Thanks everyone.







— Water Quality Report —

Birch Lake - a Cass County gem

Te read on a weekly basis articles about our lake water quality here in the Birch Barker, and what is needed and being done to maintain our lake. Birch Lake is the place we love to swim, sail, boat, ski, go tubing, bike, take nature walks and its homes are snatched up like greased lightning when they are put on the market.

Why is Birch Lake so desired besides the above-mentioned things? Clearly (literally) it must be the water that is so clean and clear that we can see the bottom of the lake most days. Water so clear that we can sit on the pier and see numerous varieties of fish and turtles as they swim by. Water so clean and clear that we love to swim in it. Oh, and let's not forget the fantastic fish that are pulled from the lake that just might be tonight's dinner.

Unfortunately, there are many things that threaten our lake and without a vigilant water quality committee all those things we enjoy about Birch Lake are in jeopardy. Why is it then that the water quality of our lake doesn't really seem to be our top priority?

Surprisingly, our water quality goal meter shows that currently only 53 percent of our residents contribute to help fight the fight, so if water clarity is number 1 on our list, why isn't that num-


ber higher?

Clear, clean, healthy water is the goal, and it can only be done with your help. Because in 100 years from now I hope articles will be written about how clean and clear Birch Lake is, like the article I recently found printed in a 1912 edition of the Niles Daily Sun!

Let me share some of the finer parts of that full page article written by the Daily Sun's Editor after spending several days as guests at "Penwallah," the summer home of Chas. E. Smith.

BIRCH LAKE, A CASS GEM, HAS ATTRACTIONS ALL ITS OWN September 5, 1912

- The waters of Birch Lake are the deepest, the coldest, the clearest, and therefore its fish are the best to be found in any of Michigan's small inland lakes. Yet notwithstanding the coldness of the deep waters the shallow beaches are unsurpassed for bathing and the sun warms the water to an agreeable temperature...
- Its waters have that deep clear greenish blue cast that Lake Michigan has, which indicates great depth and a clean bottom free from mud...
- Birch Lake is feed by springs, and the opinion of advanced scientists say the source of supply may even be as far away as northern Wisconsin and the upper lake region area, which would account for the coldness of the water supply and



its resemblance to the big lakes in color.

The north shore of Birch Lake where the cottage of Chas. E. Smith and Fred Schmidt are located possesses a distinct advantage from the fact that beautiful springs gush from the banks. "Penwallah" is supplied from a spring that gushes up at the very edge of the lake, the water being as cool as if from a refrigerator and of a quality that excites the desire for more. This water has no mineral taste but is said to compare with the finest waters in the world.

Obviously, it IS the clear clean water that is Birch Lakes' main attraction, they thought so over 100 years ago. Hopefully 100 years from now the same things can be reported about our Birch Lake, if water quality is our number one concern and we help our lakes Water Quality Committee however we can.

If we don't care for it, who will? Thank you, Darlene!

Where the money goes for the BLYC

s Commodore, I would like to thank all of you who volunteered and participated in Yacht Club events this season making the summer of 2024 a success. Earlier in this season, the officers and directors of the Yacht Club were entrusted with the task of delivering to the Birch Lake families an accounting of what and where the money goes that our members donate to the club each year. A committee was formed to analyze the data and present findings to the board before the end of the year. This committee worked hard to compile this information and presented it at our last board meeting August 10, showing a projected deficit in December 31, 2024, in the General Fund of approximately \$2,000. The board then acted swiftly to approve a series of actions that, when completed, will balance the Yacht Club's activities and resolve the projected deficit.

Before the raw numbers are presented, I'd like to reflect on what Birch Lake and the Yacht Club offers to its residents.

I think we can all agree that the

Lake is a very special place. This is a community that is unique in its character and commitment to meeting the needs of all lakers through its Homeowners Association (that handles tax and legal issues, governmental relations, and public access site matters, among other things), the Yacht Club, and our collective diligence towards keeping our waters clean and our community strong. In particular, the Yacht Club was designed to act as a community center, open to all residents for meetings, events, private parties, yoga, cards, and other activities.

The physical club building has served the needs of the lake community since 1957. In 1968 a huge storm blew in and rainwater eroded the foundation on the west side of the club, sending a landslide of mud onto the Yacht Club floor. I can recall many of the men, women, and children of this community, coming out with shovels and mops to remove the water and debris. There was a strong feeling of ownership in the club that is still found today.

