

Commodore's Comments #8 July 16, 2022

lext weekend is the 113th Chicago Yacht Club Race to Mackinac, also known as 'The Mac.' Referred to as America's Offshore Challenge, the race starts from Chicago's Navy Pier and extends 289 nautical miles, finishing at Mackinac Island. It is one of the world's largest annual offshore regattas, and in 1985 and 1986 my husband Tom and I were lucky to be a part of a six-man (or really 5-man, 1 woman) team racing a Tartan 10, 33-foot keelboat.

The Mac races in which we participated were unlike anything we'd ever done before. We'd grown up sailing and racing small inland boats but had never experienced anything of this scale. The regatta typically has 330 boats with over 3,000 sailors competing and for the division we sailed in, the race spanned multiple days, meaning we sailed and slept on the boat.

The race start is chaotic but exciting and colorful. Before one race start I remember a guy (probably the dad) standing on a boat's cabin stairs and holding up what looked to be a one-year old child as if to say, "Someday child, this will be you skippering this boat in this race." Crazy, right? Once we had officially started we



got down to business. Each crew member had their place and tasks. Mine was usually light ballast and some sail trimming. Our team consisted of our skipper/owner, his brother, his best friend, his dentist (you never know when you might need an emergency root canal), myself and my husband Tom. Tom and I were just happy to be along for the ride.

There was one instance where I got the chance to try to prove myself. We were well underway in the middle of the lake (winds blowing 15-20 knots) when a halyard line broke on one of our sails. The skipper said we needed to send someone up the mast in a bosun's chair (a device

top. My husband looked at me with eyes imploring me to be brave and agree to the task. Not knowing any better and by nature a people-pleaser, of course I said "Yes!" Minutes later I was being hoisted up the mast while under sail in windy conditions which made it both tricky and scary. It was one of the scariest moments I've ever had in sailing. Unfortunately, I was the bearer of bad news reporting the halyard had gone into the mast. Once back on deck, the skipper sent the closest person we had to an engineer, the dentist, up the mast, who after a couple tries figured out how to retrieve the halyard. We were back on track!

One night around 2 am we had an even scarier situation. I was on the three-person crew sailing a three-hour shift while the other crew slept a few hours. All of a sudden, the wind shifted 180 degrees bringing with it, a bad storm. The wind now instead of being behind us was blowing directly at us. We were flying our spinnaker, a large, colorful sail in the front of our boat which can really propel a boat but can be hard to control under certain circumstances, which we were in currently. Things got hairy when we tried to get the spinnaker down and the jib sail up. At one point I was steering the boat while the skipper tried to get the spinnaker down, and after rounding up into the wind and the boat heeling over to where it felt

like it would tip, and the three sleeping guys were dumped out of their berths and came up on deck swearing, suddenly finding themselves in a rainy, windy storm. It took all of us working together for the next 15-20 minutes to get the boat sails re-set, and when things were under control we realized we were heading straight for shore ... Beaver Island. The skipper adjusted our course and we were once again back on track. It is humbling when you realize how fast things can change on Lake Michigan and how things can quickly go from a controlled, quiet, beautiful night sail to all hell breaking loose within minutes.

One morning we were sailing in fog so thick you couldn't see anything around you. It was eerie when we heard the intro to Dire Straits' "Money for Nothing" ... "I want my MTV..." well before a boat appeared, much larger and faster, passing us on the right. As fast as it came into view, it was out of sight with the lyrics soon unheard.

Finishing a Mac race is a welcome experience. By the end of the race, you are exhausted, ready to get your feet on solid ground where you can have a hot shower, some real food and a drink. The Pink Pony Bar on Mackinac Island was where all the sailors met up once the race was finished. The room was filled with sailors, all weaving side to side after days of continuous sailing. Stories were shared and we were

happy to have completed the race intact. The camaraderie was incredible, and all were smiling from sunburnt faces with strong outlines from their sunglasses. Our team had come through and knew we'd always have these races to share and reminiscence.

