Slow down on Yacht Club road







PLEASE HELP PROTECT ONE OF BIRCH'S NICEST LANDMARKS!

Each and every time I approach Birch Lake (from the south on Birch Road), my spirits begin to lift immediately upon my first glimpse of the water while descending the hill towards the landing. But that's only the beginning!

Then I veer to the right and soon pass beneath and through a magnificent canopy of trees. Instantly it seems I am fully purged of any tension or trouble that had been within me.

Just like that, the transformation has been completed. My world is good, very, very good. I am at peace, right where God wants me to be. I hope you too have experienced this phenomenon.

Now the bad part...

Currently active in our area are numerous crews (a veritable army) of workers and machinery maiming (trimming) and removing trees wherever they go. Hired by MEC to provide "additional clearance" for their overhead main power lines, these crews have our bucolic canopy in their sights, are bearing down on us, and will be arriving shortly.

In order to save the trees in this area, MEC would be willing to bury (via boring) their mainline, should we be willing to reimburse their costs, currently estimated at up to \$46,500. 

unday's wind was a bust, but the BLYC--Camp Tannadoonah Junior Sailing Program is a BLAST! No sailing on Sunday. We did get a very nice breeze for a while starting before 9 am on the east side. It quickly had the American flags along the shoreline waving proudly in the wind. But those weather apps are getting remarkably accurate from several days into the future. Maybe it's due to advances in artificial intelligence, but whatever the reason, it is very irritating when a computer prediction of very light wind for a Sunday at Birch Lake comes true, a very promising breeze subsides with a whimper, and our sailing races have to be canceled. One can almost hear the app whispering "I told you so!" But then again, a day on the golf course with my beautiful bride is not so bad, either!

Also on the bright side, Monday was the first day of the BLYC--Camp Tannadoonah Junior Sailing Program--and the program is off to a great start!

The Junior Sailing Program was developed over the winter, in conjunction with our very own Amber Grundy, who is not only a BLYC Sailor, but also CEO of Camp Tannadoonah. The idea was to combine the resources of the BLYC Sailors, who needed an influx of younger people, with Camp Tannadoonah's sailing classes that are just starting up this year for the first time since Covid started, and could use some experienced racing sailors as instructors.

Commodore Barb Cassady, who is also a BLYC Sailor, has taken a leadership role in the planning, development and implementation of the Junior Sailing Program from the very beginning, and was the first person to volunteer with the Junior Sailing Program as a sailing instructor. Others who have already joined Commodore Barb on the schedule as sailing instructors are Pat Welch, Pat McGann and myself. Bob Niezgodski is planning to join in later this summer, and several others may be able to do so, depending upon their circumstances.

Camp Tannadoonah offers eight weeks of one-week sailing classes, Monday through Friday. Some weeks have two classes per afternoon, some have four classes, and some have six classes per afternoon. Already, we have an experienced BLYC Sailor on the schedule in 38% of Camp Tannadoonah's sailing classes for this summer, and it appears that this percentage will increase.

So on Monday, it was a real joy for me to walk through a bustling Camp Tannadoonah, filled with bustling activity and happy voices, descend the beautiful staircase down the hill that was so generously funded by many of our Birch Lake families whose names appear on plaques on the stairs, and return to a summer camp waterfront as a participant for the first time since leaving my beloved Camp Martin Johnson in Irons, Michigan in 1968. And this time, not as a camper, but as a sailing instructor! It was delightful to meet Mr. Kyle the waterfront director, young Mr.

Ben and Ms. Saige who are my fellow sailing instructors; and all of the other wonderful water sports instructors. Camp Tannadoonah certainly hires great people!