The reason the Yacht Club board formed the committee to review our financial status and present it to the residents is because we want to clear up any misconceptions about what the club does and doesn't do, and to be fully transparent about where Yacht Club dues and donations go.

One Big Myth that must be dispelled is that the Yacht Club was built and is maintained for the express purpose of providing a place for parties and alcohol consumption. Although some events cater to the adult crowd, families are all invited to the corn and sausage roast, the spaghetti dinner, and the family picnic. The club also sponsors the Kidz Regatta, and this year a kids' kayak race.

Over the past three years the net cost of all events has been an average of only \$295 per year – less than \$25 per event. The majority of that amount went to purchasing margarita mix this year and last year for the Commodore/Vice Commodore Party, with the remainder of the money spent on water, pop, and decorations. Yacht Club members are asked to donate beer or wine at the beginning of the season, and at the end of the season any surplus is raffled off and donated back to the club.

That old myth should be busted! So what does the Yacht Club do,

and what are the benefits of membership?

- Directing our consultants in dealing with invasive species in our lake. Our local management not requiring us to experience the delays and problems of going through a governmental body like other nearby lakes allows us to respond more promptly to water quality issues, using our water quality funds. Please refer to the Water Quality article that will be presented in next week's Barker for a more detailed report.
- Publishing the Birch Lake Barker, a unique weekly summer community newspaper, providing all lakers information on Lake activities, issues and concerns. An online Barker is made available each month during the off-season.
- Printing a Birch Lake directory distributed to all members every other year.
- Maintaining six AEDs around the Lake with new batteries and pads, as needed.
- Providing and maintaining a Yacht Club building available for events, meetings, cards, yoga, with rental available to all members at a nominal cost.
- Managing the Lake's annual fireworks.
- Maintaining a competitive MC and Sunfish fleet. This year we were able to host an Inter-Lake Regatta with representation from area lakes and with sailors coming as far away as Florida, Colorado and South Carolina.
- Providing the opportunity for residents to be part of a community that shares the common goal of making Birch Lake a better place now and for future generations.

Virtually all the money in the Birch Lake Yacht Club balances is designated for four funds: Water Quality, Building/Roof fund, Sailing, and Fireworks. The remaining General Fund is used to support the Yacht Club's maintenance, insurance, utilities, property taxes, the online and printed Barker, events not fully covered by sponsors or fees, AED maintenance and some minor miscellaneous expenses.

After reading the Yacht Club's financial reports found in this Barker, two conclusions can be made here:

- 1) Our dues and donations to the General Fund do not provide sufficient funding for our regular operating costs.
- 2) The General Fund will have a negative balance at the end of the year of close to \$2,000. After paying for fireworks, water quality charges, taxes, year-end maintenance and other operating expenses for the rest of the year, we forecast the Yacht Club's total fund balances as of December 31, 2024 will be \$61,000. However, this amount is less than the \$63,000 we have in special accounts. Over the years, members designated that some of their donations be set aside for particular purposes. Those specially designated year-end fund balances include: a balance of \$42,200 in the Water Quality Fund; a balance of \$17,700 in the Building/Roof fund (of which at least \$15,000 will be needed to replace the roof in the next two to five years); a balance of \$2,400 in the Sailing fund; and \$700 in the Fireworks Fund.

At the end of the financial reports found in this Barker, the board identifies the specific financial issues we face and the actions being taken to address them. Please take the time to review this information in detail and ask any of your board directors any questions you wish.

Here are the Birch Lake Yacht Club Projected Fund Balances at 12/31/2024 and the Projected Income and Expenses for the Year Ending 12/31/2024. These were prepared to support the identification of Issues and Actions needed.

