



— Water Quality Report — Commandment # 5 ... no phosphorus

t's time to review with you our Commandment # 5, "Thou Shalt Not Allow Phosphorus, Nutrients and other Chemicals to Enter Our Lake."

Phosphorus is a chemical element required for all forms of life, necessary for every cellular process that uses energy. It is used most extensively in fertilizer. It is the "limiting factor" in many, and particularly in aquatic, ecosystems. This means it is the variable in which a small change in the quantity of phosphorus DIRECTLY CAUSES A SUBSTANTIAL CHANGE in the output (growth) of the system (plants and algae.)

While virtually all nutrients are considered to be undesirable, preventing or the reducing the volume of phosphorus getting into an inland lake is commonly held to be the SINGLE MOST SIGNIFI-CANT FACTOR in preserving, or advancing, the water quality of inland lakes.

Due to its depth and limited inlets and outlets, it takes some 15 years to drain and replenish all the water in Birch Lake. Whatever we let, or gets, into our lake will be there for a very long time. So our need to ward off the entry of phosphorous, and other undesirable elements, is crucially acute. Accordingly, we ask that you: 1) Consider not using any fertilizer on your property

2) If you must fertilize, please:

A. Do so only once per year, in as small a quantity, and as far away from the shoreline, as possible.

B. Make sure the fertilizer contains no phosphorus

C. Recall that the other nutrients in fertilizer are undesirable also.

3) Shovel and load out ashes.

4) Don't allow leaves or other vegetation to get into the lake.

5) Bear in mind that anything left on the surface within our watershed will eventually get into the lake.

6) Pick up and properly dispose of animal waste.

7) Don't feed any wildlife, particularly not ducks, swans, or geese.

8) Between your lawn and shoreline plant a barrier strip, as wide as possible, of deeply rooted native plants at least 12"
24" tall to minimize erosion and catch undesirable elements from entering the water. [This barrier strip may also help discourage geese from entering, and making deposits upon, your lawn area.]
9)Be aware that wave, or wake, action, particularly in shallow water, stirs up and sends back into the water column,



existing phosphorus that had previously settled to the bottom and attached itself to material there.

10] Consider not using any weed killer or other chemicals on your property. If you must, please do so in limited quantities, away from the lake and not on a windy day or before a rain event.

11) Recall that natural shorelines are one of our very best bets at limiting phosphorus in our lake.




mote our 100th anniversary event, and for fundraising purposes.


