



— Water Quality Report —

Rites of Spring...

ites of Spring are abundant throughout Mother Nature's domain. They are related to changes in weather and the normal life cycles of creatures to which we in the upper Midwest are exposed. They are particularly noticeable to those of us lucky enough to spend time at one of God's most favorite settings - Birch Lake

Not all of the results of this miraculous phasing of our world (seasonal rotation) are endeared by all of us. Let's briefly discuss two of the less popular developments related to late-spring/early summer at Birch Lake.

Fish die offs:

Although far less prevalent than last year or the year before, each year at about this time we experience some fish die offs which due to wind and waves end up on particular areas of the lake. In the past we reached out to the local fisheries biologist regarding this, and his opinion, at the time of even much larger quantities, was that it was primarily due to reproductive stress.

Cool to cold spring followed by a rapid warming along with day night changes stimulates winter weakened fish to get to the business of mating, laying eggs, and defending these eggs. With the onset of warm water, this provides a bit too much stress and the weaker fish may die as a result. Other local lakes have had similar, if not worse, experiences. As you probably already figured out on your own, some fish die offs, especially in the spring/early summer, are always a part of life at the lake and usually no particular cause of concern.

Goose poop:

Each Spring, our little flock (up to around 25 last year) of Birch Lake geese, comes "home." For those whose yards are regular recipients of goose poop, this is a big problem.

Geese love good old mowed grass and a shoreline that provides little problems with getting in and out of the water without barriers. They can consume up to 4 pounds of grass each day but are not really efficient in its digestion so they then poop out about 2 pounds of effectively 2-4-2 fertilizer. With our gaggle that could be up to 50 pounds of goose poop. It has been calculated that it only takes a single goose to overload a one acre pond with phosphorus.

These geese will be with us for several months. Goose poop is also high in bacteria including E coli and can contain salmonella, campylobacter, and listeria. Large flocks are a major reason for bacterial contamination and closing of beaches on Lake St. Clair and other places. When, not if, you come upon goose poop in your yard, do not just flick it into the lake. Collect it and toss it in the garbage or put it in a compost pile.

Due to high nitrogen and phosphorous content do not just bed it around plants. Additionally due to the bacteria and sometimes various parasites, keep your dogs away from it. For some reason they like to eat goose poop, and may normally tolerate it but can get diarrhea from it or then want to lick your face. With the increase in geese laying eggs (they like to return to the scene of the crime) this may get worse.

Last fall the Yacht Club board did research and considered professional mitigation (removal) efforts. The measures usually take up to five years of effort (and expense) and even then only reduce the size of the flock. Ours is at the low end of the quantity necessary to even get a permit. A poll of residents on the subject yielded mixed results. Nevertheless the Board voted to allow the process to begin should someone volunteer to lead it. To date, no one has come forth to accept the yoke of responsibility.

On the homefront you can set up shoreline plantings or barriers by putting in stakes with strings with some shiny stuff between them.

Goose deterrents which you spray on the grass are also effective. Those which contain anthraquinone or methyl anthranilate are supposed to be especially effective.



Safe for humans and pets, but they do make your lawn a 'not go' for geese. Anthraquinone gives them tummy discomfort and methyl anthranilate just does not taste good. They will go looking for lawns without barriers and bad taste etc. on which to leave their pounds of calling cards.

- I. Thou shalt prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species AIS)
- II. Thou shalt minimize surface runoff
- III. Thou shalt minimize the effects of waves
- IV. Thou shalt protect and expand Natural Shorelines
- V. Thou shalt not allow phosphorus, nutrients, and other undesirable chemical elements to enter our lake
- VI. Thou shalt remain informed and active about other Water Quality issues

Quiche with sausage

his quiche with sausage pairs well with fresh fruit for breakfast or brunch or is hearty with a salad and crusty bread at dinner.

Ingredients:

- 2 (9 inch) refrigerated pie crusts
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- · 2 stalks celery, finely diced
- · 1 onion, finely diced
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 pound bulk plain pork sausage
- ½ tablespoon dried sage
- 1 (8 ounce) container cottage cheese
- 8 eggs
- ½ cup milk
- 1 teaspoon dried tarragon
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon ground black pepper
- ullet 1 (8 ounce) package shredded Cheddar-Monterey Jack cheese blend

Directions:

- Step 1 Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C).
- Step 2 Unroll each crust into two 9-inch pie pans.