ISSUES AND ACTIONS

Based on the above financial information, the Yacht Club Board identified the following Issues and voted to take Actions as noted below to address the General Fund situation:

- 1) **ISSUE**: The General Fund Dues and Donations of \$7,609 do not cover the Yacht Club Operating Expenses of \$8,874. Further, the AED Donations of \$1,345 do not cover the AED Maintenance costs of \$2,694. **ACTION**: Dues for 2025 will increase from \$30 to \$50, the first change in 9 years.
- 2) ISSUE: Barker Ad Revenue of \$2,735 does not cover Barker/Directory Printing and Software costs of \$5,639. ACTIONS: Increase ad rates. Seek additional advertisers using a committee of volunteers. Seek sponsors. Be sure to see next week's Barker for an important announcement on sponsorship!
- 3) ISSUE: The Family Picnic and all other Events cost the Yacht Club \$1,975, paid from savings. ACTIONS: Require all Events to be budgeted to at least breakeven. Institute new procedure that the Yacht Club will <u>not</u> spend any money on beer, wine or spirits in the future.
- 4) ISSUE: The General Fund is projected to be in deficit at December 31, 2024 by approximately \$2,000. ACTION: Seek "Angel Donors" among the Lake residents to eliminate the deficit.

We hope the Lake Community will support your Board's actions in setting up the Yacht Club for the future. Please contact any member of the Board's Directors if you have any questions.

We expect to address follow-up questions raised in future Barkers.

We hope you will join together with other residents and members in supporting the actions approved by your board in setting up the Yacht Club for the future.

Earl Troeger Jr. Memorial Interlake MC regatta a huge success

OW! The Earl Troeger, Jr. Memorial Interlake MC Regatta was a huge success! Supported by a great crowd of BLYC volunteers, 22 MC's set out for three races on Birch Lake, encountering sunshine, big wind, clouds, drenching rain without lightning, shifting wind, and more sunshine. Nineteen of the MC's made it to the finish line of the third race. Then off to the clubhouse for a wonderful luncheon honoring the memory of Scott Troeger's uncle, Birch Lake's very own Earl Troeger, Jr. who was Snipe world champion in 1965, a record three-time commodore of the BLYC, and a passionate and effective advocate for the sport of sailing.

The guests of honor were seven members of the Troeger family, including two of Earl's three sons and their wives. These are Tom Troeger and his wife Libby; and Dave Troeger and his wife Christine, who were joined by Scott and Holly Troeger, and their daughter Tory. Scott, Tom and Dave were among ten Troeger cousins who grew up summering together at Birch Lake, so Dave Troeger was entitled to sail on behalf of the BLYC in the Regatta. Former west siders Keith Clairo and Kevin Kruggel, who raced with the Troeger clan in the '60s and '70s, came to watch the fun.

No Interlake Regatta had been held at Birch Lake in decades--nobody seems to remember exactly when the last one was held here. The BLYC is part of the local five lakes sailing group, which also includes Corey Lake, Eagle Lake, Indian Lake and Diamond Lake. Three years ago, Diamond Lake Yacht Club held an Interlake Regatta, followed the next year by Indian Lake. Like Birch Lake, Corey Lake had not held an Interlake Regatta in decades, but they broke the ice last year as hosts of the Corey Lake Regatta, which four of us from Birch Lake attended. So we were all delighted when Corey Lake brought a big contingent of five MCs here last Saturday, second only to your BLYC, which had 11. We were also delighted that Indian Lake brought three boats, Eagle Lake brought the winner, the Indianapolis Yacht Club had one; and a new friend from the South Carolina Yacht Club found us at the last minute on the MC Sailing Association website, bringing our total to 22 boats.

The public launch was a busy place where ten MCs arrived, masts were raised, and boats were rigged, launched, and later re-trailered. Ron and Bob Niezgodski arrived at the crack of dawn and befriended some fishermen who moved their two vehicles with trailers out of our way. Ben Wozniak drove his tractor equipped with a hitch ball and moved trailers much faster than cars or trucks could do. Scott Troeger assisted guests with mast raising, boat rigging, launch and take-out. Ray Gaik and Dan Waxman drove guests via golf carts between the public launch, the mooring spots, and the clubhouse. Tory Troeger drove a golf cart too, and also assisted



at the yacht club and with the BLYC burgee prizes. Steve and Jackie Frew welcomed and directed guests, made sure everyone stayed clear of the electric lines, and marked boats and trailers with numbers on blue tape to speed up re-trailering. John and Jennifer Ball and Kevin Bernaciak used their waverunners to tow guest boats from the launch to mooring spots on the south shore, and pitched in at the launch, where everyone helped everyone else.