The campers all wait at the waterfront entrance to be allowed to enter and sign in on the buddy-board system. Very safety conscious! Then we got to meet our young campers, and jump right into sailing instruction. Amber had provided pdf's of the well-written lesson plans, which I had studied. Monday's lesson is the basics. Learning the nautical terms for directions and the parts of the boat. Learning how to rig the boat with sail, daggerboard and rudder. Making sure each camper can perform each task by themselves. Wind direction and its effect on the boat. How to stop the boat in a high wind. How to keep from tipping over. What to do if a sailor falls overboard. And the campers' favorite: Tipping the boat over in shallow water, and showing each camper how to right the boat by themselves. Sharing knowledge and experience. Building safety consciousness, knowledge, ability and self-confidence. Fostering a love of the great outdoors in the fresh air and blue water and bright sunshine.

I spent 41 years as a trial lawyer in Chicago, on civil cases. I loved doing that, especially the part about serving clients. But for me, sharing my knowledge and experience with young people is even better. This summer is going to fly by very fast!

Water Clarity

e are sure that one of the more obvious changes that residents of the lake see and are aware of as the season progresses, is the change in the clarity of the water. The visibility of the bottom especially at drop-offs changes and is lost, and on weekends one has trouble seeing the bottom from the end of the pier. Formally, we (Water Quality Committee) regularly measure the clarity using a metal disk called a secchi disk. This disk has alternating white and black triangles, and as it is lowered into the water column, we note the distance at which this disk is no longer observable. The best we have seen over the years is about 50 feet in the spring and worst has been about 5-6 feet in mid summer. We always measure at the same spot on the lake, i.e. deepest place in the lake and not on weekends. What actually generates this seasonal disparity and what does it mean in terms of our enjoyment of Birch Lake.

In the very early spring, the water is reasonably clear but not at its peak. We tend to have more runoff from land with spring storms and high winds leading to turbulence which can reach the bottom as there is no thermocline, that junction between lower density warm water and high density cold water. The thermocline becomes more distinct as the upper layer of water warms up and forms a barrier to the easy mixing of the upper and lower layers of water reducing disturbance of the bottom and raising of sediment into the water column. However, also in the spring, boat traffic is minimal, and sediment settles. With the development of the thermocline storms do not cause the same mixing of the bottom, and we tend to have our best clarity in mid to late May and may extend into June.

With warmer weather we have a host of issues that lead to a reduction in the clarity of the water. One is just boat traffic. The prop wash and wave action can raise considerable amounts of sediment which takes time to settle. This can be accentu-

ated by boats with deeper drafts and more powerful engines pushing prop wash deeper in the water column. One should avoid accelerating a boat in water less than 20 feet, and with deep hulled boats even deeper. Secondly, raising sediment at this time can increase the phosphorous (nutrient) content of the water and the combination of sun, warmer water, and nutrients leads to algal growth. Increased algae means less clarity to go along with suspended sediment. The third component is calcium carbonate. Our lake is spring fed, and many of the springs flow through limestone deposits. Thus, the water will leach some calcium carbonate form the rocks, and that gets into the lake. The warm water of summer will tend to cause the calcium carbonate to precipitate (clump) and provide almost a little gravish blue haze to the water. This calcium carbonate as it settles to the bottom of the lake creates marl.

The clarity of the water is not overtly due to any of the three issues but the combination. Our measured algal levels (we measure chlorophyll actually as a surrogate) has never been really high as we are not a high nutrient lake. Also, the levels will ebb and flow. With an increase in algae, we get an increase in the microscopic animals (mostly copepods – think daphnia or water fleas) which graze on the algae. As the algae decrease the copepods



decrease, and the algae grows again. A regular cycle. If we were a high algae lake, we would not have the grayish cast but a deep green.

As summer leads to fall, the water cools, the calcium carbonate precipitation becomes much less, algal growth slows down due to sun and temperatures, and sediment from all the boat traffic is vastly reduced. The water will begin to clear and we will start another cycle in the spring. In the absence of nutrient loading of the lake and truly enhanced algal growth, none of this affects the health of the lake and our ability to enjoy it safely.

THE SIX COMMANDMENTS OF BIRCH LAKE WATER QUALITY

- I. Thou shalt prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS).
- II. Thou shalt minimize surface runoff
- III. Thou shalt minimize the effects of waves.
- IV. Thou shalt protect and ex-

pand Natural Shorelines.