Speaking of sharing, I want to take this opportunity to thank (South side) Ronni Eshleman for sharing her time with us by helping plan the annual boat parade. I inadvertently failed to mention Ronni in last week's review of the Boat Parade. Ronni's seasoned planning paid off with a smoothly run, successful event. Thanks so much Ronni!






Birch Lake Flotilla



Interlake MC Regatta planned at Indian Lake, July 23!

As some of you know, the Interlake Regatta was re-inaugurated last year with a fantastic regatta at Diamond Lake, the Reid Francis Memorial Regatta. This tradition will continued this year at Indian Lake on July 23, honoring Indian Lake's Past Commodore, long-time RC member and former C Scow sailor Don Blackmond. It's a one-day regatta, allowing sailors to return to their home clubs for sailing on Sunday if they wish.

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
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FLEET CAPTAIN'S CORNER



Things sailors do on a day without wind

s the sun began to rise over Birch Lake last Sunday morning, there was absolutely no wind. The surface of Birch Lake was a perfect mirror, reflecting the trees and houses on the opposite shore. A quick check of a couple of weather apps showed the wind would be only 1 to 2 mph during race hours. And with no improvement in the wind speed as race time got closer, sailboat races had to be canceled for the day. Therefore, there are no race results to publish this week.

Ancient sailors concluded that the earth must be round, because when a sailing ship was seen approaching a harbor from far away, only the top sails of the ship were visible at first, then the middle sails as the ship got closer, and finally the full ship became visible. So did you know that on a calm day you can actually observe and measure the curvature of the Earth on the surface of Birch Lake? Believe it or not, it's true, and you can try it yourself the next time the lake is like a mirror. (It won't work if there are waves.)

Here are the easy steps to follow:

1. Bring some friends and/or family with you for fun.

2. Take along a plastic 12" ruler too, and wade into Birch Lake shoulder-high.

- 3 Pick out a bright, light-colored object on the opposite shore. It is very important that this light-colored object be as close to the waterline of Birch Lake as possible. For example, a white boat at the water's edge.
- 4. Keeping your eyes focused on the light-colored object on the opposite shore, lower yourself down into the water until your nose is submerged but your eyes remain just above water. As you do so, you will see the light-colored object disappear from your view. This is because the surface of Birch Lake is not flat, it is curved by gravity.
- 5. Raise up very slowly out of the water, until the light-colored object appears into your view again.
- 6. Repeat steps 4 and 5 a few times, just for fun.

Now for the hard math part:

7. Holding the plastic ruler vertically, measure the distance from the lake's surface to the level of your eyes where the light-colored object appears and disappears as you move up and down. This number of inches will be the amount that the Earth curves over the distance between your location and the bright-colored object on the opposite shore.

- 8. Go home and open Google Maps on your computer, find Birch Lake, select "Measure Distance," and find the distance between where you were, and the light-colored object on the opposite shore. For example, it's 1 mile from the boat launch on the South Side to the north end of The Cove
- 9. So now you have the number of vertical inches that the Earth curves between you and the light-colored object. and you know the straight-line distance between you and the light-colored object.

With those two numbers, I believe that you could calculate the circumference of the Earth. Please notice that I said "you," not "me" or "I." I'm just a history major, so I'll stick to the part about the tall sailing ships. My beautiful bride Jackie the accountant could probably do it, but she's busy right now. If any of you can calculate the circumference of the Earth using this Birch Lake method, please email me at stephenbfrew@gmail. com anytime this summer, and you'll get your name in this column.

So much for this week. I sure hope we get some good wind for races next Sunday!

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

Commandment # 4

et's now discuss Commandment # 4: "Thou Shalt Protect and Expand Natural Shorelines"

We often write [preach?] about the dangers of allowing phosphorus and other nutrients into our lake. While this is indeed extremely important, did you know that the 2007 National Lakeshore Assessment indicated that far more Michigan inland lakes are stressed by poor shoreline conditions than by excesses of nutrients or turbidity?

Shorelines:

- Dictate what gets into the lake
- Provide key animal habitat and breeding areas
- Serve as important fish nursery areas

Prevent (or hasten) soil erosion.

The "lawns and seawalls (that most of us have) change the lake ecosystem in ways that are hard to reverse." Hard shorelines have physical, biological and chemical impacts.