Mooring spots for guests' boats were provided by Pat Welch and his south side neighbors Randy and Fran Welch, Steve and Glynda Hunsberger, and Becky Wiseman. Pat Welch welcomed the guests at the moorings and directed them to the clubhouse, where Barb Cassady oversaw the nerve center of activity. Holly Troeger and Amelea Kim registered guests and handled scoring. Food and beverages were handled by Sue and Pat Williams, Leslie King, and Sandy Vitale. Maggie Cassady designed the beautiful blue Birch Lake T-shirts. Mike Sheffieck was on call everywhere on land. Loaner boats: Sandy Vitale loaned her MC # 2159 to Dave Troeger. John Ball loaned his MC to Brian Hague. Back in the day the Hagues lived next door to Earl Troeger on the south side.

Out on the lake, Tom Cassady and Vic Jones set the course and also acted as the finish line boat, with Good Patti Russwurm recording the finishes. Mark Makielski of Eagle Lake, who is very experienced with big regattas, led the Committee Boat that was driven by Ron Niezgodski. Bob Niezgodski handled the anchors and horn. Crew members were Rick Russwurm and Stu Spratt. Rick Doolittle drove his rescue boat, and Tom Kuhn drove his spectator/rescue boat. MC Crew members were Tory Troeger, with her dad Scott, Tory's friend Amelea with Phil Vitale; and Maggie Cassady with her mom Barb. The official photographer was Buzz Rasmussen. Marc Caenepeel made the beautiful wooden trophies.

The results are in!

The prizes were given by Barb Cassady. George Carlin of Eagle Lake won all three races, giving him first prize as well as the 5 Lakes Interlake Regatta traveling trophy. James Thurlow of South Carolina Yacht Club won second place. He is a young Navy man, stationed at Great Lakes Naval Station, who recently bought a used MC, saw us on the internet the night before the regatta, and got the last mooring spot. Third place went to Robert Heathcote of Indian Lake Yacht Club. Those three top winners received trophies made by Marc

Caenepeel with gorgeous wooden bases and sailboat ornaments taken from some of Earl Troeger's trophies. Dave Troeger, one of Earl Troeger's sons, won fifth place in the Regatta - not bad for not sailing for 20 years. Looking forward to next year

amp is done for the season, and the last big rental group has gone home. Now we're on to planning for next year. I've been working on the budget for the upcoming fiscal year, and part of that involves deciding which projects we want to try to accomplish over the course of the off season.

This is what I hope we will get approved for next year:

- Build a new archery range (same location, more seating for campers waiting their turn, and better storage for the equipment)
- Screen in the porch on the Dining Hall, open up two additional doorways onto the porch where there are currently windows, and put 6 new tables on the porch to increase seating. When we had full weeks of camp this summer, we had maxed out the capacity of our Dining Room and had to have some tables out on the porch.
- Replace the flooring in the kitchen. While everything is torn up in the kitchen, I want to take down a wall that currently divides our dish washing space, and make that space much larger. Hopefully we will also be able to replace the dishwasher while we're at it.
- Rewire some of the electrical in the

kitchen while we have the floors torn up
■ Replace some of the original plumbing
in the kitchen – they are 1954 galvanized
steel pipes, and very hard to repair!

- Install a new water filter to provide better drinking water. The taste of the water is one of the biggest complaints we hear from campers who aren't used to drinking well water! Maybe also install a filtered water bottle filling station in the Dining Room.
- New clotheslines for all of the cabins
- Landscaping around the four new cabins we built this year
- Replace one or both of our Barnett Sailboats. These were purchased used in 1994 by former lake resident Bruce Harlan and have served us very well for 30 years. The hulls have started taking on water and have to be drained daily, and also finding replacement parts is getting very difficult!
- lacksquare Purchase a small canoe trailer

Every year we try to accomplish some improvements around camp, and this year we did a LOT with the four new cabins, new main entrance, and many other smaller projects. This coming year the goals are not as lofty, but will greatly improve our kitchen space and expand our dining space. If anyone is interested in contributing to any of the facilities



projects, or to camperships, please contact me at amber@riverbendcampfire.org

Last week, as I was getting ready to send this list of proposed projects to our finance committee for review, I had a nightmare that I met with the board and they told me that they were concerned that I had no plan or vision for camp. I woke up saying to myself, "But I DO have a plan!" The goals above cover this next year; beyond that we have some really big future projects we hope to accomplish!