- V. Thou shalt not allow phosphorus, nutrients, and other undesirable chemical elements to enter our lake.
- VI. Thou shalt remain informed and active about other Water Quality issues






Step 1 Preheat an outdoor grill for high heat and lightly oil grate.

he first two days of Camp 2022 have certainly been an adventure! We're hoping the rest of the week isn't quite so eventful! As I write this on

Tuesday morning, the power is still out from Monday night's storms.

We greeted our first group of campers on Sunday afternoon, with 66 overnight campers checking in. We were excited to eat all together in the Dining Hall for dinner, for the first time in two years. It was so fun to hear the noise and excitement in the dining room again. We held our first campfire at the waterfront, and shared the Legend of Tannadoonah with the campers, followed by the lighting of the first fire of the camp season.

Monday morning we had 25 day campers arrive to join our overnight group, giving us a total of 91 campers for the first session. We have gone back to our "normal" daily schedule of activities, which meant there was a lot of confusion for the campers and staff who have been here the past two years and only knew the way we did it for the most recent two summers! It was a fun day full of activity for everyone.

Monday night is always cookout night at camp, and we managed to get all our cookout fires lit and food cooked before the rain and storms rolled in. The power went out around 8:30, but thankfully we have a generator that powers the Dining Hall and Shower House. The staff had all of the campers gathered in our three buildings that have basements, in case we needed to move downstairs if a tornado warning was issued. Luckily we didn't have to take everyone down to the basements

Tuesday morning with the power still out, the kitchen decided to flip-flop the lunch and dinner menus — so we had sub sandwiches, wraps, and salad bar for breakfast! We're hoping the power comes back on in time for lunch — Belgian Waffles is on the menu! Since most of our activities are outside, the lack of power really doesn't have a huge effect on us, except for in the kitchen and office. The generator keeps our freezers and fridges from going down, and gives us lights and water, but doesn't power the ovens, dishwasher, or other appliances. So it's cold items on the menu for the moment!

We're expecting these next couple days to have record-setting high temperatures, so we're working hard to keep everyone hydrated and cool here at camp. We'll be having additional time at the waterfront with extended open swims, evening activities at the lake, and sprinklers set up for kids to cool off during the day. We're encouraging everyone to keep a wet towel or bandan-



na on their neck or head to stay cool, and drinking LOTS of water! It's usually 7-10 degrees cooler up here at the lake / in the woods than it is in town.

Don't forget to mark your calendars for the annual pancake breakfast on Sunday, July 3 from 8:30-11am. The camp store will be open too, and we have some great new t-shirt and sweatshirts this year!



EMERGENCY HEART DEFIBRILLATOR

(AED) locations on Birch Lake



CALL 9-1-1



FOR EMERGENCY USE ONLY ALARM WILL SOUND



There are six (6) automated external defibrillator units on Birch Lake. The boxes that contain these devices are located at the following locations (see map):

- 1. West Shore, Sheffieck home, 62875 Birch Lakeview Dr.
- 2. North Shore, Smitley home, 14859 Birch Northshore Dr.15046
- 3. East Shore, Vitale home, 63174 Birch Rd.
- 4. South Shore, Eberhart home, 15046 Birch Lakeshore Dr.
- South/East Shore, Troeger home, 63696 Birch Rd.
- 6. Southwest Shore, DeYoung home, 63255 Storey Hill St.

All units are on the ROAD SIDE of the property and accessible by vehicle or on foot.

IN AN EMERGENCY:

- 1. CALL 911 and report the emergency and the patient's location immediately.
- 2. Pull the box open, remove the orange-colored unit, TAKE IT TO THE PATIENT and open the device by pressing the white lever at the bottom.
- 3. An automated voice will guide you through the setup and use of the defibrillator. Follow the instructions as they are given.
- 4. Continue to follow the instructions as given, and stay with the patient until help arrives.