- Step 3 Heat oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Cook celery, onion, and garlic in the hot oil for 1 to 2 minutes. Add sausage, breaking apart to brown; sprinkle in sage and continue browning until no longer pink, 5 to 7 minutes. Remove from heat. Add cottage cheese and mix well.
- Step 4 Divide meat mixture evenly and spoon into each of the two pie crusts.
- Step 5 Whisk eggs, milk, tarragon, salt, and pepper together in a mixing bowl. Pour egg mixture over meat mixture in the pie crusts. Sprinkle Cheddar-Jack cheese over the tops.
- Step 6 Bake, uncovered, in the preheated oven on the middle rack until tops are puffed and golden brown, about 40 minutes. Remove from the oven and let stand for 5 to 10 minutes before slicing.





— Camp Tannadoonah –

hey're here! Our first group of campers for 2021 has arrived at camp and the week is off to a fun and exciting start. We have a total of 84 campers here for Session 1, with 60 overnight campers and 24 day campers.

Sunday afternoon check in went smoothly, and the campers and counselors headed to their cabins to get settled in. Once they had their bunks set up, each cabin went to the waterfront to take the swim test. The swim test helps us determine who can swim safely in the deep areas, and also who can go boating.

We haven't put our swim buoys out yet – hoping to do that this weekend – but we'd like to ask that boats please stay back from our swim area. A few boats have been coming in very close to our pier, during our lifeguard training last week and during the swim test this Sunday. Please give us a little extra space so our lifeguards can focus on keeping the kids safe, and not worry about boats.

After dinner on Sunday night, we brought the whole camp down to the waterfront for the lighting of the first campfire of the season, and to hear Mr. Adam read the Legend of Tannadoonah. Mr. Chas helped us do a rewrite of the Legend this year, and the new version is great.


Our National Camp Fire Headquarters has been doing a lot of work the past

few years around the idea of cultural appropriation. Of particular concern is the use of Native American references – for instance, using made up stories that are made to sound true Native legends, fake words that are meant to sound Native, and references to Native symbols and history without real information.

At Camp Tannadoonah, we have been in contact with the local Pokagon Band of Pottawatomie Indians, and asked them to review some of our legends and stories and practices. The members we worked with requested that we not use made up stories that have no basis in fact (such as our old "Legend of Tannadoonah"), and make them sound like they are true Native stories. They also requested that we not use made up words and claim they have real meaning in their Native languages.


We have always said that "Tannadoonah" means "a gathering of friends, on a hill, above a lake, among the trees," as if it's a real Native word with real meaning. Since learning that it is not, and does not have that meaning, we have changed our phrasing. We're not planning at this time to change the name – but we are saying instead that "Camp Tannadoonah" stands for, or represents, a gathering of friends, etc., and no longer telling kids that it's a Native word with real meaning.

We're trying to be sensitive to the



fact that many camps, like ours, have long used Native American imagery, stories, and symbols, and in many cases using them improperly or incorrectly. We're not making a big deal of this with campers – just making changes to the language we use the stories we tell, as a way of showing respect to the people who inhabited these lands long before we did.





EMERGENCY HEART DEFIBRILLATOR

(AED) locations on Birch Lake



CALL 9-1-1



FOR EMERGENCY USE ONLY ALARM WILL SOUND



There are six (6) automated external defibrillator units on Birch Lake. The boxes that contain these devices are located at the following locations (see map):

- 1. West Shore, Sheffieck home, 62875 Birch Lakeview Dr.
- 2. North Shore, Smitley home, 14859 Birch Northshore Dr.15046
- 3. East Shore, Vitale home, 63174 Birch Rd.
- 4. South Shore, Eberhart home, 15046 Birch Lakeshore Dr.
- South/East Shore, Troeger home, 63696 Birch Rd.
- 6. Southwest Shore, DeYoung home, 63255 Storey Hill St.

All units are on the ROAD SIDE of the property and accessible by vehicle or on foot.

IN AN EMERGENCY:

- 1. CALL 911 and report the emergency and the patient's location immediately.
- 2. Pull the box open, remove the orange-colored unit, TAKE IT TO THE PATIENT and open the device by pressing the white lever at the bottom.
- 3. An automated voice will guide you through the setup and use of the defibrillator. Follow the instructions as they are given.
- 4. Continue to follow the instructions as given, and stay with the patient until help arrives.