In terms of our environment and protecting our lake, natural shorelines yield the best results. Ironically, they are even our best bet at limiting phosphorus.

An optimum natural shorelines includes many components:

- Submerged vegetation (in the water)
- Emergent or floating vegetation (in the water)

The Moon for

• Woody debris (beached logs or

sticks) (in the water)

- A secured, gradual (climbable by turtles) slope up from the water's edge
- And, at the top of the slope, before the lawn, a barrier strip (the wider the better) of at least 12" - 24" tall native, deep-rooted-plants.

In a perfect world the gradual slope would be made of and secured by native plants, perhaps initially held in place by natural fabrics or logs. Seyfarths (northeast corner) comes to mind as meeting many of these criteria.

The barrier strip helps to prevent erosion but also captures many chemicals on their way to the lake. It also makes your lawn area less desirable to geese. Please pick up whatever deposits geese (or other living beings) might leave on your property and throw them, not into the lake, but into the trash.

Although not 100% natural, a gradual slope of riprap (cobbles and boulders) is more desirable than a solid concrete wall. A gradual slope of riprap could be installed in place or in front (on the lake side) of a poured concrete seawall, thus mitigating some of its negative effects. Kudos to the Woznys (south) and Troegers (east side).

Even those with riprap and/or a poured concrete wall could install and maintain any of the other features of a natural shoreline described above.

A hardened shoreline, absent any of these natural characteristics, used to be considered by many of us lake folks to be highly desirable. Instead, water



quality experts have referred them to as "aquatic deserts".

In 2017, using methods and standards provided as part of the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program, we subjected our lake to a "Score the Shore" evaluation. Due to our performance (or lack of) on the factors listed above, and the amount of development around the lake, we received a Below-Average score. Our score today might be a little higher, but not too much different, still likely below average.

Fresh strawberry coffee cake

Ingredients

- ¼ cup butter
- ¾ cup white sugar
- 1 egg
- 1½ cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ cup milk
- 1½ cups thinly sliced strawberries
- ½ cup all-purpose flour
- ½ cup white sugar
- ¼ cup butter, softened
- ¼ cup flaked coconut


Directions

- Step 1 Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease a 9-inch baking pan.
- Step 2 Beat 1/4 cup butter in a bowl until creamy; add 3/4 cup sugar and egg. Beat until fully incorporated.
- Step 3 Mix 1 1/2 cup flour, baking powder, and salt together in a separate bowl. Stir flour mixture, alternating with milk, into butter mixture until combined. Pour batter into prepared baking pan. Arrange strawberries atop the batter.
- Step 4 Mix 1/2 cup flour, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 cup butter,



and coconut together in a bowl. Sprinkle topping over straw-

• Step 5 - Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted in the center of the cake comes out clean, about 35 minutes.

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



EMERGENCY HEART DEFIBRILLATOR

(AED) locations on Birch Lake



CALL 9-1-1



FOR EMERGENCY USE ONLY ALARM WILL SOUND



There are six (6) automated external defibrillator units on Birch Lake. The boxes that contain these devices are located at the following locations (see map):

- 1. West Shore, Sheffieck home, 62875 Birch Lakeview Dr.
- 2. North Shore, Smitley home, 14859 Birch Northshore Dr.15046
- 3. East Shore, Vitale home, 63174 Birch Rd.
- 4. South Shore, Eberhart home, 15046 Birch Lakeshore Dr.
- South/East Shore, Troeger home, 63696 Birch Rd.
- 6. Southwest Shore, DeYoung home, 63255 Storey Hill St.

All units are on the ROAD SIDE of the property and accessible by vehicle or on foot.

IN AN EMERGENCY:

- 1. CALL 911 and report the emergency and the patient's location immediately.
- 2. Pull the box open, remove the orange-colored unit, TAKE IT TO THE PATIENT and open the device by pressing the white lever at the bottom.
- 3. An automated voice will guide you through the setup and use of the defibrillator. Follow the instructions as they are given.
- 4. Continue to follow the instructions as given, and stay with the patient until help arrives.



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
