So two cabins can play volleyball against each other with no masks, because they are outdoors and distanced. But if two cabins want to play cards at a picnic table, they need to do that outdoors and with masks, because they're not staying 6 feet apart from the other group.

Our main goal is to mitigate the spread of the virus, so that if someone at camp did test positive, we could contain the spread to a small group, and not have to shut down all of camp. We've also increased our cleaning of high touch surfaces and shared spaces, have camp-



ers sleeping head-to-toe in the cabins so their heads are farther apart, and reduced the number of campers in the cabins. We feel very lucky that we made it through last season without a COVID case, and are hoping for a similarly successful season this year.



(AED) locations on Birch Lake

FOR EMERGENCY USE ONLY ALARM WILL SOUND



There are six (6) automated external defibrillator units on Birch Lake. The boxes that contain these devices are located at the following locations (see map):

- 1. West Shore, Sheffieck home, 62875 Birch Lakeview Dr.
- 2. North Shore, Smitley home, 14859 Birch Northshore Dr.15046
- 3. East Shore, Vitale home, 63174 Birch Rd.
- 4. South Shore, Eberhart home, 15046 Birch Lakeshore Dr.
- South/East Shore, Troeger home, 63696 Birch Rd.
- 6. Southwest Shore, DeYoung home, 63255 Storey Hill St.

All units are on the ROAD SIDE of the property and accessible by vehicle or on foot.

IN AN EMERGENCY:

- 1. CALL 911 and report the emergency and the patient's location immediately.
- 2. Pull the box open, remove the orange-colored unit, TAKE IT TO THE PATIENT and open the device by pressing the white lever at the bottom.
- 3. An automated voice will guide you through the setup and use of the defibrillator. Follow the instructions as they are given.
- 4. Continue to follow the instructions as given, and stay with the patient until help arrives.
